CARRANZA PRY TO MEXICAN PLOT AGAINST THE U. S.

Senator Fall Makes Public Information of Designs—Carranza's Letters Implicate Him—Scheme to Foment Strikes, and Eventually Recover the Border States—Negotiations With Japan. Washington, Dec. 8.—Evidence that Carranza in Mexico with the knowledge and support of President Carranza, plotted to foment strikes in the United States and to seize the border states acquired by the American government in 1848, is contained in the memorandum presented to President Wilson by Senator Fall, of New Mexico, chairman of the foreign relations sub-committee investigating the Mexican situation.

FURNISHED BAIL ON OWN INITIATIVE

Friend of Jenkins Says He Wanted to Avert International Trouble.

Mexico City, Dec. 8.—J. Salter Hansen, who furnished the bail upon which W. O. Jenkins, the American consular agent at Puebla, was released last Thursday night, declared, in a statement last night, that he had acted on his own initiative. Mr. Hansen said:

"I wish to say the following: On Tuesday morning last, on account of certain facts that came to my attention, which I am in no position to disclose, I suddenly realized that was between the United States and Mexico was inevitable unless one of the two governments was ready to sacrifice its honor, prestige and dignity by receding from the dangerous position into which it was forced.

"I therefore took all the steps necessary to effect the immediate release on bail of W. O. Jenkins and relieve the tension, I did so spontaneously, and of my own initiative, and I am ready and willing to take upon myself the full responsibility of credit, according to the point of view."

BOARDING-HOUSE FOR PILGRIMS

Rome, Dec. 8.—In order to provide work for the unemployed, the Vatican has ordered the construction of a huge boarding-house for the accommodation of visiting pilgrims, and has directed the erection of other buildings.

IMPERATOR TOOK ON TOO MUCH COAL?

Washington, Dec. 8.—The former German liner Emperor, now under the British flag, will not be permitted to leave New York, officials said today, until the railroad administration has completed its investigation of charges that the vessel had taken on six thousand tons of coal when her fuel permit called for only 2,500 tons. It was intimated that if the facts warranted prosecution would be undertaken for violation of the Lever fuel and coal control act.

CONDEMNED TRAITOR ON NAPLES PLATFORM

Sentenced to Be Shot for Desertion, He Claims Benefit of Amnesty.

Naples, Sunday, Dec. 7.—Deputy Misiano, who, before his election to the chamber of deputies, during his absence from the country, was condemned by a military court to be shot as a deserter, and who served a term of imprisonment in Germany for participating in the Spartacist rising, presided at a meeting of the Chamber of Labor here today. He delivered an inflammatory speech.

DEMAND TRIAL AS TRAITOR

Milan, Dec. 8.—The Liberal Association has addressed to the premier, the presidents of the chamber of deputies and the senate and the ministers of justice and war, a petition asking that in the name of the dignity of Italy and in the name of those fallen in the war, Deputy Misiano, "already condemned to death by shooting as a deserter," be immediately placed on trial as a traitor to his country. The petition states that this should be done as a sign of the contempt of all Italians.

APPROVES DISMISSAL OF ROMANCING AVIATOR

Washington, Dec. 8.—Sentence of dismissal imposed by a naval court martial on Captain Edmund George Chamberlain, an aviator in the marine corps, on charges growing out of his sensational stories of having defeated a vastly superior force of German airplanes on the western front, was approved today by Secretary Daniels of the navy department.

Launch Big Government Ship; Will Go on Australian Route

Vancouver, Dec. 8.—The Canadian Importer, a steel ship of 8,100 tons, and the first of four to be constructed in the Coughlan yards for the Canadian government, was launched successfully Saturday afternoon, sponsored by Mrs. R. C. Cooper, wife of the federal member for South Vancouver.

Rome, Dec. 8.—Major Giauritti, treasurer of the cause of Gabriele d'Annunzio, the Italian insurgent leader, accompanied by Commander Rizzo of the d'Annunzio naval forces, arrived here today from Fiume. It would not be surprising, however, if some statement was soon made by Dr. Grayson. The extraordinary precautions taken to guard the president's sick room, which have given such offense to leading members of congress, are attributed to the orders of Dr. Grayson and the natural anxiety of Mrs. Wilson to protect the president from any excitement or undue tax upon his strength.

Calls for a Regent

Chicago, Dec. 8.—(Special)—The Tribune, owned and edited by Senator Medill McCormick, is out with a long editorial about the president's condition. The Tribune declares that the president is clearly suffering from a "disability" within the meaning of the constitution, and the vice-president should therefore act in his stead. If the illness is likely to continue until the close of the presidential term the Tribune argues that congress should so declare, and insist upon Vice-President Marshall to assume the duties of president.

Charges Are Made

The Tribune has been a bitter opponent of Mr. Wilson and his administration. The charges made in the editorial as to the present situation are, however, so startling and direct as to challenge public attention. The editorial says in part:

This came after the speeches of Premier Clemenceau, Jules Siegfried, the oldest member of the chamber, and Jean Francoist, the youngest deputy, who has been selected by the members from Alsace and Lorraine to speak for them.

Close St. Lawrence Navigation; Nearly All Ships Leave Montreal

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—Navigation is closing on the St. Lawrence River, and practically all vessels have already left Montreal. Deputy Minister Alex. Johnson of the marine department stated that a large number of vessels were at present between Montreal and the sea. It is said that the river will be cleared of boats without any trouble as the weather is mild. This is about the usual time for the close of navigation on the St. Lawrence.

The occasion was the finishing touch to the many events that have marked the celebration of the golden jubilee of the firm, and gave graphic emphasis to the contrast between the opening fifty years ago, when four employees were the foundation for the 11,000 of today.

CITY OF TORONTO WELCOMES ADMIRAL DOCTORS DIFFERED DIAGNOSING CASE Lord and Lady Jellicoe Officially Honored by City Fathers.

The official city reception to Admiral Lord Jellicoe and Lady Jellicoe was a brilliant success yesterday afternoon. The council chamber looked like a garden in flowers—flowers and plants were everywhere and helped to make the usual sombre chamber a place of beauty for once in its civic career. A notable throng of citizens gathered in the garden and on the balcony to do honor to the admiral. Amongst those noticed were Sir John Eaton, Aemilius Jarvis, Sir Frederick Stupart, Col. Denison, Mr. M. Mowbray, M.P., Dr. Sheard, M.P., Senator A. C. Macdonell, Miss Church, and nearly all the controllers and aldermen with their women folk.

When the admiral and his party arrived at the city hall they were welcomed by a very large crowd and loudly cheered. Mayor Church received the party and conducted them to the council chamber, everyone rising at their entrance. With Lady Jellicoe seated on his left hand and the admiral on his right the mayor called for three cheers for Lord Jellicoe, which were given with great heartiness. The mayor next read an official address of welcome to the admiral. He said in part: "Toronto Proud. In common with the rest of the empire, the people of Toronto are intensely proud of the long and honorable record of the British navy and the mercantile marine, and we are glad to have this opportunity of recognizing one of its admirals who is a fitting personification to us of its bravest, its devotion to duty and its heroic spirit."

Lord Jellicoe, in reply, declared the mayor's kind words have gone right to his heart. His one regret was that his visit was very short, but his duties and business with the Canadian government rendered a long stay impossible. He felt very deeply the references to the navy. "I am particularly glad," said his lordship, "that you have bracketed the two services together on this occasion. We are really only one service in the cause of the empire. "I trust that I may be of some use to the government of Canada in the work that has brought me to Canada. It is needless to say that I will do my best. Grateful to Toronto. "I thank you for Lady Jellicoe for the wishes which you have addressed to us personally. We are very proud of having the privilege of visiting citizens who have done so much for Canada and the empire during the war, and I would like to add that it is an additional privilege for me and for Lady Jellicoe to meet here this afternoon so many of the representative citizens of Toronto, both inside and outside the city hall, and tell how deeply we feel the kindly welcome that has met us wherever we have been in Toronto. I would like to have seen a great deal more of Toronto and its citizens."

After the admiral and three cheers for the King, Lord and Lady Jellicoe then held an informal reception, shaking hands with the citizens present as they passed before them. A magnificent bouquet of American Beauty roses was presented to Lady Jellicoe by the city on her arrival at the hall. Before leaving the city hall the admiral had a conversation with Norman Menzies, a Toronto man, who fought at Jutland with the fourth flotilla, which had six out of eight ships sunk.

"I do not know whether the typewritten notice of this sale was a matter purporting to be signed by Albert Grigg, as deputy minister, is a letter that has your authority or whether it was a letter which, under authority of your predecessor, the area involved is 128 square miles. The deputy minister's letter is dated Toronto, Nov. 13, and the tenders are to be in by the 5th day of December. The time for tendering is suspiciously short, having regard to the distance between Toronto and Port Arthur and the failure to advertise.

COAL SITUATION STILL SERIOUS Fuel Controller May Have to Fix Temperatures in Buildings.

Fuel Commissioner H. A. Harrington declared yesterday that although some was reaching Ontario, the country was by no means out of the woods yet. A few cars were coming in from the States every day, but it would be weeks before it would be possible to catch up with the shortage. Two hundred cars of soft coal are needed to meet the daily requirements of Toronto and vicinity, he said. He had only received 22 cars in eleven or twelve days, and there was no likelihood that he would get any more than 22 cars a day for some time. All this, he declared, would show the need for the utmost conservation. In referring to supplies for hospitals the commissioner said, "I may say that there is every desire on the part of hospitals and public utilities to assist in conserving fuel. N. L. Griffin, engineer under the fuel administration, showed them how by mixing screenings with their soft coal, they could obtain good results for heating, and they immediately fell in line."

Genians Played Safe The Germans only came out three or four times. They were wise, he thought, in staying at home. There had been a few German submarines on the ocean when the war broke out. Some of them were near home, but all disappeared from the sea some days ago. The war ships also disappeared after doing some damage. Only three or four ships had been lost, while after Trafalgar we lost over 100 merchant vessels. During the American civil war two Confederate raiders were captured. C. M. Colquhoun, who opposed the application on behalf of the city, is of the opinion that the court's decision of yesterday will end the matter. J. H. Moss, K.C., counsel for the Toronto and York Radial, says it is up to the company to decide whether or not the case will be carried further.

Hydro-Electric in Eastern Ontario.

With the success of the Hydro-Electric system among the western municipalities it is natural that those in the eastern sections of Ontario should desire to share in the benefits of the distribution of power at cost.

In a meeting at Brockville yesterday, where probably the most violent opposition had centred, a strong stand was taken by representatives of the eastern municipalities in favor of forming an Eastern Ontario Hydro-Electric Union, similar to that in the west.

The organization of eastern Ontario will strengthen the hands of the commission in dealing with the federal government about the St. Lawrence power development. The possibility of all this power, their rightful heritage, being lost to the eastern municipalities, undoubtedly has had an influence in bringing about the organization.

Don't Cripple Street Car Democracy.

Mr. Ballantyne, the Labor candidate for mayor, effectively argues for the greater democratization of the street railway management when it becomes a civic undertaking. An effort may be made to misrepresent the Labor party's position as unfriendly to public ownership because it criticizes the form in which the transportation proposition will be submitted to the people on January 1.

Mr. Ballantyne is for a paid commission that is open to all citizens, and not confined to property owners. Every argument that applies to the payment of the mayor, the controllers and aldermen, and the Hydro Commission, and to members of the legislature and of parliament, applies to membership of the transportation board.

There are many reasons why the powers are unwilling to renew a state of war with Germany. The world faces starvation, bankruptcy and revolution. Nothing that Germany may do or not do at this time would compare in importance with these actual conditions.

As Mr. Ballantyne says, it is the people who use the street railway system who give it all its value. To confine the commission to representatives may lead to a board being appointed of whom rides in a street car once a year.
