Latest Rumours !

The latest political rumours going around town this week is to the effect that Hon. Sir E. Bowring has been offered the Governorship of Newfoundland, but so far has not de-cided on accepting the offer. That Hon. R. A. Squires is to be made High Commissioner in London for Nfid. That Hon. Mr. Warren is to be Colonial Secretary and Minister of Justice, and that Hon. W. F. Coaker will be Premier, Minister of Marine and Fisheries and Chairman of Railway Commission. Where these rumousr came from we are not prepared to say, but for weeks past rumours similar to the above have been going around. Whether they are true or not time alone will tell. No one would be surprised if Mr. Coaker dropped his second anchor in the prime Minister's office, for is it not a fact that the "skipper" and mate left the old ship over 4 months ago and she has been drifting and there are breakers ahead, and she is almost upon "white nape shoals," and the storms are gathering around her, and darkness and distress is gathering over the land and the old ship is almost dashed to pieces. Yet there is hope. To the rescue then? Where is the brave man to come forward and board the old ship of state, give her "more chain" and save her from commercial disaster before it is too late?-Trinity Enterprise



In the fish business the Union Export Co. is offering for fish delivered at Port Union better prices than can be obtained either in St. John's or here. The company offers \$11 for choice Spanish grade, \$10 for merchantable, \$8 for Madeira, \$8 for choice Labrador, and \$7 for prime Labrador. The sale of fish here is slow, and certain kinds are unsaleable. Heavily-salted shore fish can find no sale, and a small quantity of that make offered in St. John's could fetch but \$4 a quintal. Large late caught Labrador, of good grade has been sold in small quantities at \$10 a quintal. An exporter in Carbonear seems to have been the chief buyer of shore fish this fall in this locality. Respecting the Regulations: Can It be said that they are the direct and only cause of the slackness in the fish trade? Are there no other causes that tend to make a depression in trade generally, such as the unsettled conditions existing on the other side of the water? We cannot expect to have the trade keep up to the same extent it did during the war, and undoubtedly our inability to continue on that basis, is the primary cause of the present depression. If codfish is worth the price quoted by the Union Trading Company should it not be of the same value to the exporters in St. John's? If the Union Company requires the fish, cannot it purchase it here and elsewhere as well as at Port Union? These are questions that seem reasonable to ask in the face of the reports about the



The Meaning of Unbiased Opinion.

Editor Evening Telegram Dear Sir .-- I have often wondered what "Unbiased Opinion" meant, but yesterday in your paper Mr. P. J. Kinsella explained it so clearly that I am no longer in doubt. It means, according to Mr. Kinsella, a mind that can see all the misery and suffering on one side, and none on the other. Truly Mr. Kinsella has a wonderfully lucid way of explaining a difficult question. In one place he mildly suggests (of course he's utterly unbiased), that the document captured the other day may have been prepared for Sir Hamar Greenwood by enemies of Irish freedom. What an artful idea!

Again he says "It is of course well known to-day, and admitted by some English writers and unbiased historians of the Irish movement, that the atrocities said to be a part of the Sinn Fein effort to secure freedom for Ire-

land, have been traced to the ignoble manner of reprisals carried on daily by the "Black and Tan" and other determined factions to the detriment of the Irishman at home and abroad " Mr. Kinsella carefully overlooks the fact that reprisals cannot take place with out cause, for the word means retaliation; but perhaps Mr. Kinsella doesn' know this, for if he does, his argument is an admission that the "Black and Tan" has had cause. 

Canadian Merchant Marine.

We were informed recenty by Mr. J. W. N. Johnstone, Newfoundland representative of the C.G.M.M. Ltd. that of the 101 boats contracted for by the Canadian Government, 35 had already been delivered. Two cf these boats, the Canadian Miner and the Canadian Sealer, will be put on the Halifax-St. John's route, and a weekly service will be maintained starting on December 17th. Each of these two boats has capacity for 18,000 barrels. The first -passenger ship of the line is the Canadian Fisher, which will be commanded by Capt. John Randell. This boat will have accomodation for 30 first-class passengers and will ply between Halifax and the West Indies. It has a dead weight capacity of 5,100 tons. The Canadian Government Merchant Marine Ltd. also intends to conduct a regular steamship service between Halifax and Real. Santos. Monte Video and Buenos Aires. The S.S.

New sapphire mines in the Rocky Mountains produce stones which touch the whole color scale from blue and red to an exquisite purple. In Rhodesia is found a topaz of a most lovely pale blue. Yet the chemical composition of the gem proves it to be identical in all but color with the yellow topaz. The colors of most gems are more or less fugitive. That is, under certain circumstances they are liable to fade. Take two rubies exactly similar, shut one in the dark, and leave the other exposed to full sunlight, and, at the end of two years there will be a distinct difference between them. The one that has been exposed to the light will be decidedly paler than the other. Similar results may be observed with both emeralds and sapphires. Garnets also will turn light er, while in the case of the topaz sunlight ends by dimming and dulling the color of this pretty stone.


