To ensure that there shall be no prying nto Government secrets, by rummaging through the waste, a representa-

ive of the Department is on the conractors premises, and he sees that the edgers and documents are cut up and he pieces shuffled before being reduced to pulp.

Another safeguard against the leak age of secrets is provided. Departnents put certain waste paper int sacks marked 'Absolutely confidental and an official of the Stationery Office throws them bodily into a destructor. This applies to the King's private waste paper, to the Prime Minister's to the Foreign Secretary's-and, in Name act, to those of every Minister of the Address in full:rown. 




