"I haven't a thing but a five dollar bill. If you can't break that I'm afraid we'll have to let it go over, until next time."  
That, according to Molly's friend the shampoo lady, is a favorite speech with several of her customers. Now, being an honest person herself, she does not doubt the authenticity of the five dollar bill excuse, as some people might. But this is the way she feels about it—why should the customers always keep the bill and the obligation on their side? Instead of invariably making her wait until next time for her pay for work well done, why shouldn't they let her take the five dollar bill and themselves wait for the change. But somehow that never seems to occur to them.

I suppose someone will say that the shampoo lady should make a point of bringing plenty of change. Unfortunately we work-a-day folks don't always have plenty of change. Besides, why shouldn't the customer make a point of having somewhere near the proper sum on hand?

A manufacturer who failed to provide himself with small bills with which to pay his employees on Saturday night, and expected them to be able to change \$50 and \$100 bills, and hold back their pay if they could not, would certainly be considered very unjust.

Is the principle any different?  
A beautiful little custom came to my attention the other day.

**Household Notes.**  
Rub common yellow soap on the bureau drawers which stick.  
Thick blotting paper under bottles will prevent hot dishes from marking the table.  
Blotting paper placed with turpentine may be used in drawers to keep away moths.  
A tablespoonful of water or milk should be allowed for each egg in making an omelet.  
Allow two level teaspoonfuls of baking powder to each cup of flour when no eggs are used.  
A scratch on polished furniture can be almost obliterated by rubbing vigorously with linseed oil.  
A table of weights and measures, typewritten and framed under glass, should be hung in every kitchen.  
The systematic brushing of the hair every night will do much toward keeping the scalp and hair clean.  
Allow from four to six eggs to each quart of milk in making a custard to be turned from the mold.  
To take disagreeable medicine, eat one or two cloves or hold ice in the mouth until the tongue is chilled.  
The latter part of September and the early part of October is the proper time to plant bulbs in the garden.  
The preferred time for the daily bath is in the morning. If taken then, it will produce invigorating results.  
For something new and dainty, spread the buttered fudge pan with minced dates before turning the candy into it.  
If by accident soot should be dropped on the carpet, cover it thickly with salt; then both may easily be swept up.  
To get the full nutriment from a potato it should be cooked in the skin, as valuable food salts lie just inside the covering.  
A few pieces of gum camphor kept in the boxes in which silver is packed in wrappings will prevent its turning dark.  
Tooth powder is excellent for cleaning jewelry. Rub it on with a nail brush and then rinse off with scalding water.  
To keep the teapot sweet and clean, wipe it out dry after using and put a lump of loaf sugar inside, leaving the lid open.  
There should be three pairs of scissors in the kitchen—one for dicing vegetables, one for trimming fish and one for general use.

**The Opera.**

# A Voice From the West.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I read that letter of "Reform" with great interest. If the voters around the country, as well as in St. John's West, would only read that a few times, they wouldn't be making fools of themselves in so many cases on polling day. But he forgot to strike a note of alarm about Debentures. Bond, in his Manifesto, under the head of "Financial Peril," gives a very broad hint to holders of Debentures and reminds them that if Morris is again returned to power our Debentures may be easy so much waste paper some day. Of late years some thousands of dollars have been invested in Government Bonds. No doubt, if the country's finances were carefully and honestly handled, our Debentures would be a safe holding, but take things as they are and see the danger in the future if Morris gets back again and

borrows a few Millions more, as he must, what will be the value of our Debentures?

The fire of '92 was bad, the Bank Crash ruined many, but was a blessing in disguise, for Bond was able to borrow on the country's credit and save the situation, banks were run on core cautious lines, people were made more industrious, and self-reliant, knowing that the merchant had no longer a free hand to draw on the Banks, and that he would be no longer privileged to smash the merchant. But who will come to the rescue if Morris gets a chance to borrow a few millions more for Reid, and a bad fishery turns up, and we find we are not able to meet our obligations? The country will default and become bankrupt. What about our Debentures then? I have a few thousand dollars in Debentures and personally I feel alarmed. I should feel no uneasiness were I sure the people of the country understood affairs as they ought, and had the honesty to act accordingly—turn out Morris and turn in Bond. I know Bond would throw a powerful searchlight on affairs, clean up the rottenness of State and establish confidence in us abroad, but who can be sure till after the 20th of this October how half of the voters will go, because the electorate is so demoralized by the cases show of good times and the money that is scattered about, and the promises of more. Many don't care if the country went to Hades. I'd like holders of Debentures to take particular note of the fact that the Government had to raise in Debentures the money to pay Reid, and

Thereby lost nearly Half a Million Dollars, which Reid would have lost had they taken Government Bonds into the market as heretofore. In all other contracts Reid took bonds. ### Petty Harbor Throws in Its Lot With Liberals.

#### Ellis, Cowan and Scott Receive Unprecedented Ovation.

If anything were now necessary to convince the people of this country that Morris has lost the support of the West End, the meeting held by the Liberal candidates in Petty Harbour, Thursday night will suffice. From all parts of that populous hamlet the people united in giving them the most sincere and enthusiastic reception ever accorded candidates in that section.

Long before the time set for the meeting, nearly three hundred voters assembled in the school house to express in person their sympathy and support for the Liberal Party and their determination to play their part in the defeat which a deceived and disgusted electorate are preparing for Morris and his colleagues in the forthcoming election.

Mr. Cowan was then called on by the Chairman, and on rising was cheered to the echo. He needed no introduction to voters of Petty Harbour. Four years ago he had had the pleasure of addressing them. He well knew the change which had taken place in Petty Harbour since that time. Their progress through the district had already mounted them high on the wave of success and they had come to Petty Harbour asking them for their support, asking them to help in the return of the Liberal Party and urging upon them the duty of voting the Straight Ticket. Whatever party they voted for they ought not to split. They owed it to themselves and to their country to be consistent in their vote and consider rather the party than the man. 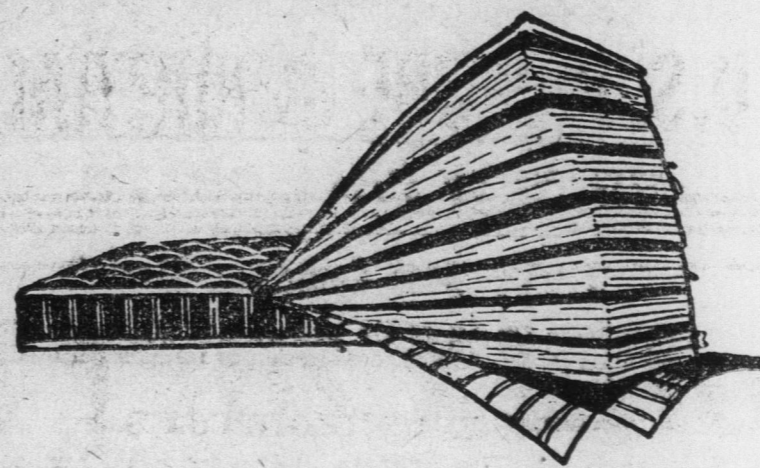

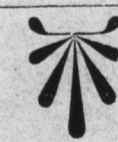
