Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

RAIDS OVER ENGLAND AND SCOTLAND.

LONDON, May 3.

There was a Zeppelin air raid on the northeast coast of England and the southeast coast of Scotland last night, and resulted in thirty-five casualties. This announcement was made daily to-day. A hundred bombs dropped.

ZEPPELIN DESTROYED.

LONDON, May 3.

The Zeppelin L-29 has been completely destroyed and driven ashore on the western side of Hafso Firth, Norway, according to advices from the German Government. Some of the crew were killed.

DEPT TRANSFER PROPOSALS.

LONDON, May 3.

The Foreign Office announces that it has learned from the American Ambassador that Germany has rejected the British proposals for the transfer to Switzerland of British German wounded or invalided prisoners of war for exchange.

NO DEFINITE DATE.

LONDON, May 3.

A definite date can be set for the release of the British prisoners of war held in Germany, according to a statement made by the British Government today.

LOYD GEORGE.

LONDON, May 3.

Mr. Lloyd George is going to give a remarkably frank speech on the state of the war in the House of Commons tomorrow night. It is expected that the speech will have a direct bearing on his future official life, as well as on the future of the British Government, which has been said publicly by cabinet minister since the war.

S.W. MINISTRY RESIGNED.

SYDNEY, N.S.W., May 3.

The New South Wales Ministry has resigned, owing to the unwillingness of the cabinet to support the government's policy.

The Significance of the Berlin News

If the report of the Volks Zeitung is to be relied on, there will be little in the German reply to the American Note which can give satisfaction to the United States on the submarine issue. According to the German organ, the German reply to the American Note will not decide whether a breach will come between the United States and Germany. The decision rests with President Wilson, and will depend on the answer he is expected to make to Germany. It was never expected that Germany would take the initiative in formally breaking off diplomatic relations with the United States. Germany has nothing to gain from taking such a step. On the other hand she has much to lose. She is receiving supplies from the States, largely through neutrals, particularly Denmark. The loss of these supplies would be a severe blow to her. Moreover, it would result in the United States taking over the German ships interned there, and this would be followed by other neutrals doing the same. This would largely offset the losses to the mercantile marine made by her submarines, and a further continuance of the sinking of U. S. and other neutral ships would lead to declarations of war against Germany. This would result in a large accession of financial strength to the belligerents waging war against Germany. The significance of the statements of the Volks Zeitung, if it can be relied on, and it must be remembered it is a statement, emanating from a German wireless station where every statement is officially censored, is that it implies that Germany does not intend to comply with the demands of President Wilson and really asks what Wilson is going to do about it. In other words, it is an invitation to President Wilson to continue to conduct the submarine campaign as she has been doing in the past, and President Wilson can do what he likes about it. The despatch of the Casement expedition to Ireland after a grave crisis had arisen between Germany and the United States was much more than a mere coincidence. It was clearly designed to affect German and Sinn Fein opinion in the United States and the Volks Zeitung intimates has the same intent. It is a notice to the German hyphen and the Sinn Feiners in the United States to get busy and bring pressure to bear on the Washington administration to paralyze President Wilson and his colleagues, so that they may take it lying down, if the German reply is unsatisfactory. The U. S. authorities show how efforts have been made in the past to embroil the States with Mexico and Japan to effect a similar purpose.

That Scene in the Council

While the Hon. John Anderson was referring to the Newfoundland soldiers and reservists, one of the latter, who was in the gallery of the Council Chamber, interrupted him twice and was finally asked to withdraw. The intention of the reservist was to call attention to the inadequate provision for the wives and families of the married reservists. The method adopted was irregular, but we hope it will have the effect of directing the attention of the Patriotic Association. The main difficulty of the position is that reservists are under the British Admiralty and the local authorities do not pay them. But that is not sufficient reason why the Patriotic Association should not aid their families.

The Closing of the Session.

His Excellency this afternoon will prorogue the General Assembly, and advantage will be taken of the function to have a large parade of Naval Reservists, Volunteers, Police and Brigades. After the Legislature has been closed, there will be a review Government House grounds and a parade through the City. This exhibition will afford an opportunity to the public to realize the extent of the recruiting during the past two months and should tend to stimulate recruiting still further.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I am pleased that I am able to relieve you at this, to many of you very busy season, from further attendance on your legislative duties. Having regard to the number of the measures upon which you have deliberated and passed into law, the session cannot be regarded as a protracted one, and it would have been difficult, keeping in view the importance of the measures, to have curtailed your deliberations.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I thank you for the liberal nature of the supplies granted for the Public Service. The appropriations which will be made from time to time will be expended with a view of securing the very best returns to the public. The substantial increase you have made to the vote for Old Age Pensions will no doubt be appreciated throughout the country, especially by that deserving class for whose aid the pensions are designed.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

The further provision you have made for Newfoundland's participation in the great war in which the Empire is engaged reflects the universal desire of the country, and will be a fitting contribution to that splendid effort which Great Britain and her Allies are making towards the preservation of civilization and the establishment of permanent peace. The satisfactory result of the seal-fishery is gratifying. The enterprise has not alone been remunerative to those of our people engaged in its prosecution, but must tend to stimulate the other industrial operations of the Colony.

The ever popular string band of H.M.S. Briton. Messrs. Macklin, Laundry, Jago, Luxon and Burley gave a selection and were re-demanded and a very choice piece by the Misses Christian, accompanied by Gordon Christian, whose talented services are always appreciated. The patriotic songs of Messrs. C. Trennell, C. Hatcher and H. Courtenay were loudly applauded and encores given, and the instrumental selections of Messrs. Smallest Cargo.

The S.S. Ranger, Capt. Wm. Bartlett, Jr., finished landing last evening. Her turnout was 2,721 young harps, 15 old harps, 9 bedlamers; total 2,745. The gross value was \$6,298.05; net value \$6,238.05; gross weight 54 tons, 11 cwt., 2 qrs., 8 lbs; net weight 52 tons, 13 cwt., 12 lbs. Her crew of 141 men shared \$14.64 each. This is the smallest bill this season, and those of the crew who took up a crop only had just enough left to pay their way home.

### Plot to Blow Up Munitions Vessel of Allies Found.

New York, April 13.—Full confession of the details of a gigantic plot to blow up or fire all ships carrying munitions to the Allies, has been made by Capt. Charles von Kleist, retired sea-captain, and one of four men arrested last night, the police announced to-day.

"Sweated" until daybreak, von Kleist broke down and admitted he was superintendent of a factory in Hoboken where bombs were made, the police stated. Certain portions of his confession are being withheld. Capt. Tunney believes he is hot on the trail of the man "higher up," alleged to have acted as go-between in dealings with the bomb plotters.

"Lieut." Robert Fay, indicted several weeks ago, on the charge of conspiring to blow up munition ships, furnished the police the information on which von Kleist and his alleged fellow conspirators were arrested.

#### Headed Bomb Factory.

Von Kleist was born in Pommern, Prussia. He told the police that he lived within a block of the house of Bismarck, and that his father was a personal friend of the former German Chancellor. Before the war, von Kleist was in command of the freighter Hauloway, owned by Church Brothers, of Tiffinay, R.I. Shortly after the outbreak of the war, he met a man in Hoboken, who, after learning that he was a German and investigating his record, offered him a position as superintendent of a factory at Hoboken, which was to manufacture fertilizer. At various times the factory received various sums of money through a man named Hansen. This man, according to the police, was the agent of von Pappen, Boy-Ed and other German officials.

Later, the factory began manufacturing bombs and a chemist was hired at \$10,000 a year. The first bomb was placed aboard the Kirk Oswald, timed to explode five days after the steamer left port. When the bomb failed to go off, "Captain Sternburg" and others at the factory attacked the chemist in the laboratory, alleging he was guilty of treachery. The chemist finally convinced Sternburg that the shell of the bomb was too thick and that the acid did not eat its way out.

After the arrest of Fay, Scholz, Max Breitung and others, the conspirators became very cautious and finally closed the factory on April 1, von Kleist was quoted as saying: "The police say they found two boxes of powder, two lead bombs, and twelve aluminum milk testers, which were to be used to measure acid, in Von Kleist's home at 1,121 Garden Street, Hoboken."

#### The Men Arrested.

Three men higher up, named by one of the arrested men, the police say, are: Franz von Rintelen, indicted here on a conspiracy charge, Captain Franz von Pappen and Capt. Carl Boy-Ed, recalled military and naval attaches of the German Government. The arrested men are: Ernest Becker, electrician on the Hamburg-American liner Friedrich der Grosse, interned at Hoboken, said by the police to have confessed making hundreds of bombs; Capt. Charles von Kleist, retired sea-captain of German birth; Capt. Otto Wolpert, skipper of the Friedrich der Grosse, accused of having received completed bombs; Capt. Enno Bode, Pier Superintendent of the Hamburg line, subsidiary and alleged go-between for bomb makers and "men higher up."

#### AFTER DEATH.

I do not know just what may happen when I go tumbling off the map, into the outer void; I hope to draw a pair of wings, and crown and robe, and kindred things, and harp of celluloid. But little do I walk the floor, or lose a chance to sleep and snore, by worrying my head about the things that may befall when I step off this whirling ball and line up with the dead. I think I've all a man should need, in this, the simple little creed, that passed in my life: "With all your fellow-men be square; be kind and just to all, nor care a cent what others did." If one is square and just and kind, I don't believe he'll be behind, when they distribute crowns; he'll be a credit to this globe, and he will swap for snowy robe, his workworn hand-me-downs. Religion's tangled, teased and vexed, with dogma and conflicting text, by sages splitting hairs; and all that fellows really need is just that simple little creed, to climb the golden stairs.



The report of the Joint Select Committee on the Sealing Bill was adopted. The Premier moved an address to the Governor in Council for a Commission of members of both Houses to sit while the House is not in session on the Municipal measure.

Messages received from the Legislative Council intimating their concurrence in bills were read. All the business of the House was finished last evening and His Excellency the Governor will prorogue the Assembly this afternoon.

## Particulars of Landslide at Port Blandford.

Further particulars of the landslide and washout in the neighbourhood of Port Blandford show that what occurred was of a serious nature. At 8 o'clock Monday evening a rumbling noise was heard west of the place mentioned. The section men accompanied by several people belonging to the port walked out two miles to a place called Birch Point, where they discovered that 27 lengths of railway track had been submerged or swept into the landwash by the falling earth which descended from a steep cliff overhanging the track, carrying with it tons of large rocks, trees and stumps that grew along the waters edge. In places the earth was piled from 8 to 10 feet in height. A short distance east of Port Blandford, at the south west water chute, the track was flooded for a distance of 30 feet with an average depth of 8 feet, over which a temporary trestle had to be erected. Roadmaster Graham with a crew of 100 men did quick work and by 10 o'clock the following evening the express was over the danger zone and speeding her way towards the city. This is the worst landslide for many years in that locality. Fortunately at the time no train was passing.

SAILS FOR SYDNEY.—The S. S. Nevada which has been on dock undergoing repairs is expected to sail for North Sydney to-day.

# TO-DAY'S Messages.

## BIRRELL'S APOLOGY FOR IGNORING SINN FEIN MOVEMENT—OUTBREAK BY LAWRENCE GINNELL.

LONDON, To-day. Lawrence Ginnell, member for the North Division of Westmeath, who is classed as a Nationalist, but follows the leadership of no party, greeted the announcement of the Premier that some leaders of the Irish Rebellion had been shot, with a cry of "Huns." For some minutes he prevented Birrell from making a personal statement, and gave notice he would move a resolution calling attention to the shooting of innocent men by the British Government. Birrell, when he got a hearing, said he would have an opportunity as a private member of taking a part in the debate on the rising. He admitted he had made an untrue estimate of the Sinn Fein movement and the possibility of disturbances such as had occurred in Dublin, especially in respect to the mode of warfare which had been pursued by leaders and their dupes. Therefore at the moment he learned from General Sir John Maxwell, that the insurrection had been quelled, he placed his resignation in the hands of the Prime Minister and it had been accepted. He wished to say to his critics that the error which he acknowledged which had such a great and terrible consequence, had not proceeded from any lack of thought or consideration, or anxiety. From the outbreak of the war, he took it only as his duty to maintain unbroken, unimpaired, if possible, the position of Ireland as a whole to the common foe. In that aim he had been gallantly assisted by Redmond. He thought of nothing else, cared for nothing else, and wished for nothing else. It had been said in the House, continued the former secretary, that Ireland would be a bright spot in the Empire's hour and the country's dire necessity. He hoped it might even yet still be said to be so. He was well aware the difficulties were great and the ice thin, but he considered it to be his duty to run great risks in order to maintain Ireland and in the face of Europe, a picture of unbroken unity within the boundaries of her soil. Birrell said when he viewed the smoking ruins of Dublin and the ruins of his own beloved home, that this was no Irish rebellion, and that new bonds of union might be forged. He hoped some military might be taken from this great evil. The Prime Minister, making a note of Birrell's statement, said without prejudicing the decision which might ultimately be taken, he was sure the House had heard Birrell not without an emotion of sympathy. He assured Birrell he possessed in a peculiar degree the affection of all his colleagues.

## FORTY CASUALTIES FROM RAID.

LONDON, To-day. The Zeppelin raid covered a considerable extent of the eastern coast, and at least 5 or 6 airships actually crossed the straits. The enemy, however, made only two attempts to penetrate inland. About 100 bombs were dropped, scattered over many localities. ## NOTHING IMPORTANT ON BRITISH FRONT.

LONDON, To-day. The following official communication was issued last night: Nothing important has happened the past 24 hours. Operations on both sides have been confined to artillery actions, some of them slight, some heavy, together with mining activity. To-day we blew up three mines east of St. Etienne and at the same time bombarded the enemy trenches. There have been fairly heavy bombardments by both sides from St. Etienne to the south on a front of about 1,000 yards and also westward of Angres.

## SCHOONER SUNK.

LONDON, To-day. The British schooner Maud, of Jersey, sunk by a German submarine.

## ONE OF THE RAIDERS.

LONDON, To-day. The Zeppelin L-29 which was driven ashore at Hafslo, Norway, was one of the air fleet which raided the northeast coast of England on Tuesday night.

## FRENCH ADVANCE AT VERDUN.

PARIS, To-day. An advance of the French in the district of Deadman's Hill on the Verdun front was continued during the night, the War Office announced this afternoon. Gains made yesterday were increased and consolidated.

## CIVILIANS LEAVING METZ.

LONDON, To-day. Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent telegraphs that information which is regarded as trustworthy has been received there to the effect that Metz is being evacuated by the civil population.

## N. S. W. CRISIS OVER.

SYDNEY, To-day. The Ministry of New South Wales has decided to withdraw their resignation. An agreement has been reached whereby the question of the abolition of the Upper House will be submitted to a referendum.

## IRISH REPUBLIC STAMPS.

DUBLIN, To-day. The postage stamps prepared by the short-lived Irish Republic have been found ready for issue.

## THE TONNAGE QUESTION.

LONDON, To-day. Beresford called attention in the Lords yesterday to the depletion of tonnage of British ships needed for trade purposes, asserting that unless it were remedied it would endanger the supply of food and asking the Government to consult Labor leaders with a view of obtaining more labor for shipbuilding. In reply Curzon said the Government is now administering the whole British mercantile fleet, and that half the gross tonnage of the world. Forty three per cent British tonnage, he added, have been requisitioned for naval and military purposes. Fourteen per cent is occupied in carrying foodstuffs and raw material in behalf of the Government and its Allies, the remaining forty-three per cent being operated by British ship owners under State regulations.

Our ships are carrying supplies of coal, grain, food, timber, munitions and raw materials of all kinds to all the Allies on an unprecedented scale, continued Curzon. But for these supplies the exact balance is difficult to give, since the great number fell in uninhabited areas and some into the sea. ## SOLE SURVIVORS.

PARIS, To-day. French Official.—As a consequence of French artillery preparations at Deadman's Hill, yesterday, the statement says, two Germans surrendered, stating they were the sole survivors of the men in their trench. Elsewhere west of the Meuse, there was active fighting with artillery. The French artillery destroyed an ammunition depot at Grande Dune, Belgium.

## KAISER FEARS REVOLUTION.

LONDON, To-day. The arrest of Dr. Liebknecht, Socialist leader, in connection with the May Day demonstration in Berlin, caused great excitement among workers here and led to a fresh demonstration, which was suppressed by the police. The despatch adds it is believed the German Government will be compelled to release Liebknecht in order to prevent a revolution.

## Got Best Man to Murder Wife Who Refused Divorce.

Her to Death After Elopement! New York, April 27.—In order that Joseph Castell might be free of his wife, who would not divorce him, Frank Veteri lured Mrs. Castell to New Haven and pounded her to death with an iron bar while Castell, who had followed secretly, looked on.

All involved in the unusual crime are dead mutes. Veteri killed Mrs. Castell because of his friendship for her husband and for a slight financial gain, the police say. The men are in jail here and both confessed to-day. Mrs. Castell was struck many times. Unable to cry out, she could only struggle silently and was slowly pounded to the floor, where she was found after the men had fled. She was removed to a hospital.

The crime occurred on Sunday. She died on Monday. That her death was due to several skull fractures was determined on Tuesday. She was identified on Wednesday and the arrests followed.

## Coaxed Her To Elope.

Early to-day, after Veteri and Castell had been bribed by a hearty meal, they confessed each racing with the other to get his admissions on paper. Veteri coaxed Mrs. Castell to elope with him, on Sunday, he wrote. They went to New Haven and engaged a room. Castell followed. He crept quietly into the room and secreted himself in a clothes closet. Veteri had a light iron bar, not much heavier than a pencil. He crept upon Mrs. Castell and struck her. His weapon descended again and again until Mrs. Castell was unconscious on the floor. Meanwhile the husband peered from the closet, watching his friend free him of a wife who would not be divorced.

The mother and sister of the slain woman reported the disappearance of Mrs. Castell after her husband, who returned here, refused to Veteri best man at the wedding of Castell and the slain woman, then Mrs. Antonio Massaro, divorced and the mother of three children.

Castell recently offered his wife \$100 to permit him to get a divorce. She refused.

After arrest the men in writing their answers to police questions denied guilt for several hours. Then they wrote that if fed they would tell all.

## A Public School Cow.

We have been accustomed to look to some of the States of the Republic to the south for what might be called "freak" movements for the advancement of agriculture. But all the unusual things do not happen there. In Scotland there has been introduced what is known as the public school cow. A gentleman, interested in the training of children for farm life, has presented a cow to the public school at Kelso. The cow has grazing pasture near the school. The pupils learn expert teachers how to feed this cow, milk her in sanitary fashion, how to care for the milk, set the cream, skim it, and make it into butter. A little model dairy of a simple kind is fitted up in the school. It is a little demonstration farm, as it were, in the school, and the results, as reported, seem to be very satisfactory. The children are delightfully interested in their school work, and are growing up under a strong inclination to stick to the land. And further, the children at this school are reported to be keeping their regular school work up to the standard and doing better than most of the ordinary schools in Scotland not blessed with a public school cow. Besides this, the cow is a money-maker for the school. The butter and by-products sold bring a good price. Following the story further, one can readily imagine how interested the pupils of this school are in their cow: How its every movement is watched how much milk she gives, how much butter is made, and what it sells for. Then there is the feeding and caring for the cow. Everything done will be told to the folks at home. And one can imagine a spirit of rivalry developing among the farmers of the district to have their cows do as well as the school cow and to have their butter sell for as much as the school butter.



Description of a Battlefield

VERDUN, WOUNDED, BUT STILL UPRIGHT, STANDS LIKE A SENTINEL GUARDING THE ENTRANCE OF THE VALLEY ABOVE THE BLACKENED RUINS OF HOUSES.

Paris, April 21.—Gaston Deschamps, writing in the Temps, gives a vivid description of his visit to the Verdun front from which he has just returned. The account follows:

"The vast battlefield was veiled by a sleety rain, but Verdun, Doaumont and Le Mort Homme were vaguely outlined in the distance. Verdun, wounded, but still upright, stood like a sentinel guarding the entrance of the valley above the blackened ruins of houses, while the towers of the Cathedral rose like two outstretched arms in protest against the misery and desolation about them. The Citadel still stands unscathed.

"Villages are now abandoned and become military positions, where the further presence of civilians is impossible. The whole aspect of the vast panorama is one of intense melancholy. At intervals incendiary bombs burst among the ruins, throwing great clouds of black smoke and debris. From time to time fires were started by bombs, and here and there village houses were seen blazing through the mists, but amid all this scene of fire and explosion no human being could be seen anywhere, as it was hidden by monsters of steel which far away were working their terrible destruction. The absence of human activity added to the supreme sadness.

"One could see the ancient ruins of the old Roman camp in this vicinity, where the Romans resisted the German invaders, even Rue Mazel, the main thoroughfare of Verdun, being an ancient Roman road."

ARAB FOES.

The Arab who is fighting with the Turks in Mesopotamia has some curious ways. He takes off his shoes when he enters a house, but keeps on his hat. He reads and writes from right to left. He eats scarcely anything for breakfast or dinner, but in the evening he sits down to a hot meal swimming in oil. His sons eat with him, but the ladies of the household wait till the males have finished. The Arab rides a donkey when travelling, his wife walking behind, and he laughs at the idea of giving up his seat for a woman. The Arab has one strong virtue, and that is, he is rarely seen drunk. He is not very affectionate, is very ignorant, and has so little initiative that he rarely takes on anything worth doing, or attempts to carry out any enterprise.
