We understand that it is optional with the Supreme Court n cases such as this, on a conviction being obtained, to impose a fine, or imprisonment or to bind the defendants over to keep the peace.

Wheat is the father-in-law of the reakfast food industry, and has takn the place of a number of popular substitutes, such as shavings, sawdust and soy beans. If it were not for wheat, several of our most prominent and plethoric breakfast food magnates would have to get acquainted with work, instead of riding around in coonskin overcoats and writing advertisements addressed to people who are long on appetite and short on bright red corpuscles.

Wheat was invented by the Chines about 2700 B. C. The Chinese are autious people, so they fed the first erop to the missionaries, then sat down and waited for results.
