Diredions for ublaining a good fock of Sheep.
By John Brale Budley, efq.

AMONG the attenisons to theep, it is particularly recommended so farmers that they lo only a few ewes run at large with a ran tor giving a few early lambs; that the gett of the ewes be kepl fe sarate from the rams, till the middle of October, and then be allowed a ram to tweniy, or at molt twenty-five. The lambs will come trein the middle to the ond of March. It is allo advantage-
ous to keep ewe and ram lambs apart 18 or 20 months, from Janusry or March till October, the enfuing y/ar, betore they be fuffered to go together. It is beft that there be not more than one ram with a divifion of ewes, at a time when they can be parcelled off into different fillds, or lots for two or three weeks.
To obferve the ages of theep is unportant-Some age ought to be fixed on by the fariner, beyond which noting thould induce him to keep them. At the thearing time, the mouth of every theep and lamb is to be infpec. ted; and the lambs having blackifh gums, or that are not ftraight, well made and promifing, are to be marked for fale; as alfo the aged rams, ewec, and wethers, whatever be the age fixed on by the farmer for clearing his flock from old thep, be it four or five years; which feem to be the ages for goversing us in this particular, in the climate of America. As many lambs, the beft, are to be turned out for breeders, and for muttons, proportioned as there are theep to be difpofed of as being aged, and a few more to fupply toff: $s$, while they aregrowing up?

The larmer will firft detemmine on the numbef of grown fheep to be kept by him; then on the age he means to obferve for difpofing of them; for he is to h ve none in his flock which are not ir. full vigor. Dividing the number in the whole flock by the age at which the means to difpofe of them, gives the number of lambs which he is to turn out as a fupply to the fame rumbir of theep, to be difpofed of from the ols ftock: and a le more lambs are to be turned out with the fion li limbs, tormaking good any liffes. ## RECEIPTS.

To keep green peas till Chrifimas.
Take fine young peas, fhell thern, throw them inte a cullender to drain, then lay a cloth four or five times double on a tablo, and fpread them thereon; dry them well and have your botles ready, fill them and cever them with matten fuet fat ; when it is a little cool, fill the necks almoft to the top, cork them and tie a bladder \& a leather over them in a cool, dry place.
7. keep whice bullace, pearplumbs, or damfons, Eoc. for tarts, or pies.
Gather them when full grown, and jut as they begin to turn. Pick all the largeft out ; fave about two thirds of the fruit; to the otber third put as muctr water
as you think will cover them, boil and skim them; when the fruit is boiled very foft, if rain it thro' a coar re Hair fieve, and to every quart of this liquor put a pound and an half of fugar, boil it and skin it very well; then throw in your truit, juft give them a fcald, take them of the fire, and when cold put them into bottles with wide mouths, pour your fyrup over, lay on a piece of white paper, and cover them with oil.
?- preferve poofeberries, damfons, or plumbs.
Gather them, when dry, tull grown, and not ripe; pick them one by one, put them into glafs tottles that are very clean and dry, and cork them clofe with new cork ; then put a ketile of wat: $r$ on the fire, and put in the boites with care; wet not the corks but let the water coine up to the necks; make a gentle fire till they are a lit le roddlet, and turn whate; do not take them up till cold, then pilch the corks all over, or wax them clufe, and fet them in a cool dry cellar.

## Topreferve peaches.

Put your peaches in ooiling water, juft give them a fcald, but do not let them boil; take them out, put them in cold water, then dry them in a fieve, and pur them in long wide mouthedbotiles : to halt a pound of peachas take a quarter of a pounci of fugar, clarify it, pour it over your peaches, and fill the botles with brandy; Itop them clofe, and keep them in a dry cellar.

## To prafarve cherrics.

Take two pounds of clerries, one pound and an half of fupgr, half a pint of tair water, mell your fugar in "1; when it is melted, pur in yourcherries; boll hem fort. Iy at firft, thein quicker, and kim them ; lake thern off two or three times and thake them; pur them on agaun and let tham boil faft: When they are of a good color, and the fyrup will liand, they are dune enough.

## Topictle cabbage.

## To piokle anewombers.

Let your cucumbers bo fmall, frefh gathered, and free from fpots; make a brine of lalt and water ftrong enough to bear an egg; boil this pickle, fkim it well, thea pour it upon the cncumbers, and five them down for twenty-four hours; then frain them out into a cullender, dry them with a cioth, and take the beft wititewine vinegar, with cloves, Diced mace, nutmeg, white pepper coras, long pepper and races of ginger (as mnck as you pleafe, boil them up togethor and then clap the cucumbers in, with a few vine leaves, and a litile faltLet them fimmer in this pickle till they are green, taking eare not to let them bail; put them into jarr, five them down clofe, and when cold, tie on a blado der and leather.

## To pickle onioms.

Take fmall onions, peel them, lay them in falt and water a day, and fhift them in that time once; then dry them in a cloth, and take forne white wine vinegar, cloves, mace, and a little pepper; boil this picklo and pour over them, and when it is cold, cover it clofe. To pishic beans.
Gather them before they have frings, and put them in a very frrong brine of water and fal , 1 they are yellow ; then drain them from the brine, put boiling hot vinegas to them, and Aop then clofe twenty four hours; do fo four or five days following, and they will turn green; then put to a peck of beans half an ounce of cloves and mace, and as much pepper.

## To make currant wiwe.

Gather your currants when the weather is dry, and they are full ripe; Arip them carefully from the ftalk, put them into a pan, and bruife them with a wooden perf. tle; let it fland about 24 horrs, after which fyain it thro' a fieve. Add three pounds of fine powder fugas to every four quaris of the liquor; and then thaking or firring it well, fill your veffel, and put abour a quart of brandy to every feven gallons: as foon as it is fille, botthe it off.-to fine liquor, for every twenty gallons, take
the whites of ten eggs, and a fmall handful of large falt, beat them together to a froth, mix them with a quart of more of the liquor, and pour this into the veffel: it will be fine in a few days.

length arrived at the fpot, and without taking notice of fome fellows who were fauntering about the place, defcended by ropes into the vault; no fooner were they let down than they were prefented with a fpectacle which fruck them with horror: Two genilenen apparently flarved to death, laid before them; one of thefe unhappy vietims had a tablet in his hand, on which was written in very pathetic language, the flory of their lamentable fate. It feems they were brothers of raik and family in Venice, and having in the courfe of their travels entruffed themfelves with one of the natives, for the purpofe of vifuing the catacombs, the perfidious villain had left them there to perifl. The danger to which mr. Hill and his friends were expofed, inftantly alarmed them; they had fcarcely read the tale, when looking up, they beheld their inhuman guide, affilfed by two others whom they had feen near the fpot, clofing the entrance into the vaul, they were now reduced to the utmoft diftrefs; however they drew their fwords, and were determined to make fome defperate effort to refcue themfeives from a fcene fo truly dreadful; with this refolution they were groping about at random in the dark, when they were flariled at the groans of fome one feemingly in the agonies of death. They attended to the difmal found, and at length, by the glimmering light from the top of the catacomb, they faw a man juit murdered, and a little beyond they difcoverad his inhuman murderers fleeing with the utmoft precipitation; they purfued them immediately, and tho' not able to come up with them they however had the good fortune to reach the opening through which thefe wretches efeaped out of the cavern, betore they had time to roll the flone on the top of it. Thus mr. Hill and bis friends were by a miracle faved.

It was placed at the entrance of the harbor, with the right foot fanding on one fide of the land, and the left on the other: the talleft thips with their malls failed into the haven between the legs of it; and when it was throun down on the ground by an earthquake, few men were able to embrace the latile finger of this prodigious fatue; the brafs of whi.h it was made luaded nine hundred camels.

A conflagration having reduced to athes one of the principal moiques of Cairo, the muffelmen imputed this calamity to the hatred of the chriftians; and without examining if fuch an accufation was well founded or not, feveral young people ran to the quarter inhabited by chrifians, and fer fire to it, by way of reprifal.

Such an ourrage deferved the fevereft punifhment: the governor caufed the perpretrators to be apprehended ; but as the number was very great, he could not refolve to doom to death fo many young perfons, who were hurried into this excefs more by paffion than malice.

As many lots were thrown into an urn, as a mounted to the number of culprits: fome few of thefe were marked, death; and all the others condemned the drawers only to the correction of rod.

When they had all drawn their lots out of the fatal urn, one of thole deftined to death, cried out in a tranfport of grief, "I do not regret the lofs of life; but how will my parents, overwhelmed with forrow, and reduced to the greateft milery, be able to live without my affiffance."

One of thofe that had efcaped death, replied to him that was lamenting his fate: "Friend, I have neither father nor mother; my life is of no ufe to any one ; give me your lot, and take mine." The furptifing facrifice excited the admiration of every one prefent, and the governor who was informed of it, reprieved both the criminals.

THERE are two forts of people in the world, who, with equal degrees of health and wealth, and the other comforts of life, become, the one happy, and the other miferable. This arifes very much from the different views in which they confider things, perfons, \& events -and the effects of thofe diffrent views upon their own minds.

In whatever fituation men cen be placerl, they may find conveniencies and inconveniencies: in whatever company, they may find perfons and convarfations more or lefs pleafing : at vibatfoever table, they may meet with meats and drinks of better and worfe ta fe, difhes better and worfe dreffed. In whatever climate, they will find good and bad weather: under whatever government, they will find good and bad laws, and good and bad adminittration of ithofe laws. In every poem, (or work of genime) they may fee faults and beautics. In almoft every face and evary perfon, they may difcover fine features and defects, good and bal qualities.

Under thefe circumitances, the two fors of penple abovementioned fix their attention, thofe who are difpofed tobe happy on the conventence of thing, the pleafant parts of converfation, the well dreffed dithss, and goodnefs of the wines, the fine weather, \&zc. and enjoy all with chearfulnefs. Thofe who are to b un iappy think and Speak only of the contraries: hence they are continuaily difeontented themfelves, and by thele remarks, four the pleafures of fociety, off:od perfonaliy many people, and make themfelves every where difagreeable. It this turn of mind was formed in nature, fuch unhappy perfons would be the more to be piltud. But as the difpolition to cr:'icife and be difgulted, is perhaps, taken up originally by imitation, and is unawares grown into a habi, which, tho' at prefent frong,
may neverthelefs be cured, when thofe who have it are convinced of its bad effects on their felicity. I hope this little admonition ma be of fervice to them-and put them on changing a habit, which, tho' in the exercife it is chiefly an act of imagination, yet has ferious cenfequences in life, as it brings on real griefs and miffortunes. For as many are offended by, and nobody loves, this furt of people, no one thows them more than the moft common civility and refpect,and fcarcely that; and this frequently puts them out of humor, and draws them into difputes and contentions. If they aim at obtaining fome advantage in rank or fortune, nobody wifhes them fuccefs, or will ftir a tep or (peak a word to favonr their pretenfions. If they incur public cenfure or difgrace, no one will defend or excufe, and may join to aggravate their mifconduct, and render them completely odious. If thefe people will not change this bad habit, and condefcend to be pleafed with what is pleafing, without fretting themfelves and others about the contraries, it is good for others to avoid an acquaintance with them, which is always difagreeable, and fometimes very inconvenient, efpecially when one fiads hinfelf entangled in their quarrels.

An old philofophical friend of mine, was grown, from experience, very cautious in this particular, and carefully avoided any intimacy with fuch people. He had, like other philofophers, a thermometer to thew him the heat of the weather, and a barometer to mark when it was likely to prove good or bad; but there being no inftrument invented to difcover, at firit fight, this unpleafing difpofition in a perfon, he, for that purpofe, made ufe of his legs, one of which was remarkably handfome, the other, by fome accident, crooked and ileformed. If a ftranger, at the firt interview, regarded his ugly lg more than his handfome, one, he doubted him: If he fpe ke it and took no no:ice of the hansfome leg, that was fufficient to determine my philofoph-
