The prevailing conception of the physical universe has gradually evolvman the cosmos, of course, was anthropocentric—a natural deduction from the circularity of the horizon and intellectual progress the universe was, Perhaps she had avoided him for no doubt, centred in restricted areas on the surface of the Earth rather than in the individual, and man adoptcosmos was perceived to be larger than formerly: and with each subsequent step in the widening of mental horizon, greater physical dimensions have been found. To Ptolemy and his school the universe was no longer lococentric but geocentric; and since the time of Copernicus the Sun, as the dominating body of the solar system, has been considered to be at or near centric view of the universe for the last four centuries.

The researches of recent times have again changed the conception of the scale of the visible universe, and of the position of its centre. Neither the individual, nor his abode, nor his earth, nor his sun has now the dignity of a central place. For one thing, the solar system is slightly to the north side of the central plane of the Milky Way and is increasing the distance from that plane as time goes on. In addition, as previously noted, we are at least six hundred centuries of light-travel from the central region of the Milky Way. (A light year-the distance which a ray of light will travel in one year-is about six trillion miles.)





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

which I equals the momentum, M equals the mass (or weight) of the car and V equals the speed.

Since it is momentum which tends to keep the car going and which must he sharhed by the brakes or other wise, before the car can be stopped, it will be seen that, given the same retarding effect, a car weighing four thousand pounds will require double the braking effect to be brought to a stop as that necessary for a car weighing but two thousand pounds.

By the same formula, we observe that if we double our speed, we in crease the stopping distance required, if we are traveling, for example, at nine times the distance in which to stop that would be necessary if we were traveling at only ten miles an

Now, although it is very evident from the above that speed exerts a tremendous influence on the effort required to stop a moving automobile, the factors of brake condition, driving ability and nature of the road surface are equally important. However, except insofar as some motor vehicle laws require periodic brake inspection, safety and care in driving are almost entirely translated, in the public mind and in the law, into miles per hour. There is no other reference to the really vital factor of "how quickly can the car be stopped."

Not only that, but, in order to avoid the possibility of unfair persecution of the automobilist, the laws of many that evidence must be to indicate that the motorist exceeded the speed limit for a sustained distance of one-eighth of a mile in the city or one-quarter of a one of the purposes of this provision is to enable the motorist to overtake a slow lumbering vehicle ahead of him by means of a short burst of speed which will keep him on the wrong side of the road for a minimum

The usual means for enforcing the speed laws is the "motorcycle con." The motorcycle is a two-wheel vehicle. As such it is not as steady on its legs as is its four-wheel prey. So long as it is the inability to stop in time which is the cause of most accidents and the reason for all speed laws, let us go directly to the source of the trouble. Let us require that every car shall be driven only at such rate that it may be brought to a complete standstill within specified distances; these distances varying with country and city driving conditions much as do the variable speed rates now permitted. We would stipulate, for example, two hundred feet as the required stopping distance on an open country road; fifty feet in some sections of the city; even fifteen or twenty feet in the more congested portions. We could mark all school streets as "ten foot zones" indicating that on such streets the motorist must have his car under such control at all be much simpler and more effective





(I.C.M.) The contrast between country and city life is very marked, and though the distance of a country village from a city may not be great, yet the customs of the one are entirely opposite to those of the other.

This was impressed upon us in our ramblings of Wednesday last, when. with a party of eight, we motored along the rural byways of the Southern Shore, and in the vicinity of Mobile and Tor's Cove, we revelled in the glories of rushing rivers and mountain heights. We had everything in our favour, and for the time being we had dismissed dull care, and our pleasure was increased by the good conditions of the roads. A good road, and a good car, and good companions have a lot to do with the enjoyment of a holiday outing. Thus we had the best of it, but as we sped along, and had just begun the descent of one of the long hills of the locality, we saw in the distance a slowly moving procession coming towards us.

To us, at such a time and place, a procession was the furthest thing from our thoughts, for we had left the city and its throngs far behind us. What could it be? Soon our musings were answered,, and we saw that it was a funeral procession which claimed its share of the somewhat narrow road. With respect and reverence we slowed down and halted, and the engine ceased its vibration, and a solemn silence fell upon us-for were we not in the presence of death? The situation seemed peculiar. But a moment before we had abandoned all serious thoughts, and seemed to claim the full stretch of the hill and the whole width of the road for ourselves. We thought we had full right of way, but not so. The cortege of death had equal and greater rights that we had; hence our insignificance for the mo-

This we felt, for the roadway being narrow, the cortege passed closely to us, nor was there more than eighteen inches to spare between the hearse and the motor car. We say "the hearse," but not such as we of the city are accustomed. The hearse which claimed the road with us was but a small country dray, and the horse which drew it was of the same class. The coffin was untrimmed, but was decently covered with a blue fabric. On the coffin was laid a cross of almost equal length, and which the driver, who walked, raised as the cortege passed us. The cross was covered with the same material as the coffin. The driver's robe was solemnly impressive, and it reminded us that not all the traditions of our fathers are forgotten.

Some twenty-five men and lads comprised the funeral procession. We thought that perhaps it was some stranger who was being buried, but from the last man of the number who followed, we learned that it was one of the villagers-one of the fishermen. And so the procession slowly climbed the hill, where, towards the sea, the little cemetery is situated, and there with the fathers of the hamlet they laid their humble brother to rest.

different from pleasure-seeking, that it set us thinking, hence our notes. There was not much display. It was all plain. It was village-like and natural. "No boast of heraldry, nor pomp of pride." It was a becoming tribute to a humble life. It had nothing of what the world would call great. It was all sincere, nor did it admit of any of the tinsel of superficial society.

But it presented one feature which outshone all earthly greatness, and which outlasts all time and which imparts confidence and hope to the children of men. It was the cross. Only the cross. Not a gilded cross, nor a polished cross. It looked almost nude, but it was a cross all the same, and is an emblem of that life which lies beyond. We do not know why the driver raised the cross as the cortege passed our company, nor would we probably have noticed it only for his action. Perhaps it was slipping off the coffin, but it impressed us and appealed to our better selves and sanctified the incident as far as we

were concerned. With the passing of the cortege we resumed our journey, and the panting of the engine called off our minds from the incident. But we had learned a lesson. We had had to stop, and whether we liked it or not, we had to wait. The unexpected had happened. (to be continued.)



HINTON FLEW OVER HOSTI JUNGLES - PENETRATED L MILES UP THE BRANCA RIVE Graphic details of obstacles over ome and perils braved by the Ham ilton Rice/Expedition in penetration the Brazilian jungles nearly 1,00 niles to the furthermost sources the Branca River were told recent for the first time by Capt. A. W. Ste ens, official photographer of the en ploring party, who returned to No York Monday evening on the steam Polynarp, with John W. Swanso radio chief of the expedition.

It was a tale simply told by a gaun sun-blacked man in whose blood m still lurk a few of the fever germs the claimed the life of one of the adve turesome white men and laid its bli tering touch on practically all the others. To the grit of Walter Hinton one of the NC-4 pilots and skipper The World seaplane that flew fr New York to South America, it po particular tribute.

Hinton piloted the Curtiss Seas flying boat, from which Capt. St. ens mapped the Branca River with Fairchild aerial camera and mad possible the ultimate success of t expedition. He was racked with current malaria, nauseated, dizzy, b he stuck to his cockpit and flew to t head waters of the Branca-120 mile farther into the jungle than the hard iest explorers ever had been. T rest of the expedition, guided by Hi ton and Stevens's maps, are now pre sing on to this spot and will not r turn to North America before July. Made Flight Unarmed.

Stevens spoke mostly of Hinton duck, but admitted the two of the ad laid aside even their revolvers order to carry more fuel and increa the distance they might fly over country where they knew lurked he tile Indians with poison tipped rows. Several women fainted during the scenes of wild excitement which attended this dramatic break in the meeting. Individuals, representatives of the two factions, clashed verbally at the door of the church and on the street, sex being no deterrent to wordy combats.

As the anti-Unionists walked out of St. Paul's Church, the George Street United Baptish Church, across the street, was thrown open by the pastor, Rev. I. A. Corbett, and the continuing Presbyterians were invited to go into that building. This they did and held a meeting when immediate steps were taken towards the establishment of a congregation of the Continuing Presyterian Church of Canada in Freder-

There were more than 150 in the body of anti-Unionists, who walked out of the St. Paul's congregational meeting as a dramatic protest, and it. was claimed there were many more antis who had refused to attend the congregational meetings and therefore were not present.

Anti-Unionists, it developed, conended that the congregational meeting held at St. Paul's last evening had not been legally called. They maintained that the meeting of the session when the meeting was arranged for was not legal because all the members of the ession had not been noti-

They also contended that the notice of the congregational meeting had not been given as prescribed, and they had other reason why they maintained the meeting was not a legal meeting. It was asserted that anti-Unionists on the Session had not been notified of the meeting of Session.

#### Pastor's Explanation.

They contended they were entitled o have information upon these various points. They insisted the Pastor could not be the Chairman. On the other hand, Rev. 


