VOTING DAY WILL BE JUNE 1

CITY COUNCIL ALTERS THE DATE OF CIVIC ELECTIONS.

Street Pavements Sanctioned Yesterday—Cobbles Company's Application to Be Re-considered—Many Charities Will Lose Their Grants.

The Mayor presided at the meeting of the council yesterday afternoon. All the members were present, save Ald. Hallam, Murray and Rowe. The principal business was regarding the four light-plant in order to alter the date from May 25 to June 1. Ald. Davies made an unavailing attempt to have the rate of interest of the debentures changed from 4 to 3 1/2 per cent. \$60,081 were passed.

There was a long discussion relative to the value of the Esplanade site deeded for manufacturing purposes to the Cobble Company. The Mayor moved that the Board of Works be authorized to explore the value of the lot was endorsed by council.

Island Telephone Extension. The Bell Telephone Company, writing, stating that they desired to extend the telephone service from Hamilton to Centre Island, is instructed to locate the poles.

The City Engineer drew the attention of the council to the fact that a portion of the lake shore and sidewalk near the Lighthouse on the Island had been damaged by waves, and asking that immediate steps be taken to repair the damage.

Street Car Routes. Ald. Jolliffe and Burns moved: That the Engineer be requested to consider the advisability of running the Queen-street cars southerly in Bay-street, and southerly in Richmond-street to Yonge-street, and the Yonge-street cars southerly in Slater-street and southerly in Church-street, for the purpose of relieving the traffic at the corner of Yonge and Queen-streets.

The motion of Ald. McMurtry to report on the advisability of forming a car route from Yonge-street to Bathurst and from Front-street to Union Station was referred to the Board of Works.

C.P.R. Station in King Street. Ald. Allen and Burns carried a motion that the City Solicitor notify the Canadian Pacific Railway Company that the right of way for the extension of the passenger station by the company at the crossing of the line of King-street by the railway tracks along the Don improvement has expired, and ask for the erection of such station and its maintenance, as provided by the agreement between the city and the company.

Esplanade Leases and Other Topics. Ald. Burns and Hubbard carried a resolution that the City Engineer be requested to report on the advisability of forming a car route from Yonge-street to Bathurst and from Front-street to Union Station was referred to the Board of Works.

Some Very Radical Suggestions for Efficiency and Economy. The Executive Committee yesterday deferred consideration of the report of the committee on efficiency and economy until the estimates are before them at a special meeting, to be held next Friday afternoon and evening.

The sub-committee did not endorse the scheme of the Ratepayers' Association to form a bank and building for the poor. The present was deemed an inopportune time for the large expenditure the plan would entail.

Three Suggestions. The sub-committee recommended: 1. That no civic grants be made either on national or religious grounds; 2. That where two institutions are engaged in similar work one of them should be struck off the list; 3. That the grants to all institutions for the maintenance of homeless children, with the exception of those of the Children's Aid Society, be discontinued.

To Less Their Grants. The City Relief Officer recommended that all civic grants be withdrawn from the under-mentioned societies and institutions: Salvation Army Children's Shelter, Salvation Army Men's Shelter, Salvation Army Prison Date Work, Infants' Home, Convalescent Home, St. Nicholas Home, Newboys' Lodging, Hospital Home, Night Shelter for Women, Toronto Relief Society, Toronto Industrial Room, Industrial Room Society, Toronto Benevolent Society, Hebrew Society, Hospital of St. John the Divine.

To Get Reduced Grants. House of Providence, Protestant Orphan Home, Haven, Girls' Home, Industrial Refuge, West End, Army Women's Home, Old Folks' Home, Church Home, Salvation Army Women's Home. There is an increase of \$1000 recommended for the House of Industry, which increase is for an increase of \$28,000, an increase of \$44 for the Boys' Home and of \$888 for Sunnyside Orphanage.

Dr. S. G. Thompson, E. J. Barwick and Charles Sheard recommended as follows: 1. That sick persons who are not confined to bed shall, if applying for hospital relief, be examined personally by the Medical Health Officer, or his deputy, who alone shall issue certificates recommending such patients for hospital admission, and such certificates of recommendation shall be the only certificates to be accepted by the Medical Health Department in justification of the issuing of the hospital order.

PEOPLE OF NEW GUINEA.

Like primitive man the Papuans live, and like American savages they adorn themselves. Their women are, to be sure, putting palm-leaf skirts around them, now that England, through its trade-seeking merchants, is taking some interest in that far off and hitherto little known country, but the warriors—the males who do not light—still cling to the primitive habits of nature in the matter of dress.

Sir William McGregor, K.C.M.G., to whom England and the English speaking world is indebted for nearly all of the recent knowledge of British New Guinea, is now visiting England preparatory to starting on another tour of exploration—"inspection" he prefers to call it.

Such of the country of New Guinea, it seems, is mountainous, and most of Sir William's explorations were carried on at a height of from 10,000 to 13,000 feet above sea level.

Between the Chinese and the Papuans—the least civilized to-day certainly of South Sea natives—there naturally be a wide gulf fixed. It has been thought a wise thing in managing the Papuans, to investigate and comprehend their traditions, customs and ways of life generally. A general line of custom runs through the people, but that line is subject to all manner of variations. Polygamy is common, and is based on the theory that the more wives a man has the more comfortable he will be.

The description of the marriage customs in one division of the territory would seem to indicate that the "advanced woman" is not necessarily a product of the highest civilization. In that part the Papuan woman takes the initiative, sending for the man of her choice, who comes and takes her away. Her relatives organize a demonstration, and demand in return a sister of the bridegroom for wife to a youth of their family. Thus it is a case of fair exchange; but it is surely rather when, if there is no available sister, a payment in currency—shells' teeth, say—is taken as substitute.

MONEY IN PEANUTS.

Ten Million Dollars Spent Annually in America for This "Fruit."

A man incidentally asked a street vander if his peanuts were first-class, and the response to the inquiry was surprising, says The Chicago Tribune. "No," said the vander. "You do not get first-class peanuts in this country in this way. The best peanuts are used for other purposes. They are made into meal and grits by scientific means, and in Germany they are prepared for the hospitals. The peanuts you get in candy are the very poorest grade, and some of the 'burnt almonds' you get are nothing more than fourth-rate peanuts."

"Where did the peanut come from?" "From Central and South America. They grow here in long pods, and the pods contain from four to five kernels. They were carried to the old world in the early days, and in the seventeenth century they constituted the chief staple of Africa. You will find if you look it up that the slave negroes of Africa in those days used to load their ships with peanuts to be used as food for their human cargoes. The negroes who were imported from Africa to this country brought over the peanut and they were scattered and first grown in Virginia. And now this country is raising the crop, and, owing to American shrewdness, the nut is ground and used for various purposes, and shipped all over the world.

"I reckon you know," the vander continued, "that peanuts in certain quantities are more nutritious than beef. When specially prepared they contain as much oil as the finest olive oil. In fact, one druggist admitted some of the 'olive oil' now sold in this country is nothing more than peanut oil. Nearly all of the olive oil sold in the United States is mixed with part of the peanut. Peanuts furnish from 30 to 50 per cent of the weight of their kernels in oil. Sometimes peanut oil is used for lighting and again it is used to advantage in the making of soap, and as a lubricant in machine shops.

The American peanut is larger and better than any other, but it does not contain so much oil as the African nut. The "cake" which is left after extracting the oil makes excellent feed for cattle, and is used very largely for that purpose in Germany, where it sells for \$30 to \$35 a ton.
