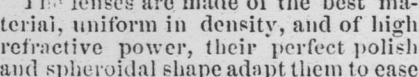

A MYSTERIOUS AFFAIR.—There is a great deal of excitement at St. John's Cove over what is believed by many to be a mysterious affair. The death of a little child of Richard Welsh of that place, from eating a poisonous substance, has been reported. On the sheet and pillowslips on which the dead child lay a variety of figures and words were found imprinted.

An Alliance.

LONDON, July 21. The British Consul at Jerusalem reports that the condition of Palestine is distressing in the extreme. He says that at no former period of his sixteen years' residence in Palestine has the condition of the country been so deplorable as at present. The ill results are traced to the influence of the drain of able-bodied men for the late Turkish war, to scanty harvests, and the ruinous losses inflicted by the non-payment of interest on Turkish Government securities.

A Paris despatch states that negotiations are in progress between Prince Jerome Napoleon and M. Gambetta to effect an alliance between M. Gambetta's party and the non-payment of interest on the Radical element in the Assembly and throughout the Republic, represented by M. Rochefort. M. Gambetta and Prince Jerome have long been in secret over very friendly terms.

Chinese Officers in the Navy.

Of late years a considerable number of Chinese officers have been serving in the English navy, and they are reported to have proved themselves generally "clever fellows" and good seamen. They have now all been recalled to their own country and consequently there will be on board the ships of this class no fair sprinkling of officers who may be said to have received their naval education on board English men-of-war.

TERRIBLE DISASTER.

Twenty-Two Lives Lost. JERSEY CITY, July 21. This morning a caisson surrounding a deep well leading to the entrance of the Hudson River tunnel, foot of Sixty-third street, in this city, caved in, carrying down an immense quantity of earth. The water from the river flowed in rapidly, and a steam fire engine set to work to, if possible, save those who might be alive from drowning.

A Curious Fact.

A curious fact in psychology, says the Pall Mall Gazette, is the facility with which men take oaths that they have not the remotest intention of keeping. Not long ago Oxford students, before matriculation had to swear to conform to the statutes of the University. Among them was one which absolutely prohibited the use of the herb nicotine or tobacco. The other oaths joined on undergraduates that they should always be apparelled in garments of a dark or "sub-fine" hue. In the solemn oath which is administered to Knights of the Garter, they are reminded that "this garter is never to be forgotten or laid aside." Even the original knights must all of them have repeatedly broken the vow. There are, however, some remarkable instances of sensitiveness on the subject of obligation which the generally of honorable men regard as of no force whatever. All Souls' College, at Oxford, was founded by Archbishop Chichele that the fellows of the same might pray for the repose of the soul of a certain fellow; and not long since there was a court who regularly paid for certain masses at the little Catholic chapel. A Protestant himself, he could not comply with the letter of the obligation imposed upon him; but he fulfilled its spirit.

A magnificent blonde wore white satin, the front almost covered with pearls. Her hair was wreathed with pearls, and a deep fringe of the same surrounded the top of her bonnet. Most of the black dresses were profusely trimmed with jet. A lovely girl wore a satin dress of a creamy tint, trimmed with roses and opals. Many gray dresses had with steel beads. Great quantities of lace were worn, and there is certainly nothing more becoming when well arranged. Owing to the Court mourning there was not much scope for invention or splendor in the matter of dress. White, gray, mauve, heliotrope and violet were the only colors worn in addition to black, and the principal relief to these neutral tints was in the form of pearls, flowers, and jewels. Suspicion of powder was visible on the hair of more than one lady present. In one case the black velvet high collar was sprinkled with gold that had fallen from the hair. It was noticeable that the sleeves were much larger at this ball than has been usual during the present and past seasons. Also a much noted arrangement of the hair prevailed, a rumor having gained currency that the Princess viewed with much disfavor the opposite extremes into which society had fallen of late. 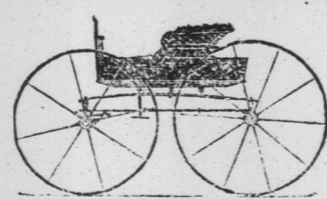
