Ottawa, March 29.—(Staff Special.)—Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved in the house today that on and after Tuesday, April 5, next, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway resolutions should be the first order of the day till the question is disposed of.

The house then went into committee of supply, taking up the public works estimates. A hot discussion arose on the appropriation of \$30,000 for the London drill hall and armory.

Mr. Sutherland said the London armory would not be completed before December, 1904.



ROSS THREE AND THE GOOD MISSING LIBERAL MEMBERS ARRIVED ON EARLY TRAINS AND STOPPED THE TALKING.

After being continuously in session for seventeen hours, the legislature adjourned at 8.20 yesterday morning. The early morning trains brought in the three missing Liberal members, and as soon as Whip Bowman mobilized his forces the division was taken, the usual majority of three being recorded.

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THE HOG MARKET.

Four Seventy-Five Quoted as the Toronto Price,

But the Packers and Drivers are Paying More at Other Points.

The hog market continues unsatisfactory. The packers and drivers are not giving out the correct quotations. We quote below what they are really paying. Farmers and dealers all over Ontario are endorsing the World's contention that there should be only one price and that that price ought to be honestly stated. Here are a few specific cases which go to show that the packers paid more than \$4.75, as given out yesterday:

At Listowel on Monday the Fearman Company of Hamilton paid \$4.65 on the cars; to this 10 cents commission to the drover; 40 cents for freight and shrinkage make \$5.15 a hundred. Why then quote \$4.75?

At Hamilton the packing house there offered the farmers \$4.40; at Corrie, 13 miles away, they paid \$4.50, and commission and freight would make the price over \$5.00.

At points east of Toronto \$4.50 to \$4.60 was freely paid, making the Toronto price from \$5 to \$5.10.

A very responsible dealer, notwithstanding that \$4.75 had been given out as the Toronto price, said they were worth, and he was paying \$4.55 to \$4.50.

The Toronto price is therefore about \$5, but given out as \$4.75. This two-price system is coming home to farmer no drover.

Mr. Flavell is feeling better from the West Indies to restore order in a demoralizing trade. A number of well-known drovers have told The World that they intend to keep out of the business until conditions improve.

In Chicago on Monday hogs were \$5.30 up, and 28,000 were sold. In Buffalo \$6.00 was quoted. It would have paid Canadians to have paid \$1.50 duty on each hog and sold in Buffalo.

The Chicago packers have done their best to hammer down the price of hogs, but they have failed. Prices of bacon in England justify the belief that present prices of hogs favor the packer. He ought to share with the farmer and drover.

A Chicago firm has just got in 2000 receipts from nearly every county in Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Indiana, South Dakota and Minnesota. These receipts show extremely light supply of hogs for the next 60 to 90 days.

Wheat and other cereal prices were at a rather low level for a number of years, and that a cycle of higher prices for these commodities is due. In recent years the grain men of the Toronto Board of Trade, The World gleaned the information that there is a possibility of even higher prices for wheat, but this will be governed to a large extent by the prospects of the winter wheat crop, and the outlook for the spring seeding.

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

Councillor Wright Suggests That Junction Get Back Ownership of Light Service.

SKATING RINK PAYS GOOD DIVIDEND

Dak Ridges Squadron of G.G.B.G. to Recruit in the County With Yeomen.

Toronto Junction, March 29.—The property committee of the town council met tonight, and for a long time discussed the unsatisfactory electric light service furnished the town. Superintendent Hardy stated that he did not think the town was receiving the 22,000 volts which the agreement with the Stark T. L. & P. Co. calls for, and that the lamps on the streets are being over-energized. It was decided to purchase a meter to be attached to the switchboard, so that the voltage can be ascertained at any time. Councillor Jesse Wright favored amending the contract so that the Stark Company had no right to violate the contract in the past, with little guarantee of their doing so in the future, that it would be advisable to cancel the agreement, and for the town to run its own electric light plant again.

The Suburban Railway wants the boiler in the old electric light plant again.

Several cars ran off the track at Woodbine-avenue this afternoon, but were got on again without great difficulty, but about 6 o'clock another car left the track, and the present car was stuck on the sand that it had to be jacked up. STORY OF FIGHT MARCH 27 MAPS ALMOST SUCCEEDED

Roadstead Entrance to Port Arthur Closed Up With the Exception of Small Space.

Washington, D.C., March 29.—The Japanese legation has received from Tokyo the following official report made by Admiral Togo respecting the second attempt to bottle up the Port Arthur squadron:

"About 8:30 a.m. of the 27th of March the bottling up squadron, composed of four ships, escorted by our torpedo boat destroyer flotilla and torpedo boat flotilla, reached outside of Port Arthur and without minding the searchlights and the enemy's searchlight boats, proceeded straight toward the entrance of the harbor.

"At about two marine leagues from the entrance of the harbor the bottling up squadron was discovered by the enemy. Thereupon the shore batteries and guardships showered hot fire upon the squadron, but in spite of a terrific fire the ships made their way into the inner roadstead, one after the other. The steamer Chiyu Maru anchored at a position about a half cable from the Golden Hill, blew up herself and sank. The Fukui Maru passed a little ahead of the Chiyu Maru by its left side, and at the moment when the Fukui Maru was shot by the enemy's destroyers and sank in that position. Hachi Hikio Maru anchored to the left of Fukui Maru and blew up itself and sank. Yoneyama Maru, colliding with the stern of one of the enemy's torpedo boats, was disabled between the Chiyu Maru and Fukui Maru and anchored in the middle of roadstead. At that moment the ship was shot by a torpedo from the enemy and consequently, by reason of that torpedo, was carried ashore on the left side shore and sank sideways. The result of the action being as above described there is some space left between Hachi Hikio Maru and Yoneyama Maru. It is a matter of regret that the roadstead could not be completely closed up.

The casualties were as follows: "Killed, Commander Hirose, one under officer and two sailors. "Seriously wounded, Sub-Lieut. Shimada.

"Slightly wounded, Lieut. Masaki, engineer Kurita and six sailors. The remainder were safely taken in by our torpedo boat destroyer flotilla and torpedo boat flotilla.

"Of the torpedo boat flotilla, the Oosaka and the Tsushima, while escorting the bottling up squadron, were about one mile from the entrance of Port Arthur engaged in a fight with our torpedo boat destroyer flotilla and inflicted serious damage on her. The enemy's ship retreated, raising an enormous quantity of steam as if her boiler was broken.

An Historic Squadron. Last night at the weekly parade of the Governor-General's Body Guard, Major (retired) General Charles Fry was received with satisfaction by the people of the northern part of the County of York, being that "C" squadron (Old Riders) will recruit north of Toronto as formerly, the Battalion troop (McLeod or Oak Ridges) and the Denison troop, now "A" squadron, are among the oldest cavalry organizations in Canada. The "C" squadron takes temporary command of "B" squadron, and Capt. D. W. Warren, commanding the N.C.O.'s of "B" squadron will now be Squadron Quartermaster-Sergeant. Sergeants A. D. Wheeler, G. B. Warren, J. A. Thompson, W. J. Whentley and Corporals H. Booley, Craddock, Schell, McKeane, Woolley, with Corporals Martin and Vaughan, comprising the "B" squadron (commanded so long by Lt.-Col. "Dunn") commences its new career in the shape of a beautiful mounted squadron (Oak Ridges) will keep up traditions and a high standard of efficiency made up of the best class of young men from the north country. "A" squadron, which has been in the service of the province for nearly a hundred years, is rapidly fitted up to its increased establishment of 100 men. The recruit class will continue every Tuesday and Friday evenings, under Sergeant Livingston.

Not an Increase. Editor World: In a report of the Milk Producers' Association, published in the World, it was stated that the price of milk has been increased for the summer months to \$1.15 per can, delivered in Toronto. Dowager Queen and Kaiser. Rome, March 29.—The meeting between Dowager Queen Margherita and Emperor William occurred to-day. Queen Margherita boarded the Italian battle ship Re Umberto at Gaeta, and went to meet Emperor William, who was on his way from Naples to Gaeta on board the Imperial yacht Hohenzollern. The two ships met at sea. Emperor William boarded the Re Umberto and after half an hour's chat the queen accompanied his majesty on board the Hohenzollern, where they had lunch.

Embassier's Long Term. Boston, Mass., March 29.—Wallace H. Hall, formerly Boston manager of the American Surety Company of New York, who has been in the city for not less than 15 nor more than 20 years in the state prison at hard labor. Hall last week pleaded guilty to two indictments charging him with the embezzlement of nearly a quarter of a million dollars from the company and from the estate of Mrs. C. H. C. and was sentenced to the State Prison for Convicts at Sing Sing, N. Y., for a term of 10 years.

Begun Murders Vice-Consul. Buenos Ayres, Argentina, March 29. Herr Dufay, the German vice-consul at Salta, has been murdered in revenge by an Italian beggar, who was arrested.
