ANOTHER DAY'S RECORD. CONTINUATION OF RIOTING AND BLOODSHED IN IRELAND.

Deaths of the Mob. Limerick and Dublin. The rioting in Limerick, on Monday, was the most serious since the 17th of last month.

The news from London this morning is not of an encouraging nature, although the tendency to riot is not so marked as during the two previous days.

Limerick was the scene of considerable disturbance during yesterday and last night, but the latest news from there reports the city quiet at midnight.

An immense meeting in Boston last night, at which the mayor presided, Wendell Phillips also addressed the meeting.

The Montreal meeting called for last night was postponed on account of the inclement weather.

The Paris clerical press has condemned the Irish arrests. The Irishmen in the action were among the speakers.

London, Oct. 17.—Parnell is in the prison infirmary with Dillon, Sexton and O'Brien.

Gladstone is indisposed. The 22nd regiment has been ordered to Ireland.

The Pall Mall Gazette says the arrests of O'Brien and Quinn are meant to show that the government will tolerate no form of intimidation.

It is proposed to start a fund for the maintenance of state prisoners. Members of the league claim Arthur O'Connor as having been recently thoroughly instructed in the management of the whole affairs of the league.
