TO INCREASE TAX ON BANKS

Princed Edward Island Government Will Assess on Basis of Percentage of Business.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., March 31.—(Special).—The provincial government intends to increase the tax on banks by assessing at 1-15 of one per cent on the average monthly business on loans advanced. The minimum tax is \$1,000. Formerly the tax was \$1,000 on all banks without regard to the amount of business.

It calls it the Children's School Farm. It is a great success, as is another conducted in connection with Public School No. 4, in the heart of the New York Ghetto.

Notable progress has been made in Boston, but as a result of private effort, several school gardens being established. At the State Normal School at Hingham, Mass., school garden work is centralized with class room work, and there is a summer normal course for teachers.

Worcester, Mass., had 27 school gardens last year, but they were the result of the efforts of teachers and private individuals.

Yonkers, New York, has a very successful garden started by private subscription. It now covers 1.34 acres of ground, divided into 230 plots.

In Rochester, N. Y., the school authorities grade and sod the school yards, while the shrubbery and other planting is done by private effort in conjunction with the children.

In Hartford, Connecticut, a School of Horticulture offers to children and teachers a practical course in horticulture and agriculture.

This review deals with the progress made in only a few cities, but it is significant of a movement that is steadily gaining in popularity. In this province there are some school gardens, and the people more generally should give the movement their support.

The Consolidated School at those who visited it, and what is done there may be done in a smaller way in very many school districts of New Brunswick.

There has just been completed at Pittsburg the first of twenty-five new electric locomotives for the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad.

The difference between this and other types of electric engines is that it is operated by the alternating electric current, single phase system, and it is so constructed that the locomotive will draw its steam engine from the road entirely.

The first locomotive, now ready for the rails, weighs 78 tons, and is equipped with four 400 horse-power motors, which make it considerably more powerful than the ordinary steam engine.

The Westinghouse people guarantee that the locomotive will pull a train of 250 tons between New York and Boston at a speed of 70 miles an hour.

Illustrative of the tremendous rush of new settlers into Edmonton, a despatch of March 28th says:—"A thousand settlers packed into ten coaches arrived yesterday at the Strathcona terminal of the C. & E. Many of them crossed to the Edmonton side of the river and immediately sought the land office.

The Ontario Alliance asks Premier Whitney to amend the proposed new liquor license law that "no brewer, distiller or holder of a liquor license, shall be allowed to sell for delivery, to take orders for, or deliver liquor in any municipality where local option is in force, or where no license is issued."

Toronto is securing new industries. The Star says: "Assessment Commissioner Forman states that he has just about closed a sale of two acres of land in the north-western part of the city, upon which a large industry will be established to give employment to 300 employees.

IN THE LABOR WORLD

The New Jersey factory laws are being rigidly enforced.

The lack of employment which, during the last year or two, has prevailed at Munich, Germany, has brought about the formation of a municipal insurance against unemployment, the corporation having decided to contribute an annual grant of \$3,000 marks for three years.

The New York local of the Brotherhood of Carpenters have begun a fight against the use of non-union wood-trimmers, which within the last 10 years has caused many strikes.

F. J. McGuire, one of the founders of the American Federation of Labor and long secretary-treasurer of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, died at his home in Camden, Pa., recently aged fifty-three.

The Illinois Supreme Court has handed down an opinion affirming a decision of the Cook County Court in favoring members of Franklin Roosevelt's Union No. 4 full industrial assembly on non-union men and fining the union for illegal conspiracy. The supreme court holds that the strikers had no right to pocket change, and that the union can be held liable as a corporation.

The wages of about 800 firemen on the Illinois Central Railroad have been increased from 19 to 20 cents per day.

The Postoffice Clerks' Union of San Francisco has presented a bill to congress providing for an eight-hour day in that branch of the service.

The house committee on labor decided to make a favorable report of a bill appropriating \$300,000 for a compilation of full statistics by the department of commerce and labor on the condition of women and children workers throughout the United States.

Ten thousand cab drivers of Berlin, Germany, struck a protest against the police prohibiting cabs from crossing the Potsdamer Platz, where traffic is the thickest. They resumed work later, but have adopted a resolution to strike on all holidays until the obnoxious regulation is rescinded.

During 1905, 11,023 Japanese and 4,929 Koreans came into the United States against 14,382 Japanese and 1,906 Koreans in 1904, a decrease of \$48. The decrease of Japanese immigration has been attributed to the war, but it is a peculiar fact that the most noticeable decrease has taken place since the inauguration of agriculture for coalminers.

At the end of last year 47,213 Chinese "miners" were working in the Transvaal mines under contracts, and 2,000 more were on their way.

A British blue book was issued recently giving the voluminous report of the Royal Commission on Trade Disputes and Obstructions. The commission recommends the passing of an act declaring trade unions to be legal associations and strikes legal unless accompanied by violence or breach of contract, and also declaring that permission to strike, apart from the power of a breach of contract, is not illegal.

Several leading plantations in the Hawaiian Islands have agreed to meet the terms insisted upon by Secretary Atkinson for the importation of European settlers, including an allowance of at least one acre homestead for each family. It is believed that enough plantations have accepted Secretary Atkinson's terms to insure a heavy immigration of Portuguese or other Europeans.

The Sydney (Australia) undertakers and the employes' union have agreed to a compromise permitting funerals on Sunday, Christmas, Good Friday, and the union's picnic day, on payment of double wages to employes on those days. The arbitration court has amended the award in accordance with the compromise.

The average number of laborers employed daily at the docks and principal wharves in London, Eng., during the four weeks ended January 29, was 12,283, a decrease of 4.6 per cent. on a month previously, and 5.1 per cent. on a year previously.

Ohio coal operators have decided not to concede the demands of the miners for an increase in wages. Since the action was taken by the Illinois operators.

No less than 118 employes' unions and 272 employes' unions were registered under the New Zealand Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, the end of September last. Besides those there were 18 associations of workers' unions and three federated employes' organizations registered, making the large total of 407 unions registered under the Arbitration act.

In the 271 trade unions, with a total membership of 288,121 making returns to the British Board of Trade, 81,014 (or 47 per cent.) were unemployed at the end of January, 1906, as compared with 49 at the end of December, 1905, and 68 at the end of January, 1905.

The United Labor League of Alabama, after working in Birmingham and leaving no complete control of the city government, steps were taken at the recent state convention of the California Building Trades Council to organize a state labor party and capture the state government.

Kalamazoo Trades and Labor Council referred the matter of taking positions independent of the two old parties to a referendum vote of affiliated unions.

The strike of ship stokers, which began at Tuzla, Hungary, some time ago for an increase of wages, has now become general in the local shipyards. Over 7,000 men are out.

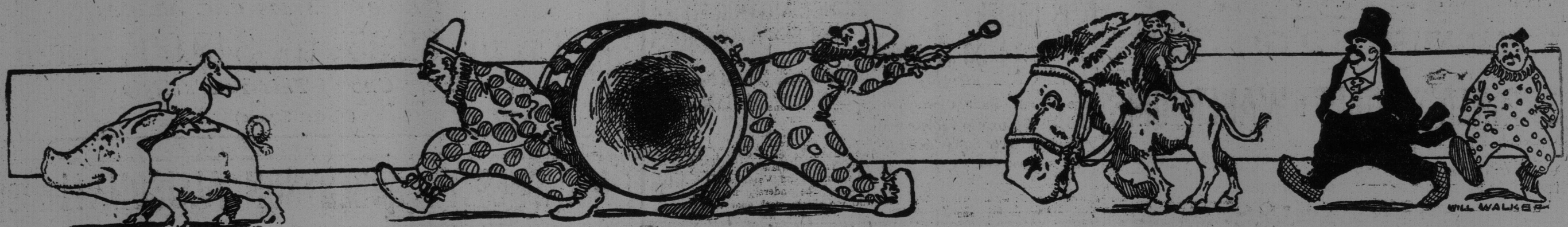
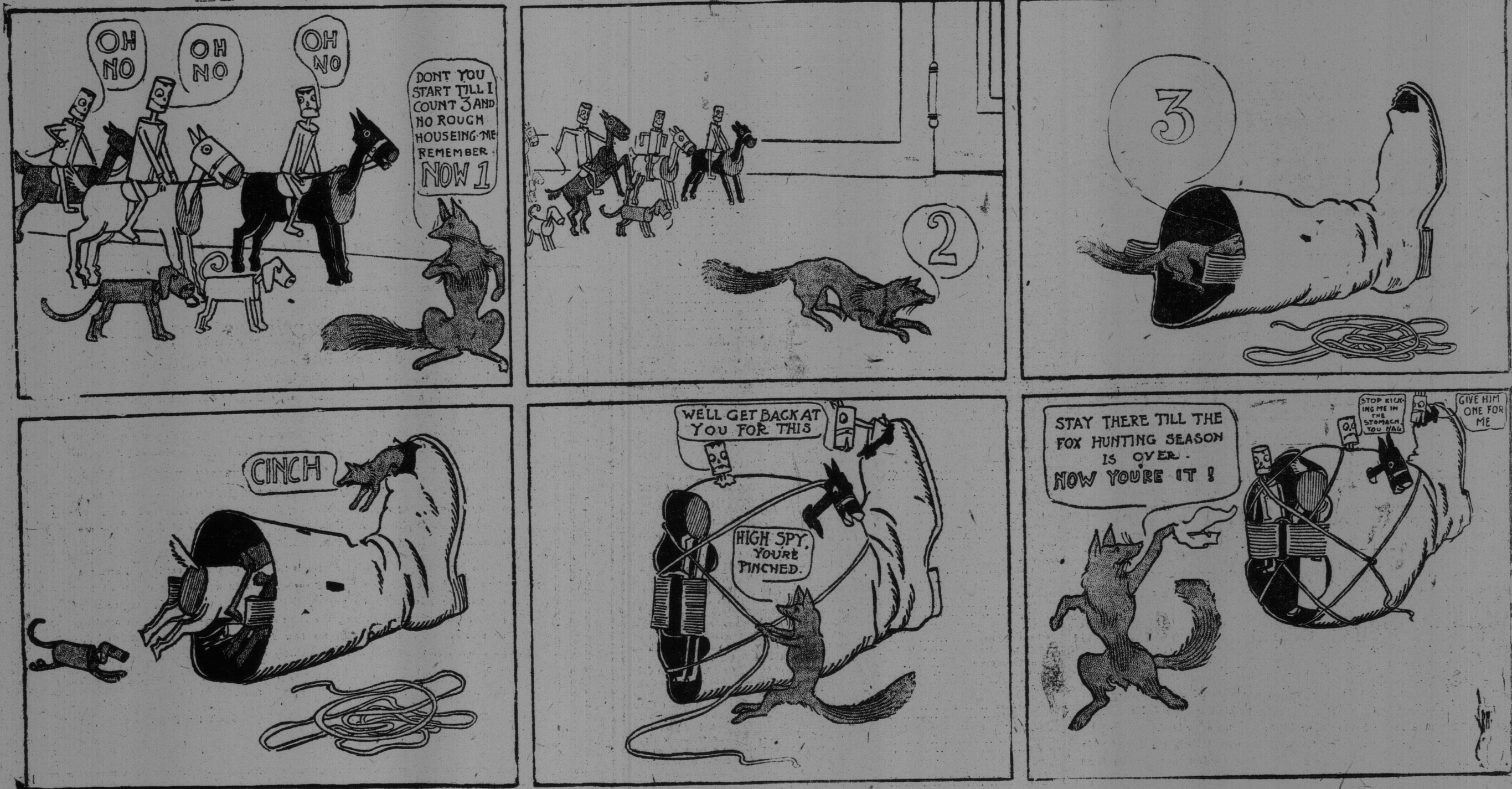
