Notes and Comments

Major General Gascoigne, the commanding officer of the Canadian Militia, arrives in Canada by the Allan Line SS. "Parisian" on her next trip, some three weeks hence. Judging from his record in the army, the new General will be one of the most popular commanders our force has ever had.

The Canadian Militia and the Dominion as a whole have reason to be proud of last week's magnificent shooting at Ottawa. No country in the world, with even twice the popularity of Canada and with a much larger proportional expenditure on military training, could

turn out anything like the number of thoroughly expert marksmen as those who competed on the Rideau Ranges last week. Much of the credit for the development of marksmanship in Canada is of course due to the Dominion Rifle Association, the Military Rifle League and the affiliated provincial, regimental and local rifle associations, but a large share of the credit must be given to the Militia Department. Whatever its shortcomings might have been in other respects, its encouragement of rifle practice has for many years back been constant and enlightened, and the result is a valuable body of marksmen, who are in every sense a credit to the country.

The Dominion has certainly received good value for the public money expended on target practice so far, and it is to be hoped that last week's splendid demonstration of the fact will induce the Government to materially increase its annual investments in this direction. More generous allowance of free ammunition could with great advantage be made to regimental associations, grants towards markers' expenses should be made, the provision of long ranges is an immediate necessity and the whole force should be at once re-armed.

We have the men to put behind the guns, and for goodness sake, give them weapons which will enable them to exercise their skill to the very best possible advantage. It does certainly appear a little ridiculous to think that the rifles used on the Rideau ranges were not only a different weapon from that with

which the militia is armed, but were the personal property of the men using them. Our American cousins are more practical than us in this respect, for their matches are fired with the rifles issued by the government. But then the Snider is a blunderbus compared to the Remington. We hope that the consignment of Lee Metford's now under order will speedily be followed by others sufficient to arm the entire force.

Quarter Master Sergeant Ogg's capture of the Governor General's prize is popular in the force, for the winner is a generous shot, a good soldier and a veteran. Young Pugh, of B. Battery, R. C. A., who won second place in the big match, is also always a popular man on the ranges. The Pughs, father and sons, have always done much to keep up shooting in the permanent force, and it is to be hoped that the young gunner's popular victory last week will give a much needed impetus to shooting in the permanent force. There is no reason why the permanent force should not aspire to set the rest of the militia the pace in marksmanship as well as in discipline and drill.

The remarks made by the Hon. Mr. Dickey, the new Minister of Militia, the other day at the annual matches of the Nova Scotia Provincial Rifle Association, have been most encouraging to the members of the force. In his remarks that the Militia Department has been stinted of money, the honorable gentleman showed that he has grasped the root of the force's trouble. The government has been

trying to maintain a large militia force in a state of efficiency on less than half the annual expenditure necessary. Members of the force have done their best to supply the deficiency, but of course with only partial success. Some of the money voted has certainly run to waste, but that has been the fault of the pernicious system of political preferment which controls the administration of public affairs, and the force itself is not to blame. But, after all, the great trouble is that the supplies voted by Parliament for the support of the militia have not been anything like adequate.

Considering everything, the reduction of the vote made this year amounted to a national scandal. The so-called economies effected by the reduction of the permanent force and the cutting down of the drill pay of the city battalions were so miserable as to be altogether beneath contempt. We have had occasion to criticise some of the appointments to the permanent force, but none the less gladly recognize the high professional attainments and devotion to duty of most of the officers and non-commissioned officers. We cannot refrain from protesting against the contemptible cheese paring which has been going on, not only because it materially reduces the efficiency of the permanent force and detracts from its usefulness to the rest of the militia, but because it is unfair to the members of the permanent corps, who deserve better of the country.

Now that we have a minister who realizes that the militia requires more money expended upon it to keep it efficient, it is to be hoped that he will remain at the head of the department until the militia estimates attain reasonable dimensions. With the imperial sentiment so strongly engrained into the people of Canada, and with the importance of the Canadian militia in the great scheme of imperial defence, the minister should not find much opposition in Parliament to a substantial increase of the militia vote were he to explain the requirements of the force, as he understands them, to the members.

Army Chat.

Lieutenant Colonels J. Wilson, Royal Canadian Artillery and W. Otter, Royal Regiment of Canadian Infantry, have passed the tactical test at Aldershot, England, required for promotion to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

Captain Victor Semini P.S.C., Leicestershire Regiment, has been appointed Deputy Assistant Adjutant General on Staff of Lieut. General A. Montgomery-Moore, Commanding the Forces in Canada, in place of Major F. Waldon, P.S.C., Royal Artillery whose period of service will expire on the 1st October next.

Captain Semini, who joined the service from the Royal Malta Artillery in 1876, is a graduate of the Staff College and has been stationed in Halifax with the 1st battalion of his regiment.

Lieut. the Hon. Dudley Churchill Marjoribanks, from the 4th [Militia] Batt. Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, has been appointed second Lieut. in the Royal Horse Guards, [Blues.] This young officer is heir to the Tweedmouth peerage and is thus a nephew of Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen.

Major S. J. A. Denison, 4th [Militia] Batt. South Staffordshire Regiment, has resigned his commission, with permission to retain his rank and wear the prescribed uniform on retirement.

Major Denison, who is a graduate of the Royal Military College, Kingston, also holds a commission as Captain in the Royal Regiment of Canadian Infantry.

Captain William John McElhinny, Royal Engineers, has recently received his captaincy. He received his commission on January 6, 1886, from the Royal Military College, Kingston, in the twenty-fourth year of his age. Captain McElhinny served in the Burmese Expedition 1887-8, and is in possession of the medal and clasp for this campaign.

The Necessity of Target Practice.

Battles Will Be Won on the Rifle Range.

To the Editor of CANADIAN MILITARY GAZETTE:

It used to be said that battles were won on the barrack square, but now it is conceded that the conditions of modern warfare demand that we should turn our attention more and more to the rifle range, for by the skill acquired there will battles henceforth be decided.

The more one studies the question of modern fire tactics and the latest improvements in fire arms, the more one is convinced that those troops who combine superior individual marksmanship with a sound and thoroughly well mas-

tered system of fire, control and discipline, will in future battles gain the victory. But in order to attain such efficiency, both officers and men must devote themselves heart and soul to musketry.

The straightest individual shooting cannot under most conditions be very effective unless it is capable of combined action, and can be concentrated at the command of the intelligent leader upon the given objective. We cannot hope for any degree of efficiency unless the officers believe and take an active interest in musketry.

Every soldier should endeavor to attain such a degree of skill with his rifle as to make him feel confident that he has the power of destroying every antagonist; this feeling causes him to place equal reliance on the skill of his comrades, and in this conviction we have the best assurance of control and discipline.

Our militia is armed with a rifle that was considered entirely obsolete twenty years ago. It is as inferior to the Lee-Metford, the magazine rifle with which the British regulars are armed, as the old "Brown Bess" of our grandfather's time was to the Enfield rifle. It would be a national crime of the basest nature to ask our men, with the worn-out "gas pipe," to face the modern small-bore magazine.

The Lee-Metford has little or no recoil, and owing to its great initial velocity the trajectory is so flat that its point-blank range may be taken at 500 yards. These advantages serve to counteract any errors in elevation and judging distance, and at a time when in the heat of action it is scarcely possible for men to adjust their sights with any degree of accuracy, whereas on the other hand with the Snider rifle the curve of the trajectory, or the course described by the bullet in its flight, is so great that at the above distance (500 yards) a small error in calculating the range will cause a miss.

Our country, with its militia armed with the obsolete Snider, may justly be compared to a farmer, who in these days of modern reapers and labor-saving machines, continued to use the old-time honored scythe and flail.

For this condition of affairs the present administration must be held responsible. To allow it to continue would be an act of criminal folly. Surely there must be enough latent patriotism in the country to justify the expenditure of the paltry sum necessary to re-arm the militia with a modern weapon, and nothing inferior to the Lee-Metford will satisfy "Our Boys."

Hamilton.

We regret that the following reached us just too late for insertion in our issue of the 15th.

Amongst the Trophies, won by the 13th Battalion, which were on exhibition on the night of Hayhurst's reception, was one that elicited a good deal of admiration—namely the "Carslake Trophy" which was again won by a team of the 13th's crack shots.

Never did the 13th shoot as well in the military league matches as during the past summer. Every match day saw between 80 and 90 men on the ranges, shooting for all they were worth and the result was more than satisfactory. 8 teams entered 1 Martini and 7 Snider, and 8 first secured—a grand showing.

The Martini team took first with an aggregate for the four matches of 3586, Snider team 1st with an aggregate of 3555 and 1st prizes for the 20, 30, 40, 50, 60 and 70 men teams.

KINGSTON, Aug. 25.—Captain Horn, Lieut. A. B. Cunningham, and Q. M. Sergt. Milligan represented the 14th Battalion, P. W. O. R., at the O. R. A. matches in Toronto last week. Shooting at Bedford.

HON. A. R. DICKEY PRESENTS THE PRIZES AND RECEIVES AN ADDRESS—NEW LEE-METTFORD RIFLES FOR THE CANADIAN MILITIA—PRIVATE BURNS IN THE OTTAWA TEAM.

The riflemen were greeted with another fine day at Bedford range yesterday, being the third day of the Provincial Rifle Association's annual meeting. There was a large number of visitors on the range, including Hon. A. R. Dickey, minister of militia, Hon. W. S.

Fielding and Major Clark, of the 90th battalion, Winnipeg. There was also present a large number of the fair sex. The shooting was good and some of the competitions were keenly contested. Gunner Campbell, of the H. G. A., won the merchants of Halifax cup with 88 points, and Sergt. McKenzie, of the 63rd, won the consolation prize, with 23 points out a possible 25.

Major Corbin and Private Burns tied for a place on the Ottawa team and in the shoot off Burns won. They shot at the five hundred yards range, and the scores were:

No. 4 company of the 63rd rifles came out ahead with 247 points, and won the Laurie bugle, in the tenth competition, which was a skumishing match comprised of a team of five men. Gunner Boutiller, of the H. G. A., won the Nursery aggregate with a total of 325 points. Gunner Campbell, of the H. G. A., won the special aggregate and also the grand aggregate.

The prizes were presented by the Hon. A. R. Dickey, and before the presentation took place, the following address was presented to him:

To Hon. Arthur Dickey, Minister of Militia and Defence.

SIR,—The council of the Provincial Rifle association of Nova Scotia, representing the militia of the province, tender you a most cordial welcome upon this your first official visit amongst the members of the force, for it is a matter of especial rejoicing to us as Nova Scotians to have you at the head of the department a fellow Nova Scotian. As a Nova Scotian you need feel nothing but pride in assuming your exalted position, for the reports of the different inspecting officers show that the various branches of the service in this province have ever stood amongst the most efficient in the Dominion.

With a knowledge of several steps taken by you since becoming minister we are encouraged to hope that the active militia has secured a friend who will strive to obtain for that portion of the force the consideration it should receive.

For these reasons we believe it is giving expression to the sentiment of the force, when we tender you a most hearty welcome to-day, assuring you that every corps in the province will endeavor to strengthen your hands by maintaining the proud position now occupied.

We most sincerely trust you will not estimate the heartiness of our welcome by the shortness of this address, for soldiers are not given to the making of long speeches, or the utterance of words of flattery.

In a brief reply, Mr. Dickey said that he would do everything in his power to further the interests of the militia in Canada, and that he would see they were provided with better accoutrements. He also stated that an order to the amount of \$50,000 had been given in London for Lee-Medford rifles, for the use of the Canadian militia.

Two Artillerymen Drowned.

WHILE RETURNING FROM AN AFTER-NOON WITH FRIENDS AT MACNAE'S.

Much regret is expressed, especially in military circles, over the drowning of two Royal artillerymen in the harbor last evening. There were five men in the boat at the time it swamped and they were all good swimmers. Their names were Laylor, Whittle, Beaver, Cormack and Galvin. The boat being headed for York Redoubt or Point Pleasant, and when off Black Rock, or Target cove, Point Pleasant park and in a line with George's island, the storm was heavy and the craft, which was a pleasure boat, was swamped. At the time they were about 500 yards from George's island, for the shore of which they started to swim. Beaver, Cormack and Galvin reached the shore all right, but the first named was unconscious when he did so. He remembered Laylor swimming near him for at least 400 yards but poor Laylor never reached the shore alive, though he must have nearly succeeded in doing so. His body came ashore shortly after the three men named got on the beach and every effort was made to resuscitate him, but without avail. Whittle's body was not found.

About 11 o'clock this morning Laylor's body arrived at the Queen's wharf on the steamer Lily, accompanied by the three survivors of the accident. The steamer flew her flag at half-mast coming from George's island to the wharf. The body was on a stretcher and covered with canvas. Upon arrival at the wharf the body was carried to a carriage and placed thereon and immediately removed to the station hospital, where an inquiry was held this afternoon by Medical Examiner Finn.

Dr. Finn took James Beaver's evidence. He said they left Clarence at 8 p.m. to go to Cambridge, and when between Cambridge and George's island the boat filled and they started to swim ashore. Two men reached shore before him and afterwards had to go out again and pull him on shore. The other two were drowned. Dr. Finn took some other evidence and found that death was purely accidental.

On the evening of the 15th inst., officers and N. C. O. of the H. G. A., were present when Forts Cambridge and Ogilvie were manned by the Royal Artillery. A moving target was towed by a small government steamer, the search light being used to search it out, when the gunners had no difficulty, in laying their guns. The H. G. A., seems familiar with this kind of work, and from what I can hear they consider themselves capable of "tackling" any gun from a 9 pounder to a 10 in ch (18 tons) the heaviest R.M.L., gun here.

Gaiety in the Army.

General Poillou de Saint Mars, commanding the 12th French Army Corps, at Limoges, is an officer of original spirit,

always studying the comforts and enjoyments of his men. He has issued orders, as last year, that in the heat of the day during the summer the men in his command shall lie down for a *siesta* with drawn blinds at their quarters, believing that they will rise like giants refreshed for work later in the day. The troops quartered at Toulon and other stations south of Limoges are wondering why the repose needful for their comrades should be considered by other generals unnecessary for them. But General de Saint Mars is not merely solicitous concerning the comfort of his perspiring troops. He is sad to think that they have become silent upon the march. "*Le coq gaulois,*" he asks in an order issued at Limoges, "*n' a-t-il donc plus le droit ni la force de chanter ?*" At the last manoeuvres he joined several corps returning after their day's work, tramping silently in the dust, *comme de monstrueux millepattes*, to their camps. He attempted to distract them from their thoughts, to make them lift their heads, and awaken the elasticity of their lungs and throats by singing old marching songs. But in vain. The men were silent, having lost the art of melody, and the officers, astonished, looked upon the general's efforts as a breach of discipline. But he is not to be worsted. "Everything sings in nature", he says, "and soldiers much sing also." Accordingly, in the winter, the bandsmen are to arouse the sleeping spirit of song. They are not to be content to blow into wood or metal, but to remember that the human voice is a good and cheap instrument, *toujours disponible et très portatif*. Even modest instruments such as the flute, and, above all, the accordion and mandoline, are not to be despised for the work of waking again the innumerable heroic and warlike songs of France. But rightly, nothing ridiculous, coarse or obscene is to be permitted. It is the simple and spontaneous joy of life that General de Saint Mars would substitute for the melancholy mood of his silent men. "*Uvent les bons cœurs,*" he cried. "*et la gaieté des gars robustes de la France.*"

Maj. Bond.

Bystander, the Montreal Correspondent of the St. Johns NEWS, has the following to say with reference to Major Bond of this city.

In a large community, where the civic social ideals are those of a badly instructed people, it requires great courage to oppose one's self to the customs, to the standards of daily life with which the mass of people are well content. The reformer is laughed at. "What, does the fellow pretend to be better than his neighbors? Come, analyze him, and he will be found narrow and priggish; a sour, little-souled fellow, who is opposed to wholesome laughter, who would re-enact sumptuary and other restrictive laws; who thinks Providence has given him a mission to reform the world."

And the indictment, I am fain to say, is too often well sounded. We have come across so-called reformers so small, so ignoble in their personal character that they have killed the cause they professed to serve. The best reformer is the humanist who pities, forgives, persuades.

Major Bond, who founded the Citizens' League, endured a great deal of obloquy with an even temper which at last beat down ridicule with the sunny smile of complete equability and indifference. He was called a goody-goody, a Pharisee. It was asked in scorn: "Does this man pretend to be better than other citizens?"

Pray, has he any higher illumination? Has he received a commission from the higher powers to make the world in the new?"

.

But then, most palpably in the sight and estimation of all men, Major Bond was one of the most whole-souled men in the city. So far from being a sour ascetic, who would shut out the sunlight, and kill the music of air and stream, he was a hearty, wholesome man of the world (in the best sense), who felt a deep joy in living, whose laughter was like a corial, who shook hands with the man at the corner, who had been a model soldier, and who interested himself in the lives and happiness of his fellows.

Only, he had the courage to demand the enforcement of law. He cherished high civic ideals. He had the unselfish desire to see Montreal not only prosperous, but wholesome.

The ridicule died out, and respect began to grow. The man was in earnest. But he was honorable; he was generous; he was a big-hearted fellow, after all.

As head of the League, he has never asked impossibilities. You cannot make men good in a day. You cannot evolve character by a formula. You cannot have prohibition by resolution. But you can ask men to conform to a plain law. You can demand of vice, in the interest of the young, that it shall not flaunt itself in the street. You can throw a mantle of protection round innocence. You can frown upon the disorderly and the vicious.

And you can do this without a superior air. You can do this and come at last to be respected by the very forces you are opposing. But you must have a gift. You must be very much in earnest. You must have moral courage. And you must be so human that you will sympathize with limitation, and never put your moral pocket-handkerchief to your nose, whatever the odor. One in a thousand, perhaps, can take a stand such as Major Bond has taken. 'Tis a fine thing to find the whole-souled man, the hearty humanist, with the courage to set forth purity as the loveliest thing in life

Military Bands.

The rule of the militia department which prohibited militia bands in uniform from taking part in any other than militia functions has been rescinded and these organizations are now free to appear in their regular dress at any demonstration they may desire to take part in. The new order does not seem to be a particularly wise one, for under the change the band of the 63rd rifles may head the Orange procession on the 12th July, while the 66th may head the Irish Catholic societies on the 17th of March. The band of the H. G. A. will be free to add a picturesque feature to a cheering procession of Liberals, while the 63rd band may be seen leading an equally demonstrative crowd of Conservatives. It is

questionable whether an order which will permit of such scenes taking place is not a mistake. It certainly detracts from the dignity that should appertain to the uniform of the militia, and may very easily lead to unfortunate results. Militia uniforms should never be worn save when the wearers are under military discipline.—Editorially *Halifax Echo*, July 26th.

ODD USES FOR PAPER.

Horseshoes and Coffins Are Now Manufactured From Wood Pulp.

We have had the golden age and the iron age and various other ages but the present will probably be known as the wooden or paper age. Paper dress material masquerading as silk is the latest invention in the paper line and threatens to drive the silk-worm out of the business. Spruce sawdust, cotton or jute waste and alcohol are put into a machine and come out at the other end shining, delicately colored, rustling silks suitable for the most fastidious lady's gown. Of course this paper silk doesn't wear so well as the real fabric, but think how much cheaper it will be!

Enthusiastic paper manufacturers say the new woman and the new man will dine off paper dishes. It is not improbable that the hat of the future will be an indestructible paper affair impervious to fire or water. Over in Paris any enterprising milliner will be able to show you stylish bonnets and hats made entirely of paper, frame, trimming, ornaments and all. Parasols of paper do not seem to have been thought of yet, but satchels and trunks of paper are common enough. The paper trunk despite its frail sound is the despair of the baggage smasher. It refuses to smash.

So do paper car wheels. They have been in use for years on some of the most important railroads in this country. It must not be supposed that the wheels are made entirely of paper. This material only forms the interior shell. Having been subjected to terrific pressure it is moulded and firmly bolted to the outer rim which is of steel. Greater durability and lightness are claimed for these wheels, but don't let the idea of lightness lead you to get under one. If you do you may possibly have use for one of the paper coffins which are being turned out at wholesale by a firm at Westfield, Mass.

The railroad train of the future is likely not only to have paper wheels but to run on paper rails. These are made entirely of paper and are formed in moulds under great pressure. They have been used to some extent in Russia and Germany and are said to be free from many of the defects of the ordinary steel rail.

Paper horseshoes are another European invention. Among the advantages claimed for them is that they maintain a rough surface enabling the horse to get a good grip on the smooth pavements. German paper-makers have put on the market a substance called "papier sculptor" which is used instead of clay for modelling. It is simply paper pulp kept soft enough to be worked.

Papier mache ceilings and wall decorations are very fashionable. They may look like leather or brocade or a thousand and one handsome embossed effects, but they are wood pulp just the same.

The housefurnishing departments in the big shops furnish interesting evidence of the extent to which paper enters into ordinary life. Paper pails and tubs are appreciated by the suburban dweller who hasn't "set" tubs. They are much lighter and easier to keep clean as well as cheaper than the old style. Water coolers are made of paper. So is the much-abused cuspidor.

Peach baskets, berry baskets and butter boxes are made of paper, and almost everything under the sun—save, which

used to come in pretty blue and white bags, oatmeal, crackers, ice-cream, candy, shoes, corsets, dresses—is sent home in a paper box.

In Japan, they say, some folks live in paper houses, and in this country paper boats are in use. Nor must the necessary sewer pipe be forgotten. Paper pipes for carrying water, steam or electricity are not uncommon. As conduits for electricity they are considered safe, even though the wire be not insulated.

SHOT A WHITE BULL.

Gen. Maury's Adventure That Landed Him in a Cactus Bush.

Gen. Dabney H. Maury, the war veteran, has a fund of anecdote and plenty of wit for spicing it, and his stories are listened to with much pleasure. His favorite tale is of his battle with a cactus bush:

"It happened when we were stationed in Texas upon the banks of the Rio Grande, and being a little anxious one day regarding a small speck I saw moving in the distance I determined to go softly forward to investigate it. I did not tell any one of my movements, fearing to be laughed at as a false alarmist. As I crept through the bush toward the moving speck it suddenly grew much larger, and I saw it was coming straight toward me. I had no field glass, but as I enjoyed an adventure I determined to meet the enemy, no matter what it was. So I stood boldly up and waited.

"In a minute it was in shooting distance of me, and then I saw it was a splendid white bull. Now, I was never afraid of Taurus, though I had had several experiences with him on the prairies, so, standing my ground, I let fly at him with my rifle again and again.

"I think I must have struck him, for he snorted and charged toward me. I shot again, the shot taking effect in his head. But my shot only angered him and gave him fresh strength. With a terrific bellow he lowered his head and made for me. I took one look at his horns, realized that there was not time to fire again and dodged him. I jumped to one side into a pile of underbrush and landed in the midst of a great cactus bush. Do you know what a cactus bush is? In its wild state it is a bundle of razors, newly sharpened and turned blade toward you, and I fell on top of twenty keen knives.

"I lay there until I could find courage to crawl through the blades, and, terribly cut, I crept home. When I told my story, my comrades did not believe me. 'Go over there half a mile, and you will find a white bull dead in the brush,' I said. He fell as I lay on the cactus points, and if I had it to do over again I'd take my chance with the bull."—*New York Recorder*.

One Experiment Sufficient.

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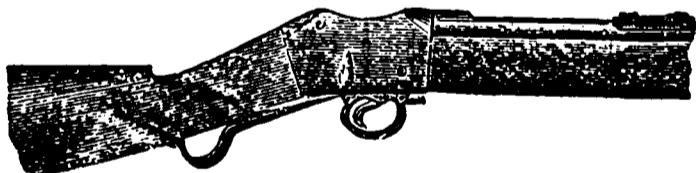
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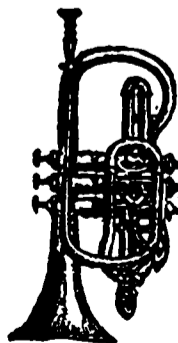
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THE SERGEANT'S STORY

He wuz tould that Big Bear wuz in a divil ov a pickle—that his braves wuz desertin' him loike anythin', an' that his grub wuz gettin' moighty scarce. The Gineril he sees that it wuz just a matter ov toime now, so back he puts to Fort Pitt. Kurnel Otter an' Kurnel Irvine an' Gineril Strange wuz still kapin' their oies skinned fer the inimy. So what does Big Bear do—the tricky ould divil—he smells a big mice loike, an' seein' that he wuz gettin' hemmed in on all soides by the "Police," as they called all souldiers wid red coats on thim, he crosses the Saskatchewan at Carlton an' gives himself up to Inspector Gagnon, ov the Mounted Police. Jist a day or so befoore he surrendered he sinds a message to the Gineril sayin' :

"You brought 4,000 troops into this country, you've done nothin' yet. I give you four days to leave, fer those ov your men I don't kill the musketos an' bull dogs will. You can't reach me." The cheek ov the ould divil.

Whoile all this wuz goin' on we wuz in camp at Fort Pitt, doin' a bit ov drill, a bit ov "sentry go," a bit ov "fatigue," an' in fact a bit ov everythin', not forgettin' the kickin'. At nights we used to gather round a big foire—fer the noights is always cold in thim parts—an' havin' "sacred concerts," wid boxin', wrestlin', singin' and story tellin'. Ivery wan did somethin', from the Gineril himself wid his song about "Old Virginny," down to little Price, the "drummer," wid the strawberry hair, who used to do a clog dance, an' a good wan at that. Captin Buchan, the "adj." of the 90th, used to sing "The Day I Played Baseball." Liftinit Hay wud sing "Annie Laurie" an' Scotty Murdison "The Forty Twa." Than thim stories that wuz tould wuz fairly killin'. If I cud only remimber some ov thim sure an' ye'd fairly split yer soides wid laffin'.

THE SUPPLIES FROM HOME.

"All things comes to thim that wait," as folks sez, an' sure enough on the 18th thim long looked fer "supplies" from home arrived. An' sure an' there wuz great rejoicin' that day. Oi don't spose

there wuz a man in the whole outfit but got a box ov somethin', barrin' meself, an' sure an' I got two, so oi did. An' thin such a toime as we did be havin', poor divils that had been wrestlin' wid "pork and beans" an' hard tack fer nearly three months wuz fairly stuffin' ourselves wid all the delicacies ov the sayson. The only man that "kicked" at all wuz the surgin, an' small wonder, fer he wuz nearly run off his two fate, so he wuz, day and night lookin' at tongues. We had slathers ov atin' fer days an' days, an' good stuff, too, only ye see, sor, we wuzn't used to it, an' by hivins, sor, it kind ov got the best ov us. It made me awful sick, somethin' terrible. Oi thought fer sure oi wuz goin' to die, an' 'pon me sowl, sor, its dead an' buried oid be now, oim thinkin', only fer Doctor King. Sure an' he saved me loife that toime an' no mistake. Ye see, sor, it wuz jist loike this. Oi wuz awful sick, groanin' loike the very divil wid me in-soides, an' "Bob" Hazleton he gives me a dose ov midicine, but it didn't do me no good, sor. So he went over an' got the surgin, an' he gave me some stuff but I only got worse. Thin Doctor Whiteford ov the 90th, who wuz over in our lines, he came an' looked at me an' tould thim to give me somethin' else, but oi only kept gettin' worse an' worse; thin they sent fer Doctor King who wuz out there wid the Field Hospital Corps as a dresser or somethin' an' had come up to Fort Pitt from Saskatoon, an' 'pon me sowl, sor, there's the man that saved me loife an' no mistake. What's that? how did he do it! Why ye see, sor, whin they sint fer Doctor King he wuz off fishin' an' he niver came at all at all an' so oi got better agin. By Hivins, sor, he saved me loife that toime an' oill niver fergit him fer it.

On the 19th the sick an' wounded, at last thim that had got well agin, wuz brought back from Saskatoon an' they joined us agin. They brought up some great stories about the hospital down there. Sure an' oi don't know whither they wuz true or no but oi'll jist tell ye wan of thim, an' sure an' ye can judge fer yerself. "Turkey" Grogan tould this wan an' he sez "by Hivins," sez he, "oid sooner be first man in a baynit charge any day than be livin' in an hospital, 'pon me sowl oi wud as far as real danger goes.

"Down there at Saskatoon," sez he, "there's a man named Cassidy belongin' to the Midland, he wuz in cot number wan roight fernist the doore. Well wan day the surgin wuz away all day loike an' befoore he goes he sez to wan ov the "dressers," a doctor named King fer to look after the sick an' wounded fer him till he came back, an' gives him instructions about each case. Well it wuz purty late whin the surgin got back, an' much to his surprise he he foinds Cassidy all swelled up an' groanin' fit to bate the band.

"Hello, Cassidy," sez he, "yer lookin' very swell this evenin'" kind ov jollyin' him loike.

"Oh, doctor, dear," sez Cassidy, "don't be jokin' wid me, it's dyin' oi am." "Dyin' nothin'" sez the surgin, "you're all roight,

an' we'll have ye on yer fate in less than no toime. Wan wud almost think ye had water on the brain fer to hear ye goin' on loike ye are."

"Water on the brain," sez Cassidy. "By Hivins, I only wish it wuz on me brain," sez Cassidy, rabbin' his stumnick. Thin he sez, "Say, doctor," sez he, "whin ye went off this mornin' didn't ye say oi wuz to be kept quiet, an' not be excited loike." "Yes, that oi did," sez the surgin, "an' didn't it have the desired effect?"

"Desired effect?" sez Cassidy. "Not on yer loife, it didn't—that dam dresser King has bin pumpin' Saskatchewan water into me all day, quart after quart, till oim narely burstin' wid indignation an' soap suds."

"Well, well," sez the surgin, "that's very strange. I don't understand it at all. Oi must see about this," he sez, an' off he goes an' hunts up King, an' gives him a dressin' down fer interferin' wid the treatmint.

"Don't git excoited loike," sez King. "Sure an' oi only carried out you're instructions," sez he. "My instructions," sez the surgin. "Oi niver gave any such instructions in all me loife. Show me yer book."

So King brings out his book, an' pointin' to somethin' wrote in it sez, "There ye are, what did oi tell ye?" "What did ye tell me?" sez the surgin. "Why there it is in black an' whoite: Number one doin' nicely, keep quiet; give one injection to number twelve."

"Well, by the Lord Harry," sez King, "an' if that isn't too bad. Oi tuck that to be 12 injections for number one," sez he, "an' oi niver put in such a busy day in all me loife." Oi suppose you'll think this story ain't true, sez Hogan, because the Gineril niver said nothin' about it in his report, but thin ye see the Gineril he didn't know nothin' about it, fer he wuzn't there at all. Oi spose you've heerd that story befoore, sor, an' so have oi many toimes since the rebellion an' always about a different doctor an' a different place, but 'pon me sowl, sor, oi believe Hogan wuz tellin' the truth that toime. Thin there wuz Martin that got shot thro' the breast at Batoche. Well, whin he wuz brought back to the hospital tint the surgin sez to him in a cheerful sort ov a way, kind ov jollyin' him loike :

"Hello, Martin, me poor boy, so you're hit, eh? Well niver moind, you've done your duty, anyhow. "Tell me," sez he, "what did you do to help win the foight, besides git hit?"

"What did oi do?" sez Martin. "Sure an' oi walked up to wan ov thim red divils an' oi cut his fut off." "Cut his fut off," sez the surgin, "an' whoi didn't ye cut off his head?" "Oh!" sez Martin, "sure an' his head wuz off already." "Good boy," sez the surgin, "you're all roight, a man wid your spunk and spirits is sure to pull through. Now," sez he, "oim goin' to give ye chloryform an' see how badly you're hurt. You won't feel the probin' a bit. You'll go roight off into insinibility an' won't know nothin' ov what's goin' on till oim through."

"All roight," sez Martin. Thin he puts his hand in his pocket, an' brings some money an' things he had, an' begins countin' it.

"Sure an' yer not goin' fer to offer me money," sez the surgin.

"Oh, no, sor," sez Martin. "I wuzn't thinkin' about that. I wuz wantin' to see how much I had in me pocket befoore ye chloryformed me, that's all."

An' Martin got better, an' he's walkin' around this day.

A GREAT "BLOW OUT"

On the 20th ov June the officers ov the Granideers celebrated the arrival ov the "luxuries," as they called thim supplies

that came from home, by givin' a big "blow out"—a banquet loike—to the officers ov all the different corps stationed at Fort Pitt. It wuz held in the big dinin' room on board the steamer Marquis, that wuz lvin' at Fort Pitt thin, sor, an' it wuz a howlin' success. There was iverythin' to ate an' drink ye cud wish fer, barrin' champagne wine. They had "ducks" from Duck Lake, "fish" from Fish Lake, "frogs legs" from Frog Lake, an' chicken poie that wuz made out of gophers. Thim wuz contributed by the surgin, unbeknownst to him, by the bye, an' jist fer to show ye how we had discipline pounded into us durin' that expedition, I'll tell ye wan thin' that happened durin' that dinner. Some ov us min wuz tould off fer to wait at table, an' we wuz tould jist what we wuz expected to do, an' instructed fer to give our whole attintion to that an' to nothin' else, ye see, sor. I wuz tould off fer knives, forks an' spoons, "Scotty" fer bread, "Fiddler" Burke fer pertaties, an' so on. Well, sor, durin' the evenin' the Gineril he wants a bit ov bread, an' beckonin' to "Fiddler" Burke, he sez, "Walter," sez he, "bring me a bit ov bread," he sez. "Can't do it, sor," sez "Fiddler," straightenin' himself up an' standin' at attintion, "I'm tould off fer pertaties." Now, sor, there wuz discipline, fer ye, "the first duty ov a soldier."

The next day "Mud" Hambly asked a lot ov us fellows over to his tint to a "big blow out," as he called it, an' as "Mud" wuz a moighty foine cook, we all wint, expectin' to have as big a toime as the officers. Well, we'd no sooner than got there than "Mud" sez, "Say, byes," sez he, "how d'ye loike the 'blow out'?" An' he blows out the loight an' sneaks off under the curtain ov the tint, laffin' fit to split his soides. It's a moighty lucky thing he knew enough fer to get away or we'd have broke ivery bone in his carcase.

The next day I sees Scotty Murdison out doin' "punishment drill," wid his pack on his back and a smoile on his face, laffin' fit to bate the band, as if it wuz a big joke fer to be promenadin' up an' down all day long in heavy marchin' order. I sloides up to him an' I sez, "Scotty," sez I. "What?" sez he, koind ov soidewise loike, so the sargint wudn't hear him. "Whist," sez I. "Whist what?" sez he. "Sure an' what d'ye be laffin' at?" sez I. "Oh Oirish," sez he, "it's a great joke," sez he. "What is?" sez I. "Why," sez he, "some divil's bin stalin' lump sugar off the Quartermaster's store agin, an' they think it wuz me." "An' what's there to laff at in that?" sez I. "Why," sez he, "that's where the joke comes in; it wuzn't me at all. They're punishin' the wrong man an' don't know it." That wuz Scotty's idea ov a joke. Now, there's Scotch fer ye, an' no mistake.

On the 22nd all the prisoners from Big Bear's camp wuz brought into Fort Pitt, an' it looked as if things wuz about comin' to an end.

On the 27th we had a big toime, wid sports, games an' horse races, to cilebrate the welcome news about Big Bear's camp all bein' broke up, an' thin the Gineril begins makin' ready fer to start fer home. Ye see, sor, Batoche had bin took, Riel an' his cronies captured, Poundmaker wuz a prisoner at Battleford, an' all the white prisoners wuzn't prisoners no more. So there wuzn't no use ov loafin' about hat part ov the country any longer.

On the 1st of July we had a big Divisional Parade in honor ov Dominion day, an' on the 3rd we struck our tents at Fort Pitt an' marched down from the old camp ground an' embarked on the steamer Marquis.

ORDERS FOR HOME.

On the 4th early in the mornin', we

started fer home. We'd no sooner got wel' under way than we noticed that the flags on all the boats wuz flyin' at half-mast, an' we wuz tould that Kurnei Williams wuz dead. Poor soul, he had commanded the Midland Battalion, an' commanded thim well, too, all thro' the campaign, an' now that all the fightin' wuz over an' the glory jist comin' in, fer to die ov brain fever—purty hard loines—wuzn't it, sor?

On the way down the river we heard that Big Bear had bin captured, an' whin we got to Prince Albert on the 8th the Gineril had a pow wow wid him, an' we seen him fer the first toime. He wuz a dirty lookin' ould divil, wid a face on him as big as a whiskey barrel an' wid jist about as much expression in it. He is, or wuz, a plain Cree, an' a dam plain wan at that, about 60 years old, an' doesn't know what the truth is.

We got as far as Grand Rapids on the 12th ov July an' rode in little tram cars as far as the boat landin', where we wuz put on big barges an' towed through Lake Winnipeg, a distance ov about 300 moiles, an' wuzn't it rough? Well, oi shud say so.

BACK IN OLD ONTARIO.

Thin we goes down the Red River to Selkirk, gettin' there on the 14th, an' thin pushed roight on to Winnipeg, reachin' there the same noight in a pourin' rain, by the bye. Sure an' we got an ilegant reception from the people in Winnipeg, an' took it as a kind ov a hint ov what wuz waitin' fer us at home. We stayed in Winnipeg a few days an' thin pushed on agin, reachin' Port Arthur on the 20th. Here we wint on board the steamer Athabasca, an' reached Owen Sound on the 23rd. We stopped there jist long enough fer to git a bite to ate, an' thin came on home to Toronto be cars. We struck the last "gap" at North Toronto about 5 o'clock, an' wuz "home agin," but not, as Lord Tennyson sez, "Not the six hundred"—some had bin killed—poor souls—some wounded, an' some were in the hospital in Winnipeg. Talk about a welcome, sor—why, sor, I cudn't describe it to ye if oi troied, so oi'd best stop befoore oi put me fut in it. Oi cudn't say too much, an' oi moight say too little. Anyhow it's glad we were fer to be back home after havin' travelled on fut, on cars, in waggins an' on boats 4,936 moiles, d'ye moind—and' not forgettin' the "bit" oi were tellin' ye about.

Well, sor, whin me toime expoired, sure an' tuck on agin an' agin after that, but oi had had to take me discharge an' drop out befoore me toime wuz up, fer I had a touch ov the roomaticks that wuz botherin' me so oi cudn't handle me roifle no longer, but God save ye, sor, me heart's in solderin' yit, so it is, an' always will be oim thinkin', an' oim proud ov the "Ould Rigimint," an' oim proud ov the medal oi have at home in me box, sor, fer it reminds me ov the panicky toimes in "eighty-foive," whin, "We wuz at Batoche, an'" as the Kahn sez, "fit at Fish Creek, too, by gosh." An' mebbe some day oil be after tellin' ye somethin' more ov what oi seen an' done in "eighty-foive," not forgettin' Sargint Hutchinson and' how the Gineril give him lave fer to wear shootin' medals—so he did—an' how Fred Curzon won the Victoria Cross—an' didn't git it nayther. An' mebbe ye'd loike fer to hear why Bill Urquhart wuz called the "Regimental Kicker," or why "Koko" an' Bob Newman shuk hands at Batoche, or what Harding an' Hazleton had to do wid the apple dumplin'. An' oi moight tell ye "How Beardy Gordon lost his appetoite," or why Pioneer Sheppard walked lame fer three weeks, an' praps oid give it away where Adam Taylor got thim boots an' how Bugler Impey got done out ov the rice

puddin'. An' thin ye moight loike to hear about Bob Dunn an' how he lost his arm, an' about the skull Pat Cronin' found hangin' on a tree—to say nuthin' ov "Curly" Johnston's spotted dog, an' Surgin Ryerson's gophers, an' lots an' lots ov thim things, but 'pon me sowl, sor, oi haven't the toime now, sor, an' anyway oi have such a turrible thrust on me that I cudn't tell ye no more if oi wanted to. That's all, sor, oi must be goin' now. Good-bye.
