That Bicycle Railway.

A good deal of speculation is going on as to what is meant by the application that has been filed at Ottawa for a charter to construct a bicycle railway from Cape Breton to Winnipeg. The two points that are designated as the terminals of the proposed line are not the centres of much population, and the public is at a loss to locate the reason that exists for connecting them. As to the style of railway that 48 proposed to be built, that is of a novel kind and has not yet been practically adopted elsewhere. Last Sunday's New York Press,





TRINITY'S ROYAL ARMS

Stolen From New York a Century Ago by Col. Beverley Robinson and Others —Now in St. John, N. 18, What has become of the Royal Arms of England that once-more than a century ago-adorned the interior of Old Trinity

Church? asks The New York Press. That they disappeared during the Revolutionary war no one disputes; but the names of those responsible and the present address of the "lion and the unicorn" are questions which have hitherto remained unanswered. The mystery, however, has been recently cleared

Briefly, the story runs thus: Three United Empire Loyalists—Lieutenant Colonel John Peters, Major William Hazen and Colonel Beverley Robinson—upon the withdrawal of the British forces from New York, were the city. That night they forced an entrance into Trinity Church and took there-

a boat belonging to a vessel anchored in the harbor.

The trio then left the city, taking different directions, while the Rev. Mr. Peters sailed to Boston, with his prize carefully concealed in a mattress. Arriving there, the arms were placed for safe-keeping in the council chamber of the Old Town House until March 17, 1776, when they were shipped to Halifax, N.S., where they remained 15 years in the citadel chapel. In the meantime Col. Peters, Major Hazen and Col. Robinson, in company with a large number of fellow-Loyalists, settled at Parr Town (now St. John, N.B.), and there built themselves a church, which received the name of Trinity.

In 1791 the Royal Arms were removed from Halifax to St. John on board a British man-of-war and nailed upon the walls of the new church.







Editor World: I notice in The World of Saturday last a short article printed upon Saturday last a short article printed upon the same lines as many others that have appeared from time to time in almost every paper in Toronto, with reference to the toil gates in the York roads, in which the "hayseeds," as they are called, are severely taken to task for their existence. As I have on various occasions shown, in the presence of reporters for Toronto papers, the true history of the Tollgate and Lake Shore-road question as between the city and county, and as, owing either to neglect or because the question as between the city and county, and as, owing either to neglect or because the newspapers were not willing to give the true inwardness of these matters publicity, a notice, giving justice to both sides of the question has invariably been omitted, I take the liberty of asking you to insert this letter. In the first place, as the member for East York (a "bay-sasi" constituency) is quite well aware there are many municipalities in the county which do not touch upon any of the York roads, while there are many others the greater portion of the inhabitants of which hardly ever use them. For this reason it is very difficult to formulate an equitable scheme for the maintenance of these roads, most people believing that those who use them should pay for them. However, a motion was made in 1890 by which the county resolved to abolish toll-gates upon all the roads owned by it on which tolls were levied, on condition that the city would abolish market fees, except in which tolls were levies, of condition that the city would abolish market fees, except in the cattle market. The City Council passed a resolution agreeing to this. An agreement was afterwards drawn out by me, which was approved of by the City Solicitor and engrossed in his office and returned to me for the county. That agreement is the county. That agreement approved of by the City Solicitor and engrossed in his office and returned to me for execution by the county. That agreement had attached to it the seal of the Corporation of the County of York, together with the signatures of the then Warden and the Clerk. I sent it back to the City Solicitor to be executed by the city. The seal of the Corporation of the City of Toronto was annexed to the agreement. Afterwards, for some reason unknown to me (or to anybody else, so far as I have been able to discover), the city seal was torn off and the mutilated document, after several demands made by me, was returned with the curt information that the Mayor decided not to carry it out. The original paper shows where the seal of the city had been but is not now. It is at the present moment in my office, and can be seen by any person interested.

which had been prepared in my office, or any other document on the same lines. The consequence of this has been that the city, seeing that on account of the bargain they had made with the Toronto Railway Company, they were absolutely bound in their own interest to own this part of the Lake Shore-road at any cost, had to take it over for its entire length, including the bridge over the Humber. In addition to this they paid the county \$650 in cash, and have subsequently been ordered to pay an award of \$3500 taw costs. The agreement to take over the road upon the terms which I have last mentioned was executed by the city and county would both endeavor to procure legislation to validate and confirm the contract. Last session it came up before the Private Bills Committee, when the Mayor, backed by the City Solicitor, with an utter disregard of what should have been considered good faith between corporations or individuals, did his best to have the agreement thrown out by the committee. They were unsuccessful in this, however, and having made their cake were forced by the Legislature to eat it. Perhaps a knowledge of these facts, with reference to only two of the many negotiations and bargaius made between the city and the county, will give you and your readers some insight as to which of the two corporations acts in the more generous, honorable and business-like manner.


