

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
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"Naughty Floor."

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"Naughty Floor" or "Naughty Baby"?

BY RUTH CAMERON.

When a baby tumbles down and bumps his head on his little nose, there are almost as many ways of dealing with this familiar catastrophe as there are different kinds of mothers. For instance, there is the mother who kisses the bruise, and the mother who tries to distract the baby's attention, and the mother who attempts to instill courage by telling baby that he is a brave little boy, and how glad mother is that he isn't going to cry. All of these methods have their advantages. But there is one method of dealing with such happenings in which I can see no advantage and a great disadvantage.

And that is the habit of blaming someone or something for the mishap which is possibly baby's misfortune, and possibly baby's fault. "Naughty floor!" says the mother who adopts this policy. "Baby spank! naughty floor for hitting baby's head." And forthwith she slaps the floor and urges the baby to do the same.

Or if baby jumps about in big sister's arms and loses his balance, the resulting tumble is blamed in baby's presence, to big sister for letting baby fall.

Now perhaps you think I am making a good deal of fuss over a very little thing. Well, maybe it is a little thing in itself, but there is a very big principle behind it. The tendency to blame someone or something for the unpleasant happening which is really our own fault or just our misfortune, is strong enough in all of us. It

doesn't need any encouraging. And the mother who teaches the baby to say "naughty floor" or "naughty sister" is encouraging this tendency.

A certain vigorous little baby who has just arrived at the "splinky" age has acquired a trick of throwing herself back on the floor, or in her mother's arms, or wherever she happens to be, when she doesn't like anything. At first her mother was constantly on guard to save baby from the results of her own temper, but she soon decided that that was not the best way. After that, when she knew the baby could not do herself any serious harm, she held back from interfering and deliberately allowed the child to bump or strike herself. Nor did she then say "naughty floor" or "naughty chair". On the contrary, she told the baby that that was what happened to babies when they were naughty and flung themselves about. Needless to say, baby soon learned her lesson.

The mother who says "naughty floor" is the mother who a few years later tells how the little boy next door got her Johnnie into mischief, or how the little girl across the street led her little girl into a scrape.

The tendency to blame all our failures and troubles on other people, or on uncontrollable conditions, is one of the deadliest enemies to success. The only way to grow and achieve is to build on our failures and mishaps, and how can we do that if we won't acknowledge them? The sooner a child learns the lesson of his own responsibility for things that go wrong, the better. And remember, the baby who is old enough to comprehend "naughty floor" is also old enough to understand "careless baby."

The Time is Ripe

Now that there is an exceptionally large number of chairmen of School Boards in the city, and that there will be no doubt opportunities afforded to many of them to meet together and confer on the general welfare of the schools under their charge, it seems opportune to direct attention to the need of a more thorough training of our school teachers for their work. Largely in the past, and too largely at present, schools have depended on teachers who have not had the advantage of a systematic study of child life, and the growth and development of the body and its faculties, the influence of home, school and environment, nor have teachers been well grounded in the principles which should govern school building and management, nor the make-up of school curriculums, class teaching, and individual development, nor the scientific handling of the subjects of the curriculums. In the past they have depended in the main on the scholastic teachings they have received in common with other pupils of our colleges, who are not being prepared for the profession of schoolmaster or schoolmistress. Often without any service as assistant teachers they are thrown on their own resources to carry on a school as best they can. The wonder is that they do as well as they do, not that they at times fail. The time, however, is now ripe for an advance in the training of teachers from a professional stand-point. They should be grounded in the principles of their profession and well exercised in the practices under competent supervision, before they are called upon to undertake the sole charge of schools. We have mentioned these matters, now, not as innovating any new departure, for the Superintendents have enlarged upon them often in their annual reports, but because the time is now ripe for a forward movement, and an opportunity is afforded for the chairmen of boards to meet together and discuss them, such as only occurs but rarely.

A Souvenir of the Imperial Press Conference.



Methodist Conference

The 29th Annual Conference of the Nfld. Methodism opened its sessions in Gower Street Methodist Church, at 9.30 yesterday morning, the 26th inst. Devotional exercises occupied the first half hour of the morning session.

Proceeding with the business, the balloting for President resulted in the election of the Rev. Chas. Lench. The Rev. F. R. Matthews, B. A., was elected Secretary and the Revs. R. Maddock and G. Steele, assistants. The Rev. W. H. Whittemarsh, M. A., B. D., was elected Statistical Secretary and the Rev. C. Howse, Journal Secretary.

Votes of thanks were presented to the Rev. A. A. Holmes and the Rev. C. Lench for their services during the past year as President and Secretary of Conference, respectively.

Conference prayer meeting took place at 11 a.m. according to programme. A resolution of congratulation was extended to Dr. Rogers on the attainment of his jubilee in the Methodist Ministry, which Dr. Rogers recognized in his usual way.

It was decided to hold the sessions of Conference from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. and from 2.30 p.m. to 5.30 p.m. The station list was read for the first time.

Afternoon Session Wednesday.
This session opened with the usual devotional exercises at 2.30 p.m., after which the journal of the morning session was read by the secretary of Conference. An important communication in reference to Church Union, from the Secretary of the General Conference was handed over to a committee composed of five ministers and five laymen, for consideration.

Resolution of condolence with the Rev. Jabez R. Saint and Mr. Steer, on their sore bereavement were unanimously passed.

The Business Committee was instructed to arrange a suitable time in which to receive the deputation from the Canadian Branch of the B. & F. Bible Society.

The Secretary read a communication with reference to two bequests of \$1,000 each of the late Mr. Marshall, to the Methodist Conference—one for Education of Ministers Children, and the other for the Education of Methodist orphans. The bequests were referred to a committee appointed to deal with them and suitable acknowledgment was ordered to be made to the Executors.

Various other communications, among which were those from the Registrar General, the General Secretary for Missions, the General Conference, Committee on Evangelism, and others were read and referred to different committees to deal with.

The session adjourned at 9.50 p.m. with a hymn and the benediction by the ex-president.

At night a conference on the state of the work to which the public were invited was held in Gower Street church. Discussion was opened by the reports of the Journal Secretaries of the different districts and taken up by various speakers. The decrease in membership was freely considered and the church urged the faithful and prayerful service for the next conference year.

Thursday morning, Conference opened at 9.30 with the customary devotional exercises, after which the report of our mission work to the General Board of Missions was taken up for discussion. The report of the Conference Missionary Society was presented by the Rev. Dr. Fenwick, and spoken to by Rev. Mr. Allen of Toronto and several others. Resolutions in regard to the missionary relation of the Annual and General Conference were also considered. The session adjourned at 12.30.

Diocesan Synod.

YESTERDAY'S EVENING SESSION.

The Synod resumed its session at 7:30, the Lord Bishop presiding.

After prayers by His Lordship the Roll was called when 38 Clergymen and 25 laymen answered their names. The minutes of the previous sitting were read, adopted and signed.

On motion of Canon Bolt the Report of the Executive Committee, which had been printed and distributed to the members, was received. The Report gave a general resume of the work and progress of the Church since the last Biennial Session. It referred to the loss sustained by the death of Canon Dunfield who for so many years occupied the position of Clerical Secretary, and as an officer of the Synod his sound judgment and advice will be sorely missed. Sir James Winter's death, who was also prominent in every movement for the welfare of the Church, was referred to in fitting language. The death of the Episcopal Commissary, Canon Temple, who passed away almost on the eve of the assembling of the Synod, is recorded at the end of the Report. Nine clergy are reported as having left the Diocese, while fourteen have been added to the list. The number of clergy now in the Diocese is 78, including those on the retired and sick list and leave of absence. Several new Churches and Parsonages are in course of construction and a scheme of activity prevails in many parts of the Diocese. Five new missions have been formed, while two missions have qualified and constituted parishes.

The work of the S. P. C. K. Report, the C. W. and O. Fund, Clergy Retirement Fund, Clergy Sustentation Fund, The Home Mission Fund, Home and Foreign Mission Fund, Bishopric Maintenance Fund, and the Diocesan Mission Fund are all reported upon by the committee, which report will probably be discussed during the next sitting of the Synod.

Bishop Spencer College Report by the Committee of Management is appended.

The report of the Council of Queen's College was read by Canon Bolt and received.

Mr. J. W. Withers presented the report of Managers of the Clergy Sustentation Fund. Mr. W. R. Stirling read the Statistical Committee's Report. This report dealt with the unsatisfactory returns sent in by the Clergy. Canon Smith moved the reception of the Report of the Committee on the question of securing and training candidates for Holy Orders.

The Rev. C. V. Cogan at this stage of the proceedings was called upon by the Rev. President to address the Synod.

Mr. Cogan responded in a most interesting speech, in which he conveyed a message from the Bishop of London (in whose Diocese he is at present labouring), to the Bishop of Newfoundland, the clergy and people of affectionate feelings and sincere love. Mr. Cogan having expressed his great pleasure and gratification at being once more privileged to address the Synod, took his seat amid much applause.

The Hon. R. Watson's Bill to amend Chap. 24, Cons. and Rules, was next in order. The Bill has reference to the enlargement of the Cemetery Board, Sec. 5 is amended by substituting the word 5 for 3. The House went into Committee on the Amendment which was passed and reported.

Rev. Frank Smart's Bill to amend Chap. 16, 17, 20 of Cons. and Rules, was moved for a second reading by the Rev. gentleman in a lengthy speech, which evoked quite a discussion in which Messrs. Blackall and H. W. LeMesurier took part. The motion for a second reading was lost upon a division of the House.

Canon Bolt moved the second reading of the Bill to amend Chap. VII, of Cons. and Rules, which being carried the House went into Committee and after a short discussion the Bill passed and the House resumed.

Leave was granted Canon Smith to introduce a Bill to establish an Ordination Candidates Fund.

After the Rev. F. Smart and Mr. J. W. Withers had spoken the Bill was read a first time, to be read a second time to-morrow.

The Bishop requested the Old Boys of St. Peter's College, under the mastership of Rev. J. F. Phelps, to remain at the close of the Synod.

The Rev. Mr. Newcombe will address the House at 8 o'clock to-morrow night in the interest of the B. and P. Bible Society.

After the Benediction by the Bishop, the House adjourned at 9.40.

The King and Queen were proceeding to the Cathedral of Llandaff, when a woman named Helen Gramp, muttering threats against cabinet ministers enjoying a tour through the country, while women were starving in prison, hurled herself on the Home Secretary, and at the same time shouted to the Queen to help the suffragettes. The woman was promptly jailed.



 Negotiations for a settlement of the Dock strike have again failed. The employers say that they have not in any way altered their position, and that more help than is needed could be obtained if a stop was put to terrorism tactics, adopted by the men. Encouraged by promises of financial assistance, a more defiant attitude among the workers is perceptible. The strike committee are telegraphing to Germany and America to the Central Trade organizations for loans for the benefit of the London Transport workers.

Getting Near.

New York, June 19.—A special despatch from London to the Sun says: "I have not discovered a cure for cancer, but I think I have got near it," was the startling announcement made yesterday by Dr. F. W. Forbes Ross, whose alleged pain-killing discovery was made public last Friday. "I am convinced that the cure when found will be very simple. As far as my investigation has gone I have come to the conclusion that the cause of cancer has no connection with meat or vegetable diet, neither is it an irritation of parts or a back infection. My theory is that cancer cells are really "Peter Pan" that will not grow old. If we could make them grow old we could cure the disease, because we should stop the multiplication of cells and they would be absorbed.

"What I claim to have discovered is that cancer is nothing more or less than an exhaustion of a natural quality in a body possessed by epithelial cells consequent upon diminution in the body of potassium salts. In the recent libel action here Dr. Gould, a great authority on cancer, said that cancer was sometimes cured by the natural forces of the body. I think that in potassium salts we have the key to the problem.

"I believe that the enormous increase in the death rate from cancer has kept pace with the improvements in the preparation of flour. The cortex, or rind, of wheat has been removed by the American process of milling, and people are fed regularly with dephosphated bread because the cortex contains a lot of phosphate of potassium and lime. Vegetables are composed largely of potassium salts, which unfortunately are thrown away in the water in which they are boiled. And this is so with rice. Nations which have adopted the civilized method of cooking rice and throwing away the water have developed cancer.

"An experiment made recently has tended to confirm my theory. A patient whom a doctor said could not live three months is now well and attending to business under the potassium treatment. My method is to use chiefly citrated bisphosphate of potassium—taken through the mouth—and also to apply locally to the cancer by means of an electric current a solution of phosphate of potassium. My experience with this treatment makes me feel enthusiastically hopeful of its future."

To Make Ocean Travel As Safe As Street Cars
LONDON, JUNE 12.—The first essential step in the campaign for the establishment of an international weather and storm bureau has been taken here by Prof. Willis Moore, chief of the United States weather bureau. An speaking of his plan Prof. Moore said: "If the plan is adopted, so far as storms are concerned, the crossing of the Atlantic will be made as safe as a short street car journey. Great ocean liners, which have but little to fear from anything except the most destructive gale, may, by altering their course on receipt of the warning by fifty miles or more, escape a rough passage, while the smaller steamers and sailing ships, by making a wide detour, may escape possible destruction."

Prof. Moore outlined the plan at a luncheon given him by Dr. William Shaw, head of the British weather service, and the scientific staff of the London Meteorological station. Prof. LEY WOODS—June 26.

Moore has carried the fight for the adoption of the plan into the International Radio Congress now in session here.
 According to the plan, a meridian line will be established through the North Atlantic. All ships sailing in either direction westward of this meridian are to be compelled to take a daily weather observation, which must be sent by wireless telegraph to the nearest ship in communication to the west, and thence the messages are to be relayed until they reach the nearest land station. The messages are then to be telegraphed to Washington where the weather bureau will make up a weather chart and a storm warning, which will be cabled to Europe.

Ships to the eastward of the meridian will follow similar instructions, relaying the messages until they reach either London or Paris.

The weather chart and storm warning will be sent by wireless telegraph to the nearest ships.


