EFFECTIVE JUNE 1st, 1924

Public Utilities Commission, Watford, Ontario

Attention Mr. W. H. Shrapnell, Sec. Dear Sirs:—

I am instructed by the Commission to advise you that after investigating the operating conditions of your System during the year, it has been decided that from June 1st, the Commission will bill your Municipality for power supplied at the rate of \$60.00 per horsepower per year.

I am also instructed to advise you that the Commission authorized the adoption of the following schedule of rates:—

Domestic Lighting

The present floor area charge shall be discontinued.

Service Charge 30c net to all Domestic consumers.

4c per kw-hr for the first 60 kw-hrs. used per month.

2c per kw-hr. for all additional consumption per month.

Prompt Payment Discount 10%.

Minimum Net Monthly Bill \$1.00.

Commercial Lighting

8c per kw-hr. for the first 50 hours' use per month of connected load or maximum demand.

4c per kw-hr. for the second 50 hours' use per month of connected load or maximum demand.

1c per kw-hr. for all additional monthly consumption.

Prompt Payment Discount 10%.

Minimum Net Monthly Bill \$1.00.

Power

\$1.00 per horsepower per month of connected load or maximum demand.

5.6c per kw-hr. for the first 50 hours' use per month of connected load or maximum demand.

3.8c per kw-hr. for the second 50 hours' use per month of connected load or maximum demand.

0.5c per kw-hr. for all additional monthly consumption. Maximum bill \$4.60 per horsepower per month net.

Prompt Payment Discount 10%.

Street Lighting

The following shall be the rate for Street Lighting, this rate to take effect as from January 1st, 1924.

\$12.00 per year per 100 watt multiple lamp.

It is now intimated that the Ottawa session may be prolonged until midsummer, when it will be automatically dissolved by the heat.

Republicans, Democrats and Progressives will all join in celebrating President Coolidge's birthday. The chief executive of the nation was born on July 4.

Four hundred thousand people visited Coney Island on Sunday. Bathhouse attendants feared for a time that there would not be enough water in the Atlantic to supply their patrons.

Shin bones of steers are being shipped to China, where they are converted into "ivory" mah jongg sets. It is expected that wind-jammers will be chartered to bring back the finished product.

For the entertainment of rural dwellers noises from a busy downtown New York street corner are being broadcasted by radio. While urbanites are listening to the trill of a nightingale, residents of remote hamlets can listen in on the truck drivers swearing at the traffic cops.

"The sidewalks of New York" is a popular campaign song with the supporters of Governor Al Smith. The White House aspirant was born and brought up within sight of the Bowery. Many an ambitious politician has slipped on a banana skin or dropped through a coal hole on the political pathways.

It would be a vast improvement on present methods if international disputes could be decided in the same manner as the events at the Olympic games. Instead of slaughtering each other by the thousands the beligerent nations could pit their champions against each other and fight it out in the arena.

The restaurant owners who cater to the varied tastes of the host of visitors from all parts of the world attending the British Empire Exhibition are desirous of featuring the favorite national dishes of the different countries. Lovers of garlic, macaroni, noodles, chop suey and rice are provided for but there is some doubt as to the Canadians' most popular nourishment. Until a plebiscite decides, visitors from the side of the water are willing to take "menu run."

Oregon has raised the ban on apiary products from California. The bees flew over the state border regardless of quarantine regulations.

The "radio voice" is considered an important qualification for speakers in the presidential campaign. A voice that will carry "on the air" is as essential as the "winds" in a mah jongg game.

Here and There

Although it is only 18 years ago that Alberta became a province, its population has increased fourfold, while the grain yield has increased twentyfold. Even at the present low prices, the total agricultural products of Alberta in 1923 were worth \$223,000,000.

Reports concerning the apple crop in the Annapolis Valley show that the entire crop, including the estimated local consumption, was 1,816,000 barrels. It is reported that 70,000 apple trees and 3,000 plum trees will be set out in the valley this spring.

The railways of Canada up to the end of last April earned \$6,000,000 more than they did for the corresponding period in 1923. This favorable result is due entirely to the fact that the people have been doing more business. All authorities are agreed that such a condition means growing trade.

Nearly 68,000 bushels of high class seed were handled at the Alberta government seed-cleaning plant during the past season. A total of 22,823 bushels of Marquis wheat seed was handled, 3,160 bushels of ruby wheat, 23,073 bushels of Victory oats, 17,862 bushels of Banner oats, and 684 bushels of Bark's Barley.

Three prizes for anglers at the bungalow camps on French River, Nipigon River, and the Lake of the Woods, have been offered to Canadian fishermen by the Canadian Pacific Railway. The trophies are silver replicas of the bass and the trout, and a wonderful reproduction of the head of a fighting muscalonge.

Among the speakers to address the great convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World at London, England, to be held July 14-17, will be E. W. Beatty, K.C., Chairman and President of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Mr. Beatty will speak on July 17, and has chosen as his theme "Building an Empire with Advertising."

Canada's national wealth in 1921 was \$22,195,000,000, according to a report just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. In the tabulation, agricultural wealth comes first with \$7,982,871,126, nearly 36 per cent of the total and about \$908 per head of population. The Western provinces lead, the Yukon topping the list with \$4,058. The first in absolute wealth was Ontario, to which is credited the sum of \$7,358,000,000, or thirty-three per cent of the Dominion total.

Shipping in and out of the port of Vancouver, B.C., for the calendar year 1923, showed an increase in all departments, according to the annual report of the Board of Harbor Commissioners. Over \$138,000,000 worth of goods were exported, an increase of \$30,000,000 over the value of the 1922 exports, while the imports totalled \$224,000,000, an increase of \$13,000,000 over the 1922 figures. Vessels numbering 19,608, representing a total of 8,427,683 net tons, entered and left the port in 1923, an increase over 1922 of 2,959 ships and 792,289 tons.

A party of 200 Canadian Weekly Newspaper Editors and their wives sailed for Europe on June 11th aboard the Canadian Pacific steamship "Melita." The party will visit the battle-fields of France and Belgium, seeing most important points in those countries including Brussels and Paris and will be received by King Albert. Later, they will tour England and Scotland and are to be presented to the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace on Dominion Day. Returning on the Canadian Pacific steamship "Montclair," they will visit Belfast, where Sir Robert Baird, head of the Belfast Telegraph, will entertain them. They dock at Quebec on August 4th.



At the last two District meetings the Arkona Institute has advocated the appointment of a Decoration Day and the following resolution was presented by Mrs. Walker, Secretary of that Branch:—"Be it resolved, that we the members of the Arkona Women's Institute, desire to put ourselves on record as favoring the establishment by our government of a National Decoration Day, and that we strongly recommend that June 3rd, our King's birthday, be the date established. The following from the Watford W. I. was read by Mrs. T. G. Mitchell in support of the Arkona resolution: Watford, Ont., June 11th 1924.

Resolved that in the humble opinion of the members of the Watford Branch of the Women's Institute, it would be of National value to have a Memorial Decoration Day appointed and observed in our Dominion.

That not only the graves of our Soldiers and our Soldiers' Memorials should be decorated, but that also the graves of many of the Pioneers of our country, now lying in neglected cemeteries throughout our land might be cared for, and the noble

work they accomplished, kept in remembrance thereby.

In our opinion, the caring for these cemeteries and the decoration of graves, would foster in the younger citizens of our country, a love and respect for those who blazed for us the path of civilization, whether on the battlefield or while hewing out for themselves and their families homes in the wilderness.

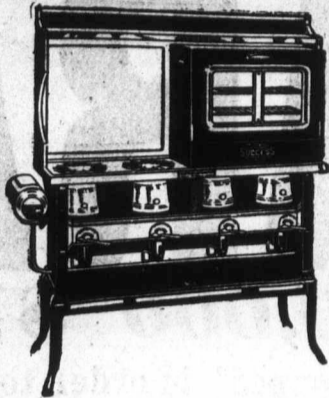

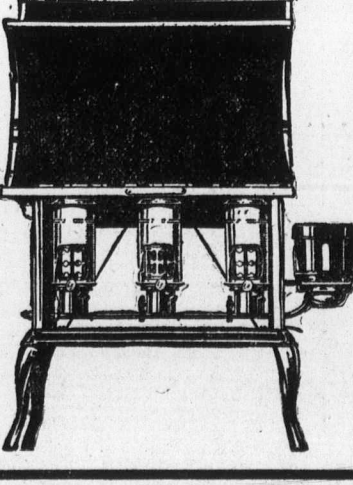

District Conventions

Religious Education Councils of Warwick, Plympton and Bosanquet Hold Interesting Discussions

Warwick

The annual convention of the Warwick township religious educational council was held in the Congregational Church, Watford, with a splendid attendance of officers and delegates.

Rev. J. H. Hosford, M. A., B. D., of Trinity Anglican Church Watford, and Rev. R. B. Ferris of Toronto gave forceful addresses. The report of the resolutions committee was presented by Mrs. W. H. Luckham and a number of important resolutions were adopted.

Officers elected are: president, John McKecher, Watford; vice-president, W. H. Shrapnell, Watford; secretary-treasurer, J. F. Smith, Warwick; assistant secretary, Thomas McCormick, Kingscourt; department superintendents, children's division, Miss L. Ross, Warwick; boys' work, Rev. T. DeCourcy Rayner, Watford; girls' work, Miss F. E. Edwards, Warwick; adult Bible-class, J. E. Collier, Warwick; home department, Miss Ena Isles, Warwick; teacher training, Rev. H. V. Workman, Watford; missionary training, John Robinson, Warwick village; temperance work, Harvey Vance, Warwick.

The place of meeting for next year is Bethesda Methodist Church, Warwick Township.

Plympton

The Plympton Township Religious educational council held their annual convention at Mandaum Presbyterian Church, Dr. P. M. Brown of Camlachie, the president, took the chair at both sessions. The report of the secretary-treasurer, Rev. C. E. Taylor, showed progress in all departments. The special speaker was Rev. R. B. Ferris of Toronto. Miss Crone dealt with 'teen age girls. Mrs. W. E. Workman of Sarnia sang twice. Reports of the departments indicated much activity in teacher training, missionary interest, and boys' and girls' work.

The committees on resolutions and nominations brought in their reports at the evening session immediately after Dr. Hughes of Point Edward had completed the opening exercises. The resolution dealt with many points taken up in the morning.

Officers elected are: President, M. White, vice-president, A. Williams; secretary-treasurer, Rev. L. B. Stoner; children's division, Mrs. P. Symington; boys, Rev. A. E. Waghorn; girls, Miss Crone; adults, F. Sussex; temperance, C. Taylor; missionary, Rev. W. J. H. Petter; home department, C. H. Smith.

Rev. R. B. Ferris gave another inspiring talk and L. Williams sang very acceptable solos. A report of the provincial convention was listened to with satisfaction. The attendance was greater than any previous convention. A delicious and bountiful supper was served by the Mandaum ladies between the sessions.

Bosanquet

The third annual convention of the Bosanquet township religious education council was held in the Presbyterian church at Ravenswood on Friday afternoon. A severe hail storm broke over the community about 1 o'clock, shattering the windows of the Presbyterian church and prevented a prompt commencement.

The sum of \$536.24 was given by the schools and private individuals for the work of the Ontario religious educational council.

The report was adopted. Roll call showed 12 schools represented at the council with 70 present.

Reports of the departments were presented by H. P. Madden through the Rev. M. Roulston on boys' work, William Middleton of the adult division, Rev. Wm. Walker of the home department, John Dallas of the temperance division.

Round Table

Rev. S. Anderson gave an address on our most pressing need in Sunday school work, and a round-table was conducted by Rev. R. B. Ferris, provincial representative.

When the evening session met, another storm came up, putting out several lamps, and it was decided to adjourn to the Methodist church, where the windows were intact. Addresses were given by Rev. D. W. Williams of Thedford, Rev. H. Cox of Forest and Rev. R. B. Ferris.

A resolution was adopted to be sent to the government endorsing the O. T. A. and stronger enforcement without change in the existing law.

New officers elected were president, William Middleton; vice-president, Rev. E. Roulston, Arkona; secretary-treasurer, Rev. Wm. Walker, Forest; divisional superintendents, children's division, Miss Olga Elliott, Thedford; boys' work H. P. Madden, Thedford; girls' work, Mrs. Eva Vance, Forest; adult division, Dr. C. L. Huffman, Forest; teachers' training, Rev. T. Doolittle, Forest; missionary, Miss Elva Fuller, Arkona; temperance, John Dallas, Thedford.

The next place of meeting will be in the Methodist church Arkona. A hearty vote of appreciation was tendered the Ravenswood people for their hospitality. Benediction by the Rev. Wm. Walker, closed the 1924 council.

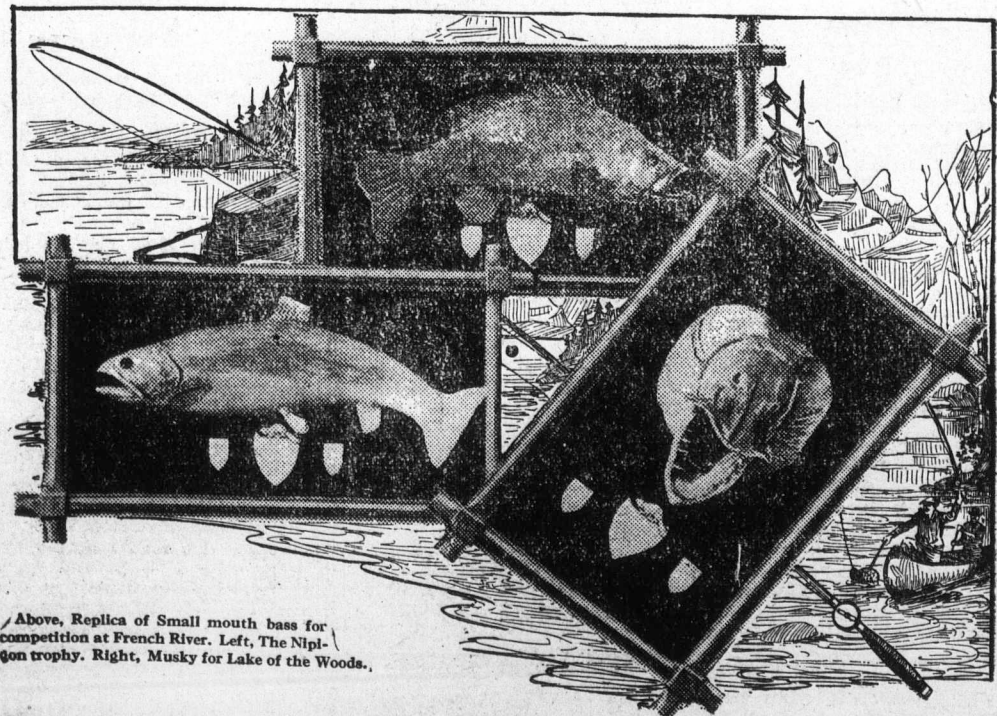

Presented President with Steel Spike



George Munro, pioneer track layer of the Canadian Pacific Railway, received birthday congratulations on May 21 from Mr. E. W. Beatty, during the latter's recent visit in Vancouver. This meeting between one of the oldest employees and the executive head of the Canadian Pacific also marked the forty-ninth anniversary of the turning of the first sod on construction at Fort William in 1875, an event at which George Munro was present.

Another interesting co-incidence in connection with the meeting is the fact that the S. S. Quebec, which carried the handful of construction men including Mr. Munro, from Sarnia to Fort William, in May 1875, was owned and operated by the Beatty Steamship Line, of which Mr. Beatty's father, the late Mr. Henry Beatty, was president.

In 1881 when construction was begun on the last lap of the company's lines between Yale, B. C. and the Coast, Mr. Munro was given charge of track laying at Emery, B. C. and when the last and famous 'gold spike' was driven at Craigellachie by Lord Strathcona in 1885 he took possession of the steel spike which replaced the gold one and after treasuring it for the past 39 years as a keepsake presented it to Mr. Beatty.
