When I saw the look in that little yellow dog's eyes I decided that whereas the lowest existing inferno might do for a man who brutally kicked a dog after some provocation from the animal, there would have to be a lower inferno created for the man who, like this one, vented his irritation against others upon an offending dumb brute.

And yet I have been thinking lately how many of us sometimes display the same spirit which, in a more brutal form, animated the teamster.

For instance, a business man comes home from an annoying afternoon at the office. He is smarting, perhaps, under a rebuke from a superior to whom he did not dare to talk back. He is full of unvented irritation and when his wife says or does some little thing which he does not like the dam bursts and all the irritation pours out upon her head. Household Notes.

To keep an embroidered scalloped edge from fraying and to save buttoning it the second time, start at your left hand to the work, holding the thread down with your thumb. Throw the thread that is in the needle under the needle, which gives it a double buttonhole edge, making it very strong.

It is well to always keep a wire strainer in one corner of the sink through which to pour dishwasher or the water that has been used to wash vegetables in. It will catch all the refuse and prevent the drain pipe from becoming clogged and will save a plumber's bill. Empty the strainer at least once a day.

Take your rugs on the porch every three or four weeks, if you have no vacuum cleaner and sweep them thoroughly with a broom. This will keep the wall paper and hangings clean, and you won't have to breathe the dust which you are sweeping. A good sweeping with the carpet-sweeper will do in the meantime.

Take old stockings which are past mending and cut them in three pieces. Keep them in a bag convenient to the kitchen and use them for wiping of the stove after frying or cooking of any kind. They are a great improvement on the regular stove cloth, as they do not soil the hands and can be thrown in the fire after using.

In warm weather rubber sandals are apt to stretch if they are hung up by the strap at the back. To obviate this keep them in a box on the floor or hang them on a nail or hook by the strap that fits over the ankle. A good plan is to have a wall bag made fitted with pockets in which to slip the overshoes after wearing.

It is annoying to find the boiler leaking after the washing is begun. If the leak is not large it may be stopped by dropping into the boiler a handful of cornmeal. The suction of the meal to that place, the meal swells and is drawn into the leakage and stops it so that the work may go on.

To keep wool shirts from stretching, wash them in warm water in which soap jelly has been dissolved measuring one tablespoonful of soap jelly to a gallon of water. Rinse thoroughly in tepid water. Squeeze the water out of the garment, but do not wring it; button the shirt up the whole length and hang it up by the bottom.

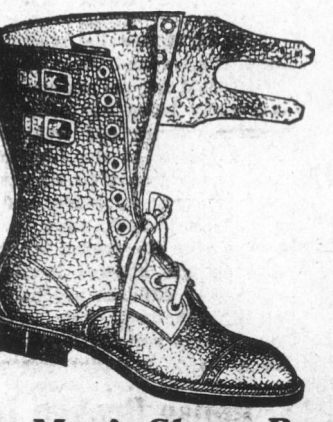

Putting Off the Evil Day.

"Two years from now we shall have to render an account of this stewardship and stand or fall by our record."

In these words, Sir Edward Morris intimated to the electors of Burin that it was his intention to put off the day of reckoning as long as possible. He told them that it was his present intention not to hold a general election before the fall of 1913. That is the plain meaning of what he said for the words were uttered on the 11th of the present month, and an interval of two years elapsing from that time will bring us to the autumn of 1913. Although this is the declared intention of the Premier, it does not follow that the Premier will be able to effect his purpose. The Premier, naturally enough, in view of the growth, certain and sure, of unpopularity which is rising more and more every day is desirous of holding the government as long as he can, and it is then not surprising that he has expressed an intention of putting off the date of the General Elections to the latest date he possibly can. But he will have much to contend with before he can effect his purpose. He will be up against the Statutory regulation of the length of term of any House of Assembly. He will be up against the Governor's desire to have a House of Assembly in existence which he can call together if circumstances should call for a session of the Legislature, and in this matter the will of the Governor will be paramount and that of the Premier. To make this matter clearer, we draw the attention of our readers to Section 1 of Chapter II, of the Newfoundland Consolidated Statutes, 1892. This section runs thus: "The House of Assembly shall continue, notwithstanding the demise of Her Majesty, for four years from the day on which they shall by proclamation be appointed to meet."

From this, it is clear that the House of Assembly cannot continue after the latter part of May 1913. After that date there will be no House of Assembly to call together. The Governor will have no House of Assembly to call together, no matter what may happen, or what circumstances may arise, which would necessitate the meeting of the Legislature.

He said he was awakened from his sleep by his father at his home in Georgetown and attacked and brutally beaten before he could get out of bed. The cut on his forehead was bound up and the boy's mother told the officers that she would have her husband summoned. After attacking the young chap his father left the house.

At Bell Island.

Man Assaulted Last Night—His Money Stolen—Unconscious on Track Until This Morning.

At 7 o'clock this morning as Messrs. Hy. Goldstone and N. Cohen, business men of Bell Island were walking out from the mines to the pier to take passage for St. John's, they were surprised to meet a respectably dressed young man who was in a terrible condition, was looking for the police and told a sensational story of outrage and robbery. He said he only arrived at the island yesterday afternoon from the United States to go to work with the D. I. S. Coy. about the machinery and being a stranger, at 7 p.m. yesterday while walking along the company's tracks, met 3 men whom he asked to direct him to a boarding house. The question was hardly put to them before one of the trio felled him with a blow and then all three falling on him they beat and kicked him into insensibility. Just before he met Messrs. Goldstone and Cohen he had recovered consciousness. He had been unconscious on the tracks all night and was in a terrible state. His face and head was covered with blood and he was a mass of deep and dangerous wounds and to add to his misery, his assailants had relieved him of his gold watch and chain and all the money he possessed, a considerable sum. Messrs. Goldstone and Cohen who gave us the story, say they pointed out the direction the man should take to get the police and he hurried off to seek their aid. They were so perturbed on meeting the unfortunate man that they forgot to ask him his name and they wonder how it was that his aggressors did not kill him.

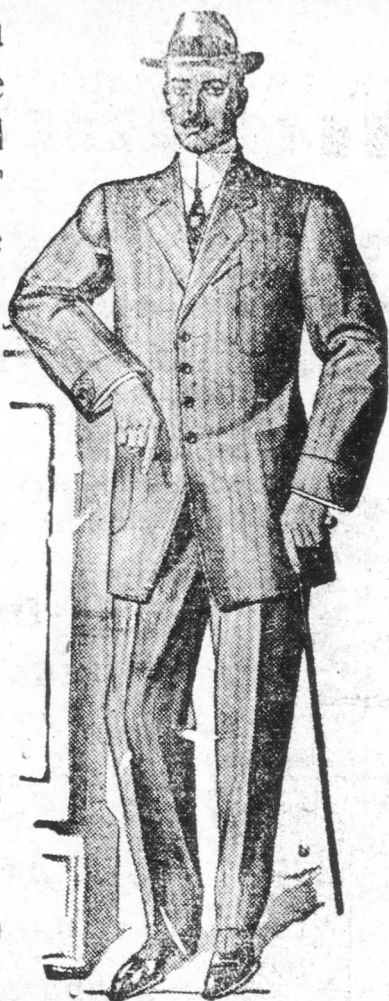

Gloucester Firms

Buying Heavy.

By the Portia we learn that the
fishermen along that section of the
coast from Cape Race to Bonne Bay
are now hard at work getting ready
their salt bulk fish for the Gloucester
market. As we already stated the
Gorton Fish Co. and Cunningham
Thompson Co. have purchased all the
salt bulk fish at 3 cents per pound or
about \$6.30 dry, less the figure for
curing. Both these companies are
purchasing jointly at Bonne Bay, Bay
of Islands, Woods Island, Rose
Blanche, Harbor Brton, St. Jacques,
Placentia and Ferryland, and also dur-
ing the summer and fall at Labrador.
Saturday last the first schooner sailed
from Argentina taking 336,000 lbs., val-
ued at \$10,080.00. Schooners are also
loading at other ports, and it is es-
timated that \$150,000 worth of fish will
be shipped to Gloucester off the West
Coast by the month of January. If
the companies alluded to could get
double the quantity of fish they would
buy it.

Hand in the Cadets' Fancy Fair.

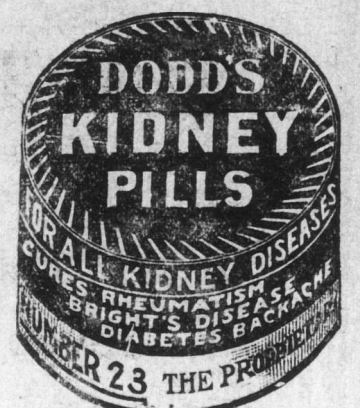
When I arrived at Tucker's last

there was Mrs. Tucker plying her
needle and making a handsome cush-
ion for the sale of work in connection
with the Cadets' Fancy Fair. We fell
in chat over old times, and Mrs. Tuc-
ker recalled old scenes of the long ago
when Bazaars used to be held in the
old Star of the Sea Hall for educa-
tional and church purposes. People
in those days were very enthusiastic,
and worked night and day to make
the Bazaar a success. At night all
the young women and men of the
town met there, and a lively scene
was presented, while the outport
friends gathered in their thousands
and helped on the good work; nothing
seemed to be too much trouble and the
amount of work performed was sim-
ply amazing. The older folks
amongst us will recall these Bazaars
with pleasure, for there was a feeling
of friendship and gaiety there that
we seldom meet to-day. Who can
forget the "wheel of fortune" and the
simple pleasure that it sent out to
the happy throng that surrounded the
man holding aloft a pair of vases, the
round timepiece or a fancy cushion.
The wheel that seemed to be most
popular blazoned forth on its dial the
names of the Districts, such as Bona-
vista, Fortune, Placentia, etc. After
the tickets had been sold for ten cents
such, and the enthusiastic and hoarse-
voiced "man of affairs" had disposed
of the "only one more left," away she
went with a rattle, the iron hoop at
the top of the dial grating on the pro-
truding nails, and as the force of the
wheel did "out how anxiously the
ticket-holders gazed to see which Dis-
trict won, and with what pride did
the lucky holder of the right ticket
walk up to receive his or her prize.
Could any amusement be more simple
or captivating? Look at the happy
faces of the crowd, men and women
who worked and dragged all day
smiled an honest, happy smile, en-
joyed a little relaxation from the cruel
torture of the hum-drum life, and dis-
played their kindly feelings to their
fellows by clapping the winner on the
back or greeting him with a simple
unassuming word of congratulation.

But the scene is changed. We can
have our Fancy Fairs. We are allow-
ed that freedom yet, but you must not
thicker with a "wheel of fortune." The
makers of our laws have spoken and
in their great wisdom have pronoun-
ced this little pastime a crime. We
bow our heads in submission, we will
get down on our marrow bones and
honour the law, but at the risk of get-
ting six months twice a year we say
that in our opinion to shut out this
little bit of venture was certainly a
straight-laced piece of audacity. If
we had become a perfect people, law-
abiding to such an extent that you
could go to bed without locking your
doors, or if we had reached that stage
of brotherly love that it was no longer
necessary to dun a man for his win-
ter's coal, there would be some reason
why we should cap the climax by
shutting out all games of chance,
some excuse for attempting to in-
crease the dimensions of halo by re-
moving the temptation to shut out this
"wheel of fortune." But that we had
not come within an Irish Mile of that
stage of perfection is well known to
all of us, and judging by the strides
we are making in this age in a back-
ward direction, the shutting out of
the "game of chance" seems to have
miscarried as far as its influence on
the present generation is concerned.

But nevertheless the Cadets' Fancy
Fair will be attractive, nothing will
be left undone to make the visitors en-
joy the evening. There will be bar-

gains in galore, and you can fill up
the inner man with all the delicacies
of the harvest season. So come one
and all and bring your sisters, your

**The Hygienic Aspects
of Gas Lighting and
Cooking.**

Experiments were made at the
Lewisham Infirmary during the
month of November 1910, with the
following in view:—

- (1) To compare hygienically the re-
lative values of the open fire and the
Gas Radiator as warming agents.
- (2) To ascertain if, and to what ex-
tent, the quality of the atmosphere of
a room is affected by incandescent
gas burners and lamps.
- (3) To ascertain the hygienic value
of the gas fire.

The experiments were carried out
by Dr. F. S. Toogood, M.D., London,
D.P.H., the Medical Superintendent of
the Infirmary, and the full report of
the experiments appeared in the Lon-
don Medical Magazine, February 1911.
The general conclusions arrived
were as follows:—

- (1) That both large and small
apartments which have normal
means of ventilation gas con-
sumed in modern incandescent
burners can be used for light-
ing without any detriment to
health, being found, in fact, to
assist ventilation by the in-
creased circulation of the air.

- (2) That a gas fire, properly con-
structed and fixed, not only
does not vitiate the air, but is a
valuable adjunct to the ven-
tilation of the room. Its ad-
vantages in the sickroom in re-
spect of its reliability, avoid-
ance of noise, freedom from
dust producing propensities,
and saving of both work and
anxiety, are obvious to every
professional man or woman.


- (3) That in large rooms, adequately
ventilated, fuelless gas stoves
can be used for heating with-
out any hygienic disadvantages,
the heated products of com-
bustion (mainly CO₂ and water-
vapour) ascending quickly
above breathing level. This
method of heating by radiation
and convection from fuelless
gas stoves, is economical, but
proper ventilation of the build-
ings in which it is adopted is
essential, which, of course, is
also the case whatever means
of heating is adopted. A ward
or other public building in
which gas radiators cannot be
used with advantage is im-
properly ventilated.

OPEN TO CROWDED HOUSE
SPLENDID PERFORMANCE.

Wild Scene in Town in Italy.
Rome, Oct. 16, via Frontier—Very grave disorders occurred to-day at Segni, a town of 7,000 people one half hour by railway from Rome, and the centre of a district in which is Carpineto, the birthplace of Pope Leo XIII, still surrounded with the ruins of towers erected in the middle ages for protection against the Saracens.

The rioting was caused, as was the case in Calabria, recently by the action of the municipality in adopting the measures to stamp out the cholera.

Put Carbiniers to Flight.
There were five patients at the hospital and four suspects are quarantined in a house. The inhabitants believed that the Government intended to poison the cholera patients, and a great crowd marching to the City Hall demanded their release. There were only four Carbiniers in the place and when they attempted to defend the building, they were stoned, wounded and put to flight.

The Mayor Escaped.
Later they returned only to be again routed. They did not use their weapons, as they would have been of little avail against the mob, which by that time had been swollen until it numbered several thousand, practically the whole population.

The mob broke in the doors of the municipal building, seeking the Mayor, whom they held primarily responsible. However, the Mayor and his clerks had made good their escape, and found refuge with friends in a house where they could not be found. Failing to lay hold of the Mayor the mob sacked the building and burned it.

Death to the Doctors.
The sight of the flames appeared to add to the frenzy of the rioters, and when a woman seizing the municipal flag from the burning structure cried "to the hospital, to the hospital; death to the doctors," the suggestion caught the fancy of the crowd and in another moment the thousands of shrieking and gesticulating men, women and children were bearing down on the hospital. The doors were forced, the attendants swept aside and the cholera patients lifted from their cots and carried to the street.

Embraced Cholera Patients.
Meantime others broke into the house where the suspects were quarantined and took them from the place. Something like a procession was then formed and the sick were borne in triumph to their homes. Of the nine stricken persons two were on the point of death, and it was a ghastly exhibition as they were passed from hand to hand, embraced, kissed and fondled by their half mad friends.

While this was going on some of the local authorities managed to send a message to Rome and troops were hurriedly sent from the Capital. The soldiers restored order after many of the mob had been placed under arrest.

LAST OF THE FLEET.—Mr. McRae's schooner, the last of the Labrador fleet, is now on the way home from Grady. Mr. Hiccock's schooner was also nearly ready to leave Swokey when the Solway came south. All the foreign vessels taking dry fish to market had left the coast.

Cabinet Changes.
Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
The Cabinet has undergone an important reconstruction. Winston Churchill, the Home Secretary, becomes First Lord of the Admiralty. Reginald McKenna lays down the Admiralty portfolio to assume the Home Secretaryship. Earl Carrington, President of the Board of Agriculture, becomes Lord Privy Seal, Mr. C. E. Rumour says that a member of the Government wants to get hold of the property, and that certain prominent supporters of the Government are also desirous of acquiring it. As Messrs. Harris and Ayre wish to keep aloof from all suspicion of political jobbery and favoritism they should direct that the present notice be cancelled and that the Rae Island property be sold at auction to the highest bidder. Public trustees should not only be pure but above suspicion. The conduct of the Government in the matter of the non-appointment of a Cashier to the Savings Bank has already opened the eyes of the public to the fact that that important institution, like all other public interests, is being prostituted to personal and political ends. The Directors of the Savings Bank are not altogether blameless in respect to that scandal, for, as the parties directly responsible for the management of the Bank, they should long ago have insisted upon the appointment of a suitable Cashier, and have resigned rather than become parties to a piece of political chicanery calculated to shake public confidence in the Bank. The Directors have shown themselves deplorably weak in that connection, and their conduct affords no guarantee that under the tender system proposed to be applied to the sale of Rae Island that property will not be sacrificed in order to meet the Government's political exigencies. I hope, Mr. Editor, that what I have written may commend itself to your judgment, and that you will aid in preventing another Savings Bank scandal by insisting, so far as you are able, on the proper course being adopted in the disposal of Rae Island property. Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 23. There is a likelihood that the Royal Commission's report, instead of making even a temporary peace, will prove the commencement of more serious troubles in the railroad world than those already experienced. Railroad men are holding meetings in many places, passing resolutions, repudiating the report of the Commission, and asking the executives of the Unions to convene a National Conference to frame better conditions for employment, and submit the plan decided on to the Railway Companies for adoption. BERLIN, Oct. 23. The German Foreign Office has received enquiries from the American Government regarding the situation in China. Germany believes that it does not call for international action, and considers that the naval force in Chinese waters is adequate protection for foreigners. The possibility of an outbreak against foreigners at Chang Sha, the capital of Hunan Province, is recognized. Latest messages indicate that trouble is brewing.

Special Evening Telegram. STRASBOURG, Oct. 22. Complete returns of the election of members under the new constitution granted to Alsace and Lorraine, show 29 Clericals, 5 Socialists, 20 Liberals. Rebidding will take place in 23 districts. The Liberals and Socialists combined are expected to win a majority on the second balloting.

American Bison Increasing

But Still Only a Sorry Remnant of Once Great Herds. Coincident with a report that the number of buffaloes in this country is rapidly increasing and no longer in danger of total extermination, Prof. Thomas D. Eason, of the Oklahoma State University, has sounded a note of alarm regarding the narrowing circle of wild animals in the United States within recent years, says 'Popular Science Monthly'.

The bison, or buffalo, has been taken care of barely in time to insure its preservation, and Prof. Eason says that unless measures are taken for the preservation of other wild animals, many of them, particularly the wapiti or American elk, the moose, caribou deer, prong-horned antelope, Mountain goat, black bear and California grizzly, will soon disappear completely.

Within the past twenty years, says Professor Eason, 'the snowy heron has practically disappeared. Twenty years ago there were in the region about Charleston, S.C., at least three million of these birds; to-day there are a hundred remain. There is but on small colony of the American egret left in this country, and that one is on the coast of South Carolina. This colony was fired into last year, and again this year, so that twenty birds remain. It will be but a few years, unless some drastic measures are taken, before the history of this bird will be the same as that of the passenger pigeon.

Between 1880 and 1890 3,800,000 alligators were killed in Florida. Twenty years ago it was a common occurrence to find alligators of great size in man of the streams of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Mississippi, Florida and Louisiana. In all these states, excepting Florida and Louisiana, the alligator representatives are very scarce to-day. Government figures show that herds of bison in this country in 1855 numbered about forty million head. From 1850 to 1883, a period of thirty three years, the number slain was more than two hundred and fifty million, or eight million each year; a record which has few parallels. Ten or twelve years ago there were very few American children who had ever seen a bison. In 1890 the total number remaining in the United States was estimated at about a hundred and it began to look as if another year or so would witness the death of the last surviving bison. Steps were taken to save the bison from extinction with such good results that, according to the figures of the American Bison Society, there are now 2,108 of them distributed among three government herds and various private ones.
