



Treatment of Sewage.

"Numerous investigations have been made by the City Engineer and myself as to methods likely to prove suitable for the City of Toronto. Various cities have been visited, where precipitation and treatment of sewage is adopted, and, whilst so far there has been no city upon this continent where an amount of sewage treated equals that yielded by the City of Toronto, the processes in vogue in the various cities throughout the United States appear to give satisfaction.

At Madison, Wisconsin, the process of ferrozone and polarite is being tried. The sewage is at first received into tanks and treated with ferrozone, which precipitates a considerable amount of sludge. The sludge is then passed on to beds of polarite. These beds are underdrained with tile for a distance of about eight inches, then made up with broken stone, fine took and sand, for 13 inches more, and covered with a layer of polarite of about a foot in thickness, with a top dressing of six inches of sand, polarite being a compound of magnetic oxide and carbide of from, with silica lime and aluminal in insoluble form.

"I further feel that the possibilities of the septic tank system should be thoroughly and carefully investigated. The septic tank system consists in a closed, air-tight, dark tank, divided into two compartments, into which the sewage is received and operated intermittently. These operate practically as settling tanks, without chemicals, the sewage being allowed to rest in these tanks for a certain period, during which the bacteria consume the noxfous material contained therein. After a certain time the effluent is discharged, either on to filter beds or into an adjacent stream, according to its character.

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
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
