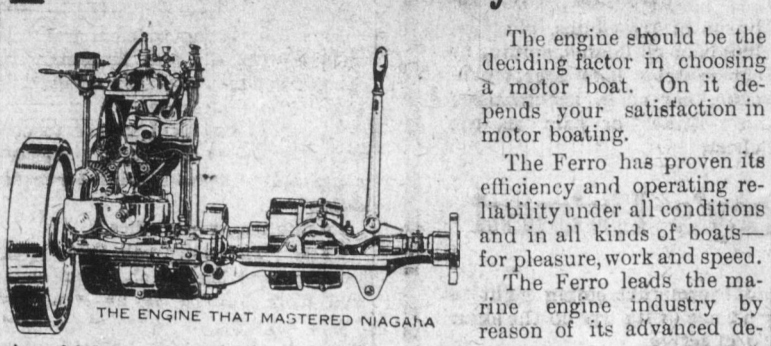

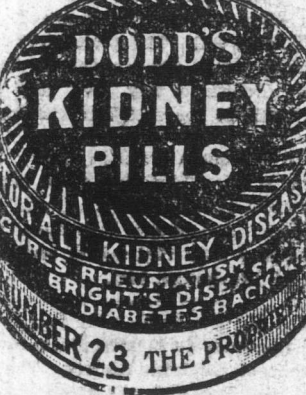

Future of Labrador.

Labrador, the Cinderella of British possessions in North America, was the subject of a remarkably interesting lecture by Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, known as 'Grenfell of Labrador,' before the Royal Geographical Society last evening. "My first deductions from twenty years' acquaintance with Labrador," said the lecturer, "are these—that it can and will carry in the days to come, a population as easily as Norway does to-day; it is a better country far than Iceland, with which also I am familiar; and to be greatly preferred to Lapland, Finland, Siberia, and Northern Alaska. Professor Fernold, of Harvard University, has lately shown most clearly that Labrador is the 'Vindland' of the Norse Sagas, that the wheat or 'reife' mentioned is obviously our strand grass, the 'vimber' our red cranberries, and the 'mostr wood' our birch."—Daily Mail, Feb. 28.

Festival of Empire.

Some Interesting Features of the All-British Exhibition. LONDON, March 3. A PALACE OF LIGHT. Not only will the Festival of Empire be a brilliant display by day both in the Crystal Palace and in the grounds, but by night the place will be a palace of a myriad lights, a veritable fairland of illuminations. In the Palace will be 200 large inverted gas lamps, each from 1,500 to 2,000 candle power, while the main avenues in the grounds will be treated in much the same way. The type of high pressure gas lamps will be similar to those so successfully employed in the streets of London. Many miles of pipes and cables, and millions of gas jets and electric globes, will be used in the 250 acres of grounds, and upon the palaces and pavilions of Empire City. HOW BATTLESHIPS ARE BUILT. In connection with the Festival of Empire a naval exhibition on novel lines will be given in two large pavilions on the Grand Parade of the Crystal Palace by the Directors of the Thames Ironworks, the firm which built the largest battleship, H.M.S. Thunderer. This will include a demonstration of how ships of war of various types are constructed, equipped with machinery, and armed—a display the like of which has never before been given, for there has been no exhibition since the great developments in naval architecture were introduced. In the transportation section of the All-British Exhibition will be a huge illuminated model of the Olympic, the largest vessel in the world. Her register is 45,000 tons, and she will make her maiden voyage on June 14 next. NO FEAR OF FIRE. Recognizing the great importance of establishing a thoroughly effective system to cope with an outbreak of fire, the Council of the Festival of Empire and the Colonial Governments have appointed Mr. Gordon W. Harris, A.M.I.C.E., adviser on the subjects of water supply and fire protection. Everything possible is being done to render an outbreak impossible at the Crystal Palace. Even now a staff of trained firemen are always on duty, and a wonderfully effective fire- quencher has been installed. WORKING DAY AND NIGHT. From now onwards the thousands of men engaged in transforming and rejuvenating the Crystal Palace and its 250 acres of grounds for the Festival of Empire will work day and night, three separate sets being employed. Already great changes have been effected, and every day sees some new effort inaugurated. The very difficult task of cutting and preparing the mile and a half of track for the "All Red Route," the tour of the Empire, has just been completed, and the laying of the electric line will now begin. There is no question but that this "All Red Route" is going to be a wonderful feature of the great scheme and the biggest novelty ever seen at an exhibition.

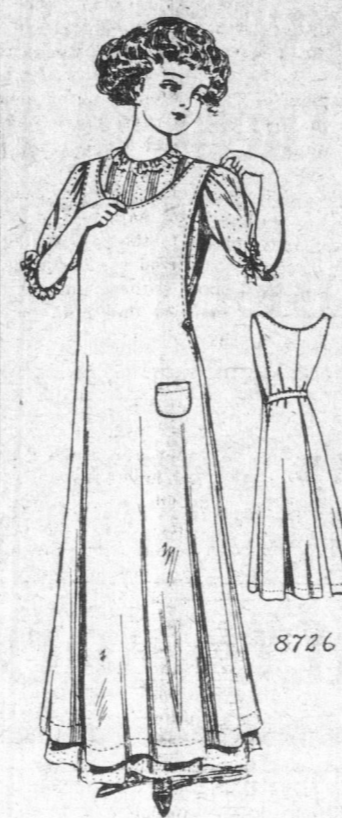

Special Evening Telegram. ROME, To-Day. The Pope received in private audience General Reyes, a Mexican soldier, and discussed the situation in Mexico. His Holiness remarked that although President Diaz was responsible for the separation of Church and State, the Vatican was well satisfied with the position of the Church in Mexico.

A Day of Rest.

Special Evening Telegram. SAN DIEGO, Cal., To-Day. Sunday was a day of rest with the army in camp, among the cruisers in the harbor, and among the wearing Mexican forces here. Admiral Thomas is preparing to land 500 marines for camp duty on shore.

Coronation Horse Show

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day. The U. S. Cavalry will participate in the International Horse Show to be held in London in connection with the Coronation. Five officers and eight men will represent the American Cavalry establishment.

No Reply to Ultimatum

Special Evening Telegram. ST. PETERSBURG, To-Day. China has not replied to the last Russian note which amounted to an ultimatum, insisting on a closer adhesion to the provisions of the Treaty of 1858. A despatch from Mukden says the attempt of the Chinese police to enter the quarantine lines led to conflicts between police and Jap guards at Fushin. One Jap and one Chinaman were killed and many on both sides were wounded.

Italian Ministry Has Resigned.

Special to Evening Telegram. ROME, To-Day. The resignation of the Italian cabinet followed a strong debate over electoral reforms. The Luzzatto Ministry was formed in March 1910.

Florizel Has 23,700.

Mrs. Keen had a wireless message to-day from Capt. A. Keen, her husband, congratulating her on her birthday and stating that the ship to-date has 23,700 seals. This is splendid news from the Florizel. It seems to indicate that she as well as the other steel ships are on a big patch and that they at least will have big trips of seals. Up to 1 p.m. none of the firms interested had news from the Gulf or Frost.

Horrible Crime.

Special Evening Telegram. ANSONIA, Conn., To-Day. Thomas Fitzgibbons senior, and his wife, were found yesterday in their home with their skulls crushed with an axe. The house was on fire. Their son Thomas, is held by the police charged with the double murder.

Votes for Women.

Special Evening Telegram. BERLIN, To-Day. The Socialists organized mass meetings last evening in every city in Germany in favour of Woman Suffrage. This is the first occasion on which German Socialists have taken up officially the cause of women.

Cable News.

STORMING THE PALACE OF DIAZ.

Special to Evening Telegram. SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 19. The official residence of the aged President Diaz, in Mexico City, was stormed by the sympathizers of the insurgents. The attack on the presidential palace was made while Diaz was giving a reception, which was attended by a large number of foreigners. The demonstration was unexpected, and before the police could disperse the mob half of the windows in the palace were broken. The President was the coolest person in the palace during the demonstration and personally saw to the issuing of the orders that caused the mob to disperse.

WOMEN IN PARLIAMENT.

Special to Evening Telegram. CHRISTIANIA, March 19. Miss Rogsthead, the first woman to represent a constituency in the Norwegian Storting, made her maiden speech before that body yesterday. She represents a Christiania seat. The entire assembly rose when the lady began her speech. Miss Rogsthead said the day would be a memorable one, because it was the first time that a woman had ever participated in a discussion in the Nations parliament. She predicted that the movement for the political enfranchisement of woman was bound to succeed, and would result in many reforms.

INDIA'S PLAGUE RECORD.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 19. During the month of February, deaths from the plague in India reached a total of 88,498. The British Indian Office reports that the epidemic was particularly virulent this year, and adds that the most persistent efforts to stamp it out failed to effect any permanent improvement in the situation.

PLAGUE ABATING.

Special Evening Telegram. SEATTLE, March 19. According to Oriental newspapers the plague in Manchuria is abating with the approach of spring. The Japanese papers, according to the Chinese, exaggerated the extent of the plague, because the ravages of the disease have been profitable to the Japanese, affording them a pretext to extend their authority in Southern Manchuria.

ANOTHER COMBINE.

Special to Evening Telegram. MONTREAL, March 19. It is reported that a new Atlantic pool will be established shortly, in which most of the larger lines between European ports and those of Canada and the States will co-operate for regular freight and passenger rates. It is said that it was to establish the right to share in the arrangement that the Cunard Line established a new line to Canadian ports.

Death of a Religious.

There died at the Presentation Convent, Cathedral Square, at 1.30 a.m. yesterday, Mother Mary Joseph Teresa Halpin, who had been in failing health for twelve months past. The deceased religious had attained her 78th year and was born in Limerick, Ireland, in 1834, and came to Newfoundland in 1851 to devote her life to the education of the youth of the country. In 1852 she received the religious habit from the late Bishop Mullock, and became a professed Nun on July 16th, 1854. She celebrated her Golden Jubilee in 1904, and for 60 years she worked zealously in the cause of religion and education. The deceased religious was one of those who founded the Presentation Convent at Ferrisburgh, St. Mary's and St. Patrick's, Riverhead. She returned to the Mother House here in 1890, and on several occasions she held the position of Superioress. The deceased was highly esteemed and beloved by the many who received their educational training at her hands and by all who were acquainted with her. There will be Office and High Mass at 8.30 a.m. to-morrow for the repose of the soul of the deceased religious, after which interment will take place.

Billiards for the Bandsmen.

Mr. A. Bulley has secured the Mechanical Society's billiard table for the use of the members of the C. C. C. Band. It was transferred to the music room from the society's rooms last week and is a fine board. It is said to be one of the oldest if not the oldest table in the city, having been imported by W. J. S. Donnelly, Esq., in 1874.

On December 22nd, 1910, at Holy Trinity Cathedral, Shanghai, Helen Elizabeth Ker Reikie, daughter of the late Rev. T. W. Reikie, of Canada, to John Matthew Munroe, son of William John Munroe, of Aroch, Ross-shire, Scotland, both of China Inland Mission.

Rev. Mr. Munroe will be remembered by many of his old friends in this city who will be glad to hear of his welfare.

After leaving St. John's, Nfld., he studied in Glasgow and was subsequently accepted in London as a Missionary for the China Inland Mission.

He sailed with the party of 1907 and commenced the study of the Chinese language. After arriving in Shanghai and getting the necessary outfit for the interior station the young Missionary settled at Anking. Next year he was sent to the Province of Chekiang to take up the work at the place where the Mission operates in 21 districts, has 87 preaching stations, 26 salaried preachers, 77 voluntary preachers. There were 105 baptisms in 1910. They have a boys school and girls school. The work is very prosperous and the people are hospitable and friendly and are kind to the strangers. The scenery is indescribably beautiful.

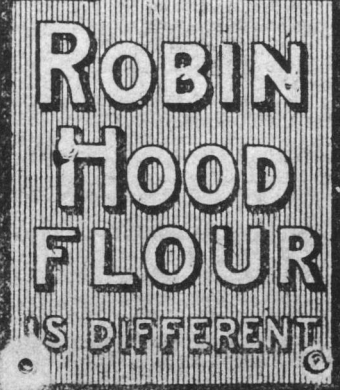
