





Among Mr Town's aphorisms were the following: "Talent is something, but tact is ent is power, tact is skill. Talent

knows what to do, tact knows how to "Talent makes a man respectable, tact makes him respected. Talent is wealth, tact is ready money. For all the practical purposes of life tact carries it against talent, ten on one.

"The man of initiative is never at a loss for a living. Men lacking in in itiative must always be servants The Principal's Son. "A very large proportion of prin cipals, especially those of the pres-

ent generation, reach their offices when half the day has flown by; others attend at their offices only two or three days in each week, leaving early, and regularly indulge in extended 'week-ends' and lengthy holidays. ### The Hygienic Aspects of Gas Lighting and Cooking.

Experiments were made at the ewisham Infirmary during the onth of November 1910, with the

(1) To compare hygienically the reative values of the open fire and the Gas Radiator as warming agents.

(2) To ascertain if, and to what ex-

ent, the quality of the atmosphere of

room is affected by incandescent gas burners and lamps. (3) To ascertain the hygienic value

of the gas fire. The experiments were carried out v Dr. F. S. Toogood, M.D., London, D.P.H., the Medical Superintendent of the Infirmary, and the full report of the experiments appeared in the London Medical Magazine, February 1911. The general conclusions arrived vere as follows:-

(1) That both large and small apartments which have normal means of ventilation gas consumed in modern incandescent burners can be used for lighting without any detriment to health, being found, in fact, to assist ventilation by the increased circulation of the air.

(2) That a gas fire, properly constructed and fixed, not only does not vitiate the air, but is a valuable adjunct to the ventilation of the room. Its advantages in the sickroom in respect of its reliabilty, avoidance of noise, freedom from dust producing propensities and saving of both work and anxiety, are obvious to every professional man or woman

(3) That in large rooms, adequately out any hygienic disadvantages, the heated products of combustion (mainly C 02 and water vapour) ascending quickly above breathing level. This method of heating by rediation and convection from flueless gas stoves, is economical, but proper ventilation of the buildings in which it is adopted is essential, which, of course, is also the case whatever means of heating is adopted. A ward or other public building in which gas radiators cannot be used with advantage is improperly ventilated.

### American Bison Increasing

But Still Only a Sorry Remnant of Once Great Herds.

Coincident with a report that the number of buffaloes in this country is rapidly increasing and no longer in danger of total extermination, Prof Thomas D. Eason, of the Oklahoma State University, has sounded a not of alarm regarding the narrowing cir cle of wild animals in the Unite oular Science Monthly.'

The bison, or buffalo, has been taken eare of barely in time to insure it: preservation, and Prof. Eason says hat unless measures are taken for th reservation of other wild animal nany of them, particularly the wapit or American elk, the moose, caribou leer, prong-horned antelope, Montan goat, black bear and California griz

zly, will soon disappear completely. 'Within the past twenty years,' say Professor Eason, 'the snowy heron ha practically disappeared. Twenty year ago there were in the region about Charleston, S.C., at least three million of these birds; to-day less than hundred remain. There is but of small colony of the American egre left in this country, and that one is o the coast of South Carolina. Th colony was fired into last year, an again this year, so that twenty bird remain. It will be but a few year unless some drastic measures ar taken, before the history of this bird will be the same as that of the pas

senger pigeon. Between 1880 and 1890 3,800,000 al ligators were killed in Florida. Twent years ago it was a comon occurrence to find alligators of great size in man Florida and Louisiana. In all thes states, excepting Florida and Louis iana, the saurian representatives ar

very scarce to-day. Government figures show that th erds of bison in this country in 185 numbered about forty million head From 1850 to 1883, a period of thirty three years, the number slain wa more than two hundred and fifty mi lion, or eight million each year; a re cord which has few parallels. Te or twelve years ago there were ver few American children who had eve seen a bison. In 1890 the total num her remaining in the United State was estimated at about a hundred and it began to look as if another yea or so would witness the death of the last surviving bison. Steps were tak en to save the bison from extinction with such good results that, according to the figures of the American Biso Society, there are now 2,108 of them distributed among three governmen nerds and various private ones.






