TION IN LABOR DISPUTES.

By Edward D. Balentine, Former Member of the N. J. House of Assembly.) An objection that seemed fixed in the minds of many men and women who otherwise would have joined in the trades union movement in years past trades union movement in years past was the fear that emblazoned in the

dogma of the union was the fateful "strike"—with its attendant doubtful consequences. The "lockout" was a bugbear of like significance.

The strike and lockout, so indiscriminately used in the past as the means to nately used in the past as the means to the settlement of industrial disputes, tho never fully discarded by either employer or employe, are put in force now only in the most drastic cases. Gradually there has come to the minds of the employer and employe a realization that each has rights demanding respect, one for the other; that a degree of patience and tolerance must accompany relationships borne of the industrial conditions of the day.

Conciliation and arbitration have evolved, and these are but steps in the direction of better things ultimate-

That the minds of thousands of men and women workers have opened up and imbibed the peaceful influences that conciliation and arbitration have compelled is shown in the steady growth of the unions in the past ten years—the period of time that might be claimed for the practical and successful application of these pacific

The International Typographical Union may be employed as an excellent criterion to portray the benefits that may be obtained thru the channels of conciliation and arbitration. Secretary John W. Hays in his annual report for 1911, says: "The wages of members have increased \$69,263.84 per week, or \$3,601.714.48 for the year. During 1911 the earnings per member reached the high total of \$974.13 for the year. This is probably the highest average maintained by any labor organization in the world whose members are employed in a mechanical industry."

Charles B. Francis president of the Employing Printers' League of America, stated that the strike for the eight-hour day by the commercial to be striked. eight-hour day by the commercial job printers a number of years ago cost the contending parties between \$25,-000,000 and \$30,000,000. 

Other members of parliament must find out that the cure for most of the troubles now existing in the west is in parliament.

Parliament is also the place where the tariff of this country must be settled, and where a policy of protection must be asserted, and where the minister of customs ought to say (if he is a protectionist and believes in protection) that he intends to enforce a law because it is protectionist; but if he thinks it is an unjust law he intends to repeal it in parliament. But a protectionist minister should not say he collects a duty only where the law makes him.

Parliament is also the place to settle the marriage law of this country; we ought not to have to go to courts to find out what parliament's powers are. Let the parliament of this country assert its jurisdiction, not question it. A man who is questioning his own abilities all the time is a poor man to be on the job, and a political party who has only such jurisdiction as a court of justice chooses to award it, on a hypothetical reference, is not much of a political party.

Again The World says that the most necessary thing in Canada to-day is the sitting of parliament to deal with questions that ought to be dealt with and which have not yet been dealt with. These are among them: The railway grievances of the west, and also of the east; the banking and currency question; the marriage question; the tariff question, whether this is a protectionist country or not, and things of this kind.

And lastly, parliament is the best place of all to declare our naval policy. It is what parliament thinks should be our naval policy, not the advice that the mother country gives that should make our naval policy. Canada, is sovereign in this matter and ought to assert her sovereignty and it should not be necessary even for the prime minister of this country to go to England and ask what Canada should do. Parliament is the place for the Canadian people to find out their duty to empire and there to assert it. A parliament in session and a parment with courage would be a grand

General Feeling Among Ruralites is That Trunk Line Should Run From Toronto

Major Sam Sharpe, M.P., has been idding a series of public meetings ruout the riding of North Ontario to seuss rural mail delivery and hydrocetric power in the midland district.

At these meetings, which were largely attended, non-political committees were appointed to study their districts and meet at general committee meetings to lay out the whole riding in a comprehensive way so as to be served by rural mail delivery. Several routes are already established, and as soon as the plans are ready, it is hoped by Major Sharpe to have the whole constituency effectively served with daily mails.

Want Hydro-Electric.

The farmers also displayed keen interest in the hydro-electric power question, and the general impression prevalls that this midland district is being neglected. Resolutions were passed unanimously by the ratepayers of the Townships of Mara, Thorah, Brock. Scott and Uxbridge, calling upon their councils to appoint representatives to co-operate with other townships from Toronto to Brechin to press upon the hydro-electric commission the necessity of having this district served.

Trunk Line.

The general feeling was that a trunk line should be run from Toronto thru the County of Ontario serving Scarboro Junction, Agincourt, Umionville, Markham, Stouffville, Goodwood, Uxbridge, Blackwater, Sunderland, Cannington, Woodville, Lorneville Junction, Beaverton and Brechin. Once secure co-operation of these places and the rich, populous territory tributory to them, there should be no further delay in having hydro-electric power serving this district. If only a fe wplaces apply for power, the rates would be prohibitive but with all co-operating, the price would be within the reach of all.

Also it is felt that once the hydro electric was secured for this district it would not be long before a electric railway line would be running thru this district, which is one of the richest in the whole Dominion of Canada.

Artificial warming of the world





