Tilton-Beecher Scandal.

BEECHER'S STATEMENT.

[The following is the first part of Beecher's statement, the concluding portion of which we gave yesterday.] GENTLEMEN OF THE COMMITTEE - In the statement addressed to the public on the 22nd of July last, I gave an explicit, comprehensive, and solemn denial to the charges made by Theodore Tilton against me.

Four years ago, Theodore Tilton fell from one of the proudest editorial chairs in America, where he represented the cause of religion, humanity and patriotism, and in a few months thereafter he became the associate and representative of Victoria C. Woodhull, and the friend of her strange cause.

Whether the unfortunate man, who so unwittingly brought sorrow to two families, and exposed himself to a course of the law, will ever be found alive, remains to be seen. He is still at large, and every effort is being made to find out his whereabouts.

New York, Aug. 14. - The morning papers are freely and favorably quoted on Beecher's statement. The Tribune heads the article "At last the truth," and closes by saying: "The statement will measurably clear away the clouds that have been dark and thick about Beecher's name."

The Herald says: "It is strong, and perhaps will be accepted by Mr. Beecher as his vindication, but the public will not accept it as a formal dismission of the case."

The Sun says: "Mr. Beecher shows a courage and determination to fight for his life on every point of view."

The World takes the ground that Beecher has made out his case and proved his innocence.

New York, Aug. 14. - Tilton was asked to-day if he should answer Beecher's statement, and replied: "It needs no other answer than the one which was written by Moulton a week ago, and which for the sake of peace Moulton withheld from the Committee."

The suppressed statement must now come forth; all fair-minded men should demand its publication. Moulton can no longer with respect withhold it.

Mr. Moulton has tried to serve Beecher for four years. Frank Moulton holding the documents in my hands has compelled me to compromise my case in Mr. Beecher's behalf, and now for Beecher to turn at last on Moulton, and publicly to bear false witness against the most faithful of friends, to speak evil as he does against one of the truest hearted men that ever breathed, to denounce a rich, generous and princely man like Frank Moulton as a blackmailer, all this time leaving my own self entirely out of the case, shows Beecher to have been guilty not only of the original criminality of



which I charged him, but of a subsequent ingratitude to a friend who rescued him from suicide four years ago, and who from that time to this has been his chief shield from public reproach. The attack on Moulton is base beyond parallel. Moulton has only to tell the plain facts just as I suppose he has written them in his full and complete statement, and the result will be to annihilate Beecher's denials of adultery, and to leave him in the attitude of a desperate man, who to save himself from the truth has resorted to an array of falsehoods which I cannot characterize by any other word than infamous.

New York, Aug. 15th.—The comments of the morning papers are generally favorable to Beecher. All regard the blackmailing features of the case as damaging if not fatal to the Tilton party, while Beecher is censured for submitting to it, thus supporting in the minds of many the theory of his guilt. Beecher's church regard his vindication as complete, and are greatly overjoyed.

#### The Governor's Visit.

As we stated yesterday, the Governor General will be in Guelph this day week. He is expected to arrive about 2 o'clock. Mr. Lemon has intimated to the Council that he will give the use of his residence to His Excellency and party during his stay in Guelph over Sunday, and the Council thankfully accepted the offer. At their meeting last night they appointed the necessary committees to carry out the arrangements connected with his arrival and stay in town; and at the meeting on Monday night they will, it is expected, be in a position to report to the Council what steps they have taken in the departments assigned them. They will also determine at this meeting what shape the reception shall take, and what sort of entertainment will be accorded to His Excellency on the day of his arrival. He will remain in Guelph from Saturday afternoon till Monday forenoon, and will then proceed to Toronto.

It is said that the Hon. Mr. Ross, Speaker of the Quebec Legislative Council, has sent in his resignation, and that it has been accepted.

The Belleville *Intelligencer*, as well as some other Tory papers, is much exercised over the fact that the St. John Freeman gets the patronage of Government advertising, and abuses Mr. Speaker Anglin roundly on that account, accusing him of violating the "Independence of Parliament." The editor of the *Intelligencer* must surely have forgotten that he himself, not many months ago, while a member of Parliament, received the Government advertisements.

THE STANDARD REVUEK.—The Hour, the Junior Conservative organ in London, England, attacks the Standard for its misrepresentations of the present Dominion Government in two articles on the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Reciprocity Treaty, respectively, in which it accuses them of an unbecoming tendentiousness. It says that it would be unfortunate if the impression were permitted to prevail that the opinions and attitude of English Conservatives towards Canada are fairly represented by the articles of the Standard, and adds that at a time when all parties in the Dominion are at one in recognizing the high imperial spirit of the colonial policy of the present Conservative Government, it is peculiarly inopportune for an English Conservative paper to allow itself to be made the agent or tool of a narrow clique, and to denounce the Ministry which has secured in an almost unparalleled degree the confidence of the whole people of Canada, because they do not bear the name of Conservative.

WEST GABARINA RATES.—The following rates have been levied by-law:—6 and 7-tenths mills in the 8 county rate; 4 and 5-tenths mills Credit V. B. W. rate; 1 mill to equal Gov. school grant; 1 mill for the working expenses of the municipality; and 2 mills for the improvement of roads and bridges.—Total amount 15 and 2-tenths mills.

EVERTON MILLS.—We learn that Mr. Rufus Everts has sold the above mills to Mr. Henry Hortop, who will in future carry on the business of custom and mercantile work. Mr. Hortop has had long experience in milling, and as he intends to go into the business with spirit, his removal to Everton will be of benefit to the village and surrounding section, as we hope it will be to himself.

ACCIDENT AT COLLINGWOOD.—As Mr. Hugh Wallace, of the 8th con. Collingwood, was driving in his wagon on Thursday last, a runaway team came suddenly upon him, leaped upon the wagon, and the necky heaving loose struck Mr. Wallace on the head, the bolt penetrating the skull, besides inflicting other serious injuries. Dr. Maclean, of Meaford, was telegraphed for, and on reaching the scene, performed, with the assistance of Dr. Hunt, the operation called trepanning, taking out the piece of bone that was found pressing on the brain. Mr. Wallace was at once restored to consciousness, and notwithstanding the number and severity of his injuries his medical attendants have good hopes of his recovery.

**THE GOVERNOR'S VISIT TO BERLIN.**—We learn from the *Telegraph* that as soon as word was sent that the Governor was to visit Berlin the Mayor and the Warden took steps to give him a fitting reception. It is expected that His Excellency will remain in Berlin sufficiently long to receive addresses both from the Town and County Councils. It is also expected that a guard of honor, composed of the volunteers, will receive Lord Dufferin at the railway station, after which the party will be driven through the town and thence to the Town Hall, which will be appropriately decorated and festooned for the occasion, and will there be presented with the addresses.

**T. G. & B. RAILWAY.**—The *Harriston Tribune* says:—"The work on this road, for as grading and building are concerned, is now about complete. The contractors have had an engine and gang of men waiting for over a week, for the Western Co. to put in the crossing over the road, in order to allow them to proceed with the track laying; but although the diamond is made and lying in Hamilton, the Western Co. persist in refusing to put it in. This, we think, is unnecessary stubbornness on the part of the Western, as it will only result in the T. G. & B. Railway Co. forcing the right of way in the end, and is entailing an unnecessary loss to the contractors, as well as disappointment and loss to the section of country through which it passes.

**WANTED WHIPPING.**—A young married man living in Listowel who has been frequently in the habit of abusing his family, was brought to his senses in a summary manner a short time ago. He had been whipping them in such a manner that the wife and child had to seek refuge in a neighbouring hotel, and some of the villagers present becoming acquainted with the state of affairs armed themselves with strong whips and proceeded at once to inflict summary punishment upon him for his brutal conduct. He begged for mercy, and promised to amend for the future, and after giving him about a score of good smart whacks, and breaking their whip, he was permitted to go; being first told that wife abuse was never allowed in Listowel, nor never will be; and admonished that if his offence was repeated, the dose of whelbone syrup would be doubled on the next occasion.

**GUN ACCIDENT IN ORANGETHURST.**—Mr. Thomas Middleton, son of Mr. W. J. Middleton, of Orangethirst, met with a serious accident on Friday, 7th inst. He had gone out shooting in company with a friend, and seeing a black squirrel fired at it. He proceeded to reload the gun, a double barreled one, on a log, and while ramming home the charge the weapon slipped, the hammer striking the log, and causing the gun to go off. The charge first shattered the left hand fearfully, blowing off a portion of the thumb and otherwise injuring the fingers, and then passed upwards along the breast, close by the ear, and out of the rim of his hat. A package of loose powder which was in his pocket at the time was ignited by the explosion but fortunately did no other injury than destroying a portion of his clothes. With the assistance of his comrade he managed to reach home, where he received medical aid. He is progressing favorably.

**SUDDEN DEATH.**—The *Listowel Banner* says:—"We this week have to record the sudden death of Mr. Robert Gray, of this village, aged 19 years. He had been out working during harvest, had overworked himself, and probably partaken too freely of cold water while overheated, and inflammation of the bowels set in. He came home on Monday evening, and died on Tuesday evening about six o'clock. He was a very steady, exemplary young man, and his loss is severely felt by his sorrowing father and sisters.
