The control of the part of the

return of the Bank of England nave induced an expectation that the rates of the Bank of England will soon be reduced. The divergence between the outside rate and the rate of the Bank of England is abnormally large, against which is the unsatisfactory position of the bank in regard to the gold supply and the slackness in the demand for money due to the sudden check of speculation. A monotonous dullness prevailed on the Stock Exchange, during the week. Nobody was selling and nobody was buying, the public holding aloof. The absence of a definite improvement in continental politics is the main cause of slackness in business. No prospect of speedy change is apparent. The Bulgarian difficulty appears for the moment to be a shade nearer solution. The reduction of the bank rate at Berlin indicates that there is no fear of immediate difficulty. But the main fact cannot be challenged, that all the great powers are preparing for emergencies. American railroad securities were active, but weak. There were large sales yesterday on Paris accounts. The English public is quiescent. Americans are steadily absorbing all the stocks offered. When the market is cleared of the securities which the banks threw out at the close of the year an improvement is expected, as is usual after New York has absorbed London's surplus holdings.
