NINETEENTH YEAR. PRINCE BISMARCK'S DEATH WAS PAINLESS.

The Iron Chancellor's Iron Constitution at Last Gives Way—Death Came Painlessly—"Thanks, My Child," Were His Last Words, Addressed to His Daughter.

Berlin, July 30.—Prince Bismarck died at Friedrichsruhe shortly before 11 p.m. Death had not been expected during the day.

DEATH WAS PAINLESS. The Prince's Last Words Were, "Thanks, My Child," Addressed to His Daughter.

London, July 31.—A special despatch to the Associated Press says the news of Prince Bismarck's death reached Berlin at a late hour and was only generally known this morning.

The Tagblatt this morning issued a Bismarck supplement. The Lokal Anzeiger prints the fullest details from its special correspondent at Friedrichsruhe, but the other papers, misled by Dr. Schweiniger's and the family's misleading statements regarding the Prince's condition, made no provision to obtain news of his death.

The Nachrichten gives the fullest details of the last days and death of Bismarck. It says: "On Thursday evening an improvement came in the Prince's condition, in which repeated changes for the worse had occurred since October last, and he was able to appear at the table and take part in the conversation, drinking champagne and afterwards smoking several pipes, which he had not done lately.

"His condition was so satisfactory that Dr. Schweiniger, after the Prince had gone to bed, left with the intention of returning Saturday. His condition was comparatively satisfactory throughout Friday and Saturday morning. He read the papers and conversed on politics, particularly referring to Russian affairs. In the forenoon he took luncheon, grumbling jocularly at the small proportion of spirits in his drinking water. Then a sudden change for the worse occurred, in consequence of an acute attack of pulmonary oedema, and in the course of the afternoon he frequently became unconscious.

"Recently, besides periods of unusual mental clearness, the Prince had had intervals of drowsiness, falling into long, sound and beneficial sleep, on awakening from which he would be completely refreshed. "On Saturday evening grave symptoms appeared. Death came easily and painlessly. Dr. Schweiniger was able to some extent to lighten the last moments.

His Last Words. "The last words Prince Bismarck uttered were addressed to his daughter, Countess Von Rantzau, who wiped away the perspiration from his forehead. They were: "Thanks, my child." "The whole family were assembled at the bedside at the time of his death; Dr. Schweiniger, Dr. Chrysdander, Baron and Baroness Merck were also present. As no breathing movement or pulse was perceptible for three minutes, Dr. Schweiniger declared it quiet and simply that the Prince was dead.

Dr. Schweiniger telegraphed the news to Emperor William in Norway. "The Prince lies as he used to sleep, in an easy position, with his head slightly inclined to the left. The expression on his face is mild and peaceful. "In accordance with Prince Bismarck's wish he will be buried upon the hill opposite the Castle in the vicinity of Hirschgrupp."

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SIR CHARLES TUPPER REACHED MONTREAL YESTERDAY, HAVING ARRIVED PER STEAMER NUMIDIAN.

Change in the Conservative Policy Owing to the Quebec Conference—Government Will Have Support of Opposition in Any Patriotic Cause—Heavy Receipts at Custom House—Montreal News.

Montreal, July 31.—(Special.)—Sir Charles Tupper arrived here to-day, having come to Quebec in the Numidian, and thence by the Maritime Express from Lewis.

Being interviewed by The World, the Conservative leader expressed some important views regarding his future policy. He stated that before he left for England it was understood that a vigorous campaign would be entered upon by the leaders of the Conservative party. The coming conference at Quebec, he said, had changed this.

It was well known he had little confidence in the Canadian members of the Quebec conference, but other interests than those of the party had to be considered. This, he held, was one of the most important periods in the history of Canada, and he was not in favor of a policy that would in any way weaken the hands of the men sent to Quebec to represent the interests of the country.

The Conservative party, he added, had always placed the interests of Canada before party, and hence the decision he had reached in view of the meeting at Quebec. He said that had the Conservatives gone on with the vigorous campaign decided upon when he left Canada, they would place the Government and its representatives at Quebec in the most humiliating position in the eyes of Canada and the world.

The American representatives might ask with truth: Why treat with men who no longer possessed the confidence of their country? and the Ottawa Government would be at least in a most embarrassing condition. Sir Charles said it was now or never. He believed that the present was the most favorable opportunity that could ever present itself for a union of the two countries.

Speaking of Hon. Mr. Tweedie's refusal to adhere to the Monton resolutions, Sir Charles Tupper said: "So much the worse for Mr. Tweedie. However, the character of his Conservatism was pretty well shown when he used his influence to elect Mr. Blair."

The chief aim will remain here a few days and then proceed to Cape Breton, not having visited his constituency since the general elections. Heavy Receipts of Customs. DEATH OF HIS GRACE ARCHBISHOP WALSH

The Summons Came Suddenly Shortly Before Midnight—Unspeakable Grief When the Tidings Were Known—Sketch of the Archbishop's Career—Loving Tributes—Funeral Arrangements.

Archbishop Walsh is dead! Such was the news which at midnight spread over the city and created the most unfeigned regret on every hand. It could hardly be believed, for a week or two ago the eminent prelate was in the best of health, discharging his important duties. The accident which he sustained three weeks ago, whilst inspecting the proposed new cemetery in North Toronto, was believed to be only trivial and to necessitate but a temporary withdrawal from active work. Such was the fond hope alike of friends and physicians, hoping, alas, to be ruthlessly dashed, and to-day there is universal mourning in Toronto. His Grace will be one whose praises were heard not alone in the Archdiocese of Toronto, the Diocese of London, which he had previously served, but throughout the whole of Canada and far beyond. Subjoined are the details of the Archbishop's life, indicating his absorbing love for his native land and for the church to which he dedicated his life. As a citizen of Toronto His Grace will be mourned by all parties and creeds, for since his arrival in our midst, now nearly nine years ago, the Archbishop had taken the liveliest interest in the city's affairs and shown himself to be large-hearted and sympathetic. Not only was he an eloquent preacher, but on the platform his voice was raised for whatever was philanthropic and ennobling. His virtues were unostentatious, but generally acknowledged, and in his sudden demise the poor and the sufferer have indeed lost a friend. Cheerful of disposition, condescending in manner, and

profound ecclesiastical prudence and wisdom, and for the broad spirit of catholicity that conciliated adverse opinions without compromising in the least the principles he held dear. He left standing monuments of his episcopal energy and zeal in the many beautiful churches and educational institutions which he founded and fostered in the Diocese of London. He continued and completed the splendid work since his arrival in Toronto. He will be generally mourned by Canadians of all classes and creeds, and by the citizens of Toronto in particular, for the large influence for good exercised by his liberal and amiable character.

His Literary Work. Continuing his splendid and spontaneous panegyric, Father Ryan said: "The Archbishop was distinguished as a writer on the various subjects of ecclesiastical and social importance. "His luminous pastorals, nearly all on the subjects of Catholic theology, have been long before the public in pamphlet and book form. He contributed frequently to the leading reviews of Canada and the United States, and his latest presentation of Catholic doctrine appearing in the Canadian Encyclopedia, is in itself sufficient evidence of his vast erudition, his clearness of diction and his simple beauty of style. He has left unfinished matter prepared and arranged by himself in manuscript and printed form to fill half a dozen excellent and instructive volumes on the most interesting subjects of the day. It is to be hoped that his executors, or those in charge of his affairs, will

It was just 10.40 o'clock when he crossed the bar. The last perhaps of the lily of his charge to converse with the late prelate were Messrs. Eugene O'Keefe and Thomas Long. It was about 8.30 then and the conspicuous absence of any premonition was evident, for His Grace dwelt almost entirely on such homely topics as the weather and the crops.

Funeral Arrangements. Bells tolled this morning the solemn notification of his taking off. At his own request, made last winter, the Archbishop's remains will be buried on Thursday in St. Michael's Cathedral, under the altar of the Blessed Virgin. The body will lie in state in the Cathedral Wednesday and Wednesday night. The prelates and priests, both of Ontario and Quebec, will be notified of his demise to-day, and are expected to attend the obsequies in large numbers. Bishop Dowling of Hamilton, as senior Bishop of Ontario, will preach the funeral sermon.

Brief Biography. The deceased Archbishop was the son of the late James Walsh, by his wife, Ellen Macdonald, and was born in the parish of Moonshod, County Kilkenny, Ireland, May 23, 1830, his preparatory studies being conducted at St. John's College, Waterford, where he also took one year in theology. Coming to Canada, April, 1852, he entered the Grand Seminary, Montreal, and in the following year received tonsure from Bishop La Roche, and minor orders from

Universal sorrow will fall upon Toronto to-day at the sudden taking off of such a distinguished and beloved citizen. The grief, felt by his own priests and people is too deep for words of ours. To them he was really a father and their sorrow will be that of bereaved and broken-hearted children. To all the citizens of Toronto he was ever the courteous, Christian gentleman, the kind adviser and the amiable friend."

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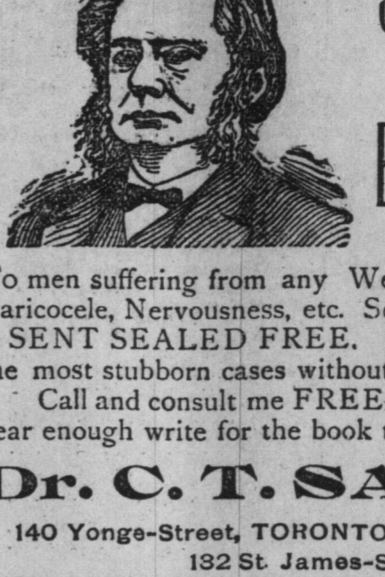

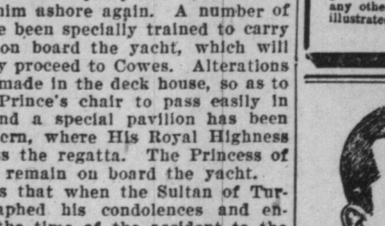

THORN'S EXECUTION

Preparations Under Way at Sing Sing to Execute the Executioner

Slag Slag, N. Y., July 30.—Martin Thorn, the Glenside murderer, has but a few hours more of life in Sing Sing Prison, as Monday morning he will expire his crime in the electric chair.

Thorn is awaiting the hour of his execution with apparently little concern. He is exhibiting remarkable nerve and says he will go to the chair without flinching.

State electrician Davis arrived at the prison Sunday to remain till after Thorn has been executed.

Thorn has suddenly become a vegetarian. What his opinion upon the subject is, he has not been asked.

When this merely a matter of to-day it might be set down as one of the idiosyncrasies of the unfortunate nature that dwells in the body of Thorn. But it is not the idle fancy of a day.

There are four guards at Thorn's cell, constituting the death watch. Alexander Van Wart and Philip Morris are the day guards. George Fox and Keeper O'Keefe relieve them at 6 o'clock in the evening.

When the meals are passed in through the narrow aperture provided for the purpose, the warden and his assistants keep a strict vigilance on the condemned prisoner to see that he makes no attempt to communicate with his associates or to administer the food to himself in any unusual way, which might endanger life.

Thorn Must Die. Albany, N. Y., July 30.—Governor Black has decided not to interfere in the case of Martin Thorn, condemned to death for the murder of Glenside.

Triplets—All Girls. Trenton, July 30.—Mrs. Joseph Lavine of 624 South Warren street, yesterday gave the mother of triplets, all girls. One of the three is much smaller than her sisters, and weighs but three pounds. Mother and daughters are doing well. The latter are Russian Jews, the husband 34 and wife 32 years old.

Another Theft. Camden, N. J., July 30.—The three little triplets, who were the subject of the case of the mother of triplets, who came into the home of Pete Smith, 441 Mechanic street, are attracting a deal of attention. Many persons from the neighborhood and from remote parts of the city have called at the home to see the triplets, and Smith would "go to Halifax" for the pleasure of welcoming her to the shores of the finest country, far none, that lays out of doors.

One of Gilmore's Mills Burned. Cambridge, Ont., July 30.—At 2 o'clock this morning fire destroyed the Gilmore Co.'s flour mill, situated about two miles north of here. The cause of the fire is unknown, as the mill has not been working this season. The residence, stable, office and lumber were saved.

Thomas Johnson of lot 25, concession A, Newboro, was in the city on Saturday reports having failed five years of full wheat of the Genesee Giant variety, which he expects to yield at 40 bushels per acre.

WHEAT MARKETS OF A WEEK.

Movements on Both Sides of the Atlantic.

Effect of Incoming Crops on the Situation — Marked Decline in Prices at Chicago and Liverpool — Loss of Premium of War by Futures Over Remote Options.

Saturday Evening, July 30. The week ending today has been marked by a decided depression in wheat values. On the Chicago market the July article has slumped about 30c a bushel, while the more remote options for September and December delivery have lost about 40c.

The past seven days have witnessed a loss of the prospect of big crops on the other side of the Atlantic, resulting in a heavy fall in the European market; and another source of the heavy feeling is, of course, to be found in the prospect of a bumper harvest in Canada and the United States. Farmers' supply is expected to be heavy, and with some previous years, but immense reserves are looked for in the immediate future.

On the Liverpool No. 1 Cal. spot has declined 4d per cental in a Cal. spot, red winter 3d, the September delivery 4d and the December option 3d per cental.

The European market has advanced away below the American parity, owing to the predicted big French crop, reports of small harvests in all deliveries since last Saturday.

Feature of the past seven days, it will be noticed, has been the lessening of the premium which nearby deliveries have for a long time maintained over the more remote options. This is due to the partial removal of the fear that the stock of old wheat would not hold out until the grain was ready for milling.

THE WEEK'S STOCK MARKETS

Movement in American and Canadian Securities.

Irregularity Has Marked Wall St. Since Last Saturday — Leading Factors in the Situation — Canadian Stocks Quiet But Steady With Some Strong.

Saturday Evening, July 30. Inactivity has continued to characterize the Canadian security market all week.
