Convocation—A procession will form up in front of the Redpath Library at 3.30 p.m. and march to the Royal Victoria College. Graduates will take their places in the procession on the College grounds, where they will be directed by the Marshall and his assistants.

Owing to the limited space available, it will be possible to issue very few tickets for guests. These will be for the gallery and for ladies only—wives of members of the Staff and of Graduates. Tickets will be issued at the Registrar's Office, Arts Building, East Wing, on Tuesday morning, October 5th, in the order of application.

Governors' Reception—9 p.m. The Principal and Lady Currie will receive in the new Arts Building. During the course of the evening a concert will be given in the Moyse Theatre and refreshments served. The Australian National Band will also give an open air concert on the campus.

The Library, Museum, Arts, Engineering, and Chemistry Buildings will be open to guests and the following special features will be presented:

Redpath Library—Exhibits of ancient and modern printing and of the Gest Chinese Research Library.

Chemistry and Mining Building—Departments of Mining and Metallurgy—Furnaces with automatic pyrometric control, and a complete testing plant for the treatment of ores of gold, silver, copper, or lead, will be in operation. The latter plant is a standard ore-dressing mill in miniature.


Dear Sir Arthur:

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE
MCGILL GRADUATES' SOCIETY.

It is my hope that all graduates who can attend the 1931 Reunion in October will do so. Your friendly and continued interest in McGill is part of our well-being, and that interest should be heightened and illuminated by a knowledge of the University's growth and progress from year to year.

Some evidences of growth and progress cannot fail to strike even the most casual observer. Since the Reunion of ten years ago, many new buildings have been erected, the most striking of which is the new Arts Building completed in 1926. Nor will women graduates fail to notice the large and handsome addition just made to the Royal Victoria College, whereby the accommodation is more than doubled.

Statistics of enrolment are just as striking. Since 1921 the registration in Arts has doubled and the staff of instructors nearly doubled. Similarly, in the Medical Faculty the number of instructors has greatly increased, but the notable feature here appears in the great number of full-time men.

Since 1921 the Graduate Faculty has been reorganized, and the increase in the enrolment of post-graduate students is truly remarkable. As evidence of the great growth of the Graduate Faculty, the Departments of Physics and Chemistry may be cited. Before 1919 only four candidates in all the previous years of McGill's existence had received the Ph.D. in Chemistry. Since 1919 sixty-four candidates have received this degree, one-third of whom now hold university teaching positions, fifteen in Canada and six in the United States. Since 1895 sixty-five degrees M.A. and twenty Ph.D. or D.Sc. have been granted in Physics, eighty-five degrees in all, of which thirty-two have been awarded within the last five years. Last year there were nearly two hundred and forty men and women doing post-graduate work at McGill, while those in this Faculty receiving degrees at the 1931 Convocation constituted one of the largest graduating classes. And so on through the Faculties and Departments.

Needless to say, physical equipment has more or less kept pace with personnel. But I do not wish to lay over-much stress on size and numbers. Rapidly increasing numbers, as most educationists agree, bring attendant

difficulties. Many of us are alive to these difficulties, in fact they bulk large in our day-to-day problems. But to some important inner developments, which do not so easily strike the observer, I venture to call your attention.

The old Arts Faculty is now known as the "Faculty of Arts and Science," and on both sides it has been greatly strengthened. Not only has this enabled us to add and improve courses of study; it has also infected staff and students with a generous enthusiasm. One of the most striking changes is the position occupied by the biological sciences in the 1931-32 curriculum, compared with their position before 1920. At that time there was at McGill no full-time Chair of Pharmacology, or of Biochemistry or of Bacteriology; there was no "Research Professor" of Physiology, in fact, the teaching Professor of Physiology stood alone in his department, without assistants, and without even a laboratory boy. With the completion of the Biological Building in 1922, housing the Departments of Physiology, Pharmacology, Biochemistry, Botany and Zoology, McGill definitely turned towards the building up of an outstanding position in the biological sciences. Today research work is in active operation, and Tait and Babkin in Physiology, Stehle in Pharmacology, Collip in Biochemistry and Murray in Bacteriology constitute a very eminent group. The biological sciences are now general university subjects, having their place in the curriculum of the Faculty of Arts and Science as well as in that of the Faculty of Medicine.

The Graduate Faculty, meantime, has been achieving quiet triumphs in the success of its students after leaving our doors. In one or two departments the achievements of our post graduate students have been most notable.

In the Faculty of Applied Science, henceforth to be called the "Faculty of Engineering," special efforts have been made over a period of years to assess the most important needs and to compare ourselves with other institutions, where such comparison is helpful. That these efforts have not been vain may be seen from the place which the graduates of this Faculty fill not only in the life of Canada but in the world at large.

The Department of Agriculture at Macdonald College has contributed at many points to the welfare of the rural community, and there are many research projects under study from which splendid results have already been achieved, while the promise for the future is bright indeed. More and more is Macdonald College becoming a research institution.

I feel that under Dean Corbett the Faculty of Law has made splendid progress. At the 1931 Convocation the graduate class was not only one of the largest within the last ten years, but, what is more important, every man but one had already obtained a university degree. In fact, in Law as well as in Medicine, 95% of the students are already graduates of another Faculty.

The decade has witnessed very marked changes in the Medical Faculty. New buildings include the Pathological Institute, the Biological Building, the Laboratory for Experimental Surgery and Animal House, and the Osler Library. But there have been changes also in the general policy with respect to the administration of the school, the standards of admission, the qualifications for the degree, and in the teaching and the teaching staff. In 1920 reasonable doubts were expressed as to whether McGill at that time occupied a place in the first flight of medical schools of this Continent. Since Professor C. F. Martin became Dean, these doubts have disappeared, let up hope never to return. Our Medical School is still pre-eminent.

But it would be tedious to make a long catalogue. Let me add a couple of instances merely to show what I mean by the enthusiastic spirit of McGill—and in matters that reach far and wide beyond her borders.


Last winter Douglas Clarke, Dean of the Conservatory of Music, snatched the opportunity out of a very untoward situation to create the Montreal Symphony Orchestra. In this effort he had the enthusiastic support of many of the staff in all Faculties, and of their wives. This orchestra has been an undreamt-of boon to the community of Montreal and to a radio community far beyond Montreal.

Another example: some members of the staff have made a concerted effort to co-operate with the necessary authorities in improving the work of the schools and in aligning courses in the Arts Faculty and in the High Schools. Certain McGill professors in the past have always shown a vital interest in the work of the schools, but the recent effort, through a happy organization of interests and with the skilful aid of F. Clarke, Professor of Education, has already achieved promise of notable results. Hitherto, we have concentrated on the selection of good professors: from henceforth we shall attend also to the creation of a select class of good students, who will be better fitted to profit by higher education. It is contemplated that the Honours students will in turn re-enter the schools as teachers, and bring about a needed quickening there.

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




7. Tablet - Dr. Thornton.

The quinquennial Reunion of Graduates of McGill University takes place next month from the 14th to 17th of October inclusive. We expect graduates here from all over the Continent, and in connection with the ceremonies to be held on the different days there will be a Convocation on October 14th, when we expect that some four or five distinguished graduates will receive the degree of LL.D. honoris causa.

It is the wish of the Graduates' Society, in which the Deans of the University concur, that you accept the degree of Doctor of Laws honoris causa on that occasion, and that you address the graduates. They feel, and in this I most warmly concur, that now is an appropriate time for a man occupying the position you do to make an appeal to University men and women to play the part that university graduates should play in these days of anxiety. They believe that never were we more in need of straight and sane and honest thinking, and never was there an occasion more appropriate for the display in the service of the state of those qualities which should characterise the educated man.

There are two things I would ask you to bear in mind in making your reply. In the first place, the University would consider it an honour to honour you, and believes that you might possibly regard it as an encouragement to you in these anxious days. In the second place, you will have an audience all of whom are university graduates. They ought to be worth speaking to, and a message to them should have a far-reaching effect.

The matter does not become official until approved by Corporation, which meets on October 2nd, but I may say to you that I have never known Corporation do otherwise than approve of a recommendation unanimously made by the Deans and myself. Nothing can be said of it publicly until after Corporation meets, but I am giving you this early intimation in order that you may have more time to consider what would be appropriate to say.

May I hope for a favourable reply?
