CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION.

(As Revised 14th August, 1889.)

1. That this Association be called the "PROVINCE OF QUEBEC RIFLE Association," and shall have for its object the encouragement of rifle shooting in the Province.

2. Any person subscribing Two Dollars to the funds of the Association shall be a member thereof for the year in which such subscription shall be made.

3. A donation of Twenty Dollars in cash, at any one time, for that express purpose, or of a prize of not less value than Forty Dollars, to be competed for at the Annual Prize Meeting, shall make the donor eligible for election as a Life Member at next Annual Meeting of Council.

4. Any regularly constituted Rifle Association or Corps subscribing Ten Dollars or upwards, per annum, to the funds of the Association shall be considered as being in connection with it, and shall be entitled to a number of memberships, for competition only, in proportion of one for every dollar so subscribed. The Association thus atfiliating is to select from its members the persons to hold such memberships.

5. There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons, named by the Council. (The Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec for the ime being, shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron." 6. There shall be a President, to be elected at the Annual Business Meeting of the Association.

7. There shall be four Vice-Presidents—one for each Brigade Major's Division—to be elected in the same manner as the President.

8. There shall be a Council composed as follows, viz. :

2nd One representative member from each Affiiliated Association or corps in this Province.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, the District Deputy Adjutants-General of Militia and Brigade-Måjors of the Province of Quebec, shall be members *ex-officio* of the Council. Five members of Council shall form a quorum; and in the event of vacancies occurring in the elective members, from any cause whatever, the remaining members of the Council shall have the prower of filling such vacancies. All members of Council, excepting representatives of Affiliated Associations, must be individual members of the Association.

10. Representatives to the Council shall be chosen by the Association they represent, and the names of delegates, when chang-d, shall be sent to the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

11. The Council shall, at its first meeting, choose from its members a Chairman.

12. There shall be a Secretary and a Treasurer, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure.

13. The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire managem Associati to them into effec

14. The Council shall be regulated in their proceedings by such By-laws as may from time to time be enacted by them; no By-law being in any case altered, or new one proposed, without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each member of Council.

15. The Annual Prize Meeting shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the Council; and the prizes shall be competed for in accordance with such regulations as may be passed from time to time by the Council.

16. An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, and shall (having been previously submitted to the Council), be published as soon after the Prize Meeting as may be found pra:ticable.

17. An Annual Business Meeting of the members of the Association, for the election of Officers and Council, who shall assume office on the first day of succeeding January, and the transaction of other business, shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on by the By-laws.

18. No alteration in the Constitution shall be made except by a resolution duly passed at the Annual Business Meeting, or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary one month at least, previous to the Annual Business Meeting at which the same is to be proposed; and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all members of the Association of such proposed amendments, and also to post them on the bulletin board at the opening of the Annual Matches.

BY-LAWS.

(As Revised 5th May, 1881.)

1. The Annual Business Meeting of the Association shall be held on the second day of the Annual Matches.

2. There shall be two Ordinary Meetings of the Council, the first of which shall be held immediately after the Annual Business Meeting of the Association, and the second at such other time, as the Council may then determine upon.

3. Extraordinary Meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required, by any six members of the Council, notification being sent to each member of Council at least ten days previous to such meeting; and the requisition for the meeting, and the notices to the members, must state the object or objects of such Extraordinary Meetings.

4. The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings at all meetings, which shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary, open to the inspection of all members of the Council, and published with the Annual Report.

5. There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three members of the Council to be chosen at their first meeting.

6. The Treasurer shall deposit from time to time, in such chartered Bank as the Finance Committee may direct, all sums of money received by him on behalf of the Association.

7. All expenditure for current expenses which may be required by the Se retary, must be authorized by the signature of a member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner. Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.

8. A detailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditures shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer.

Your Council in reporting the proceedings of the past year, can congratulate the members on a slight improvement over the year 1895.

SUGGESTIONS FROM LAST YEAR.

To begin with the suggestions from last year, we regret to report that owing to the change of the Government, and the short time the present Minister of Militia has been in office, the question of the assumption by the Department, of the telephone lines belonging to the Association on the Cote St. Luc Ranges has not been arranged : in fact, the prospect of the issue in the near future to the whole Militia of the Lee-Metford or Lee-Enfield rifle, raises the question whether the present ranges will be retained by the Department or not. Certainly, in their present state they are quite unfit for use, and the estimated cost of repairing them is so large that it would possibly be more economical to remove to larger and more convenient ranges at once. In this case, the telephone lines would be of no use. We would urge, however, that the matter be not lost sight of by the new Council.

The suggested grant from the City Corporation also remains in abeyance, owing to the advice of a prominent official, who stated "no funds were available." This also might be looked after, as we see a new loan has been authorized.

The M. A. R. A. reported that they had derived no revenue from the use of the telephone, so had nothing to pay over.

FINANCES.

As will be seen from the financial statement, the collections from outside sources have not been as large as in past years.

The Quebec Government, as reported last year, voted us a grant of \$200.00. We have again applied for it, and requested the Honorable Treasurer to increase it. The Assembly is now in session, and it would probably be a good idea if some motion could be passed at this annual meeting urging the increasing of the grant to the old figure of \$500.00, and have the motion telegraphed to the Honorable Treasurer direct from the meeting.

The Hon. A. W. Morris is again looking after the interests of the Association, having gone to Quebec this week to see the Honorable Provincial Treasurer, and will urge the increasing of the grant.

Both the affiliated and individual memberships have increased this year, though the latter still lacks the support it should receive from the officers generally, in the different regiments throughout the Province. In fact, we may say that outside the City of Montreal, little or no financial aid is received.

The assets of the Association consist of the stock of articles stored on the ranges, list of which is attached, with valuation.

PRIZE MEETING.

The Annual Matches took place on Wednesday, the 12th August, and two following days, and were very successful. The weather was all that could be desired, and the scoring very high. The prize list was about \$2,000, exclusive of cups, trophies, badges, etc.

Owing to some dissatisfaction which existed regarding the English 1896 M. H. ammunition, which had been imported by the Department for the Dominion and Provincial Associations, application was made to the Department for an issue of 1894 D. C. M. H., which was duly granted. It was wrapped in the sizes required for the different matches, and issued to the competitors at the firing point. It turned out most satisfactory.

The matches were advertised as usual in the Military Gazette, and copies were mailed to the likely competitors, same as last year.

The following Committee was appointed to call on the Corporation of Montreal for the purpose of obtaining a grant to the funds of the Association, and were instructed to inform the Corporation that the City of Toronto voted \$400 annually, in addition to other prizes to the O. R. A.

EXECUTIVE.

A meeting of the Executive Committee was held in the 65th Armory, Montreal, Monday, the 13th July.

Present:—Lt.-Cols. Fraser, Massey and Hood, Majors Ibbotson and Busteed, Capt. Finlayson, Lieut. Desbarats, the Treasurer and the Secretary.

Lieut.-Colonel F. Massey was re-elected Chairman for the ensuing year.

A draft of the programme of the Matches for 1896 was submitted by the Secretary, accepted, and ordered to be printed.

Resolved—That the ammunition be wrapped in packages with the requisite number of rounds as required by the matches, and to be distributed at the firing points, the entrance fee to include ammunition and sighting shot.

Lt.-Colonel Mattice was appointed Executive Officer, Major Walsh Statistical Officer.

The Treasurer was authorized to issue a circular *re* subscriptions.

Dominion Government grant, also, to the Hon. Minister of Militia, for his prompt compliance with the requests of the Association.

The question of a grant from the City Corporation was discussed, and it was understood that the Committee who had the matter in charge had been advised by the City Treasurer to delay their application.

Notice was taken of the fact mentioned by the Statistical Officer that 14 possibles had been made in the Extra Series at 500 yards, and it was suggested that a complete re-organization of the Extra Series Match should be made. It was suggested that, for 1897, the regular matches should be fired at 15 targets, and that 5 targets on either flank should be reserved for Extra Series shooting. The prizes to consist of kind prizes only, no money to be added.

It was suggested that the bull's-eye should be reduced in size on the Extra Series target.

Meeting of Executive Committee was held in the Secretary's office, 20th August.

MEMBERSHIP.

Individual membership, \$2.00.

Affiliating Associations are entitled to ten (10) members' tickets and one badge on payment of \$10.00.

The above subscriptions must be paid on or before the 11th August. Twenty per cent. additional will be charged after that date.

Firing shall commence each day as ordered.

All firing shall be conducted under officers or persons appointed for the duty by the Executive Committee, and all competitors shall be under their authority.

NOTICE TO COMPETITORS.

1. Competitors must make themselves acquainted with the regulations, as also with the conditions of the Match for which they have entered, as in neither case will the plea of ignorance be entertained.

2. The Range Officers will decide disputes on the ground. Appeal from their decisions may be made in writing to the Executive Committee, whose decision will be final and without recourse. Their decision to be given in writing to the Secretary.

3. When at the firing point they must comply with all orders given by the Range Officer, or Officer in charge.

1.—GENERAL REGULATIONS.

I.—No active Militiaman shall shoot as a member of more than one corps.

II.—No non-commissioned officer or private, employed by the P.Q.R.A. for duty at the firing points or in the butts, shall shoot either for **a** prize or for practice during the meeting.

III.—In all competitions restricted to Active Militiamen or in which they shoot as such, the uniform of their corps shall be worn, and in accordance with the R. and O. of M., viz.:

1. Tunic, patrol or regulation fatigue jacket with waist belt. Elbow caps not allowed.

2. Trousers.

3. Regimental head-dress, or a cap cover, with or without a cap under it.

Cap Covers or puggerees may be worn over the regimental full or undress cap, and great coats or waterproofs over uniform.

All officers of the same corps must appear in the same order, as must also non-commissioned officers and privates, but where a duly authorized undress for officers exists, they may appear in it, although the noncommissioned officers and privates may be in full dress. Cross-belts need not be worn.

4. In competitions not restricted to the Active Militia, competitors must appear either in complete uniform or wholly in plain clothes. Any objection on the score of a competitor's dress must be raised *before* he takes up his position to shoot, or while he is shooting.

IV.—Competitors must submit their rifles and ammunition for inspection when required.

V.—Fixed artificial rests will not be allowed, except in the Skirmishing match.

VI.—Competitors may use a waterproof sheet, mat or great coat, not folded up, but laid flat on the ground; but no cork beds or elbow rests will be allowed, except those furnished by the Association.

VII.—No wiping out between shots will be permitted.

VIII.—No competitor shall load until he has taken his position at the firing point and the Register Keeper has given the word "All clear."

IX.—One sighting shot must be fired at each range in the aggregate Matches. Register Keeper will supply ammunition for it. Cost is included in entry fee.

X.-No sighting shots will be allowed in the Extra Series Matches.

XI.-No fouling shots allowed on the Range.

XII.—Slings may be used in all matches, but they must be of the Government length and pattern, white, brown or black, and attached to the rifles, as in Government arms. The greatest length of a Government sling is $54\frac{1}{2}$ inches, not including the tongue or the buckle.

IN INDIVIDUAL COMPETITION.

XIII.—(a) A competitor may use a binocular or telescope, not mounted on any kind of a stand, provided his doing so causes no delay in the shooting.

(b) After a competitor has taken his place at the firing point, no person, except the Register Keeper or an officer on duty will be permitted to speak to him.

(c) No coaching of any kind will be permitted in any match.

Any violation of this rule, or any part of it, must be at once reported by the Register Keeper to the officer in charge, who will caution the offender, and on any repetition of the offence shall report the same to the Range Officer, to be dealt with by the Executive Committee, as laid down under the head of "penalties," and the person or persons offending may be removed from the firing points.

EXCLUSION FROM FURTHER COMPETITION DURING THE MEETING.

XV.—Any competitor—

(a) Who shall fire when the danger signal is up; or,

(b) Who shall discharge his rifle on the range, except in accordance with the regulations for shooting; or

(c) Who shall be found with a loaded rifle, except when at his proper firing point and engaged in competing; or

(d) Who from a proper want of care, discharges his rifle accidentally (if such discharge is due to a defect in his rifle, an ample and satisfactory explanation must be given); or

(e) Who shall fire a pool shot before delivering his ticket to the Register Keeper; or

(f) Who shall alter or make any erasure on his firing ticket; or

(g) Who shall act in any way that might prove dangerous—

Shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, be excluded from all further competition at the Meeting, and shall forfeit all his entrance fees.

DISALLOWANCE OF SCORE.

XVI.—Any competitor—

(a) Who shall fail to comply with the conditions laid down for any particular prize; or

In cases where a competitor is excluded from "further competition," or where his score is disallowed for any particular prize, the circumstances only under which the penalty was incurred shall be posted on the notice board, as a warning to others, without the name of the individual implicated.

In case of "disqualification," the names of the offenders, as well as the particulars of the case, shall be posted on the notice board.

MILIGATION OF PENALTIES.

XVIII.—The Executive Committee shall have power to mitigate or remit any of the above penalties.

3.—PRIZE WINNERS.

XIX.—Unless otherwise specified, no one will be allowed to take more than *one* prize in any competition.

XX.—Winners of prizes, on signing the certified receipts will receive the amount or amounts due to them from the Treasurer of the P. Q. R. A.

5.—MARKING.

f. Misses will not be signalled; but if a target has been lowered under the impression that it has been hit, and if no hit is found on it, after raising it, the Marker will wave a red flag, which will signify a miss.

2. When two shots strike the target simultaneously, that which has the highest value will alone be signalled with the signal disc, and the competitor whose proper turn it was to fire at the target will be credited with that shot, provided he has fired. Both shots will, however, be shown by spotting discs.

3. On a target being lowered, the position of a hit, if any, and its value, will be shown by spotting disc, when the target is again raised.

4. The signalling shall not be questioned, but if a shot is not signalled, and the officer in charge of the firing points be satisfied that a reasonable doubt exists as to whether the shot may not have struck the target, he may ask the officer at the but to examine the target. The result of the examination as signalled shall be final. Any competitor challenging a shot shall deposit the sum of twenty-five cents with the officer in charge at the firing points, which shall be forfeited in case no hit is found on the target.

5. If, on a target being raised, the spotting disc appears manifestly to disagree with the signal disc, the Register Keeper shall stop the firing at the target, and report the circumstance to the Range Officer, who shall decide the shot after enquiry of the Officer in charge at the butt; but no deposit shall be required, nor shall there be any appeal from the decision given.

6. All claims for shots signalled must be made before another shot is fired at the target in question.

7. If, at the moment at which a competitor fires, his target should be lowered in such a manner as to falsify the result of his shot, the Range Officer is empowered to cancel the result of such shot, and to permit the competitor to fire another shot in its place.

8. All alterations of the register must be initialed by the Range Officer making them, but no alteration except in case of a clerical error, shall be made without his having first signalled to the butt.

9. No person will be permitted to go and examine a target during the Meeting except the Range Officer, or such person or persons as he may duly authorize to do so in his behalf.

6.—RIFLES.

The rifles shall be Martini-Henry rifles, either the Government issue or of *bona-fide* Government pattern, and bearing the Government Viewer's mark.

2. No pad or shoe for the heel plate of the butt will be allowed.

Minimum pull or trigger, 6 lbs.

3. Sights to be strictly in accordance with those of the Government issue. Filed sights will not be allowed.

(a) All sights may be temporarily blackened or whitened, but no application of a permanent nature will be allowed. No shading of sights will be permitted.

(b) The back sight may be tilted forward or backward, or supported at an angle by any extemporized means.

(c) The sliding bar may be reversed, and used on either side of the uprights. *Three* permanent lines for the Martini-Henry will be allowed, and *temporary* marks or lines of any kind, removable at pleasure, may be used.

7.—AMMUNITION.

Competitors must use the ammunition provided by the Association, the cost of which is included in the entrance fee.

9.—ORDER OF SHOOTING.

1. When a competitor has joined a squad he shall not leave it until he has retired or completed his firing, without leave from the Range Officer; any competitor losing his turn, or being absent without leave, or who does not hand his scoring ticket to the Range Officer at the firing point to which he is squadded at the time detailed on his ticket, will be disqualified for the match, and lose his entrance fee. Time will be regulated by the Association clock in the Secretary's office.

2. In all competitions competitors shall, when possible, be formed up by threes, and fire shot and shot *alternately*.

3. Where but one competitor is present, he shall fire his shots without undue delay, but the officer in charge of the firing point, or some person named by him, must witness the shooting and countersign the Register. Failing such verification, the score will be invalidated.

4. No competitor shall change his rifle at any range, during a competition, unless his first rifle should become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified through the officer in charge.

5. In the case of unreasonable delay in firing on the part of any competitor, or of such delay as the Range Officer may consider likely to prolong the firing beyond the time allowed, the Range Officer shall have the right to caution and time the competitor by a sand glass, purporting to run one minute, more or less and, if, after such caution, the competitor does not fire before the sand has run out, the Range Officer shall declare the score forfeited and call upon the next competitor to proceed with his firing.

6. The competitor must, after delivering *each shot*, pay attention to the score called out by the Register Keeper, and himself see that such score is correctly entered on the blackboard, so that any objection to the score recorded may be investigated before the next shot is fired, and before leaving the firing point ascertain that the total has been correctly entered by the Register Keeper.

N.B.—The right of objection in the above case only extends to the registration of scores by the Register Keeper, and not to Marker's signals.

10.—TIES.

Ties shall be decided as follows :

A.-An Individual competition for a series of prizes-

- 1. If at more than one distance, by the ringe totals in inverse order.
- 2. By the fewest outers.

D.-Aggregate-

Ties for the first place by the aggregate score in five rounds at longest distance.

For other places—

By the aggregate total of each range in inverse order, viz .:-

1.—By the total score at 600 yards.

2. By the total score at 500 yards.

E.—In military skirmishing and Volley firing by the largest number of 1 its.

F.-In cases not met by the foregoing-

1. By any special rules attached to the conditions.

2. By the fiat of the Executive.

In all cases when a possible is made, three extra shots must be at once fired, under direction of the Range Officer, who will supply the ammunition, and should there be still a numerical tie, to fire shot by shot until decided.

"Competitors must make themselves acquainted with the time at which ties are to be shot off."

11.—ENTRIES.

1. Entries, accompanied by the fees for the first seven matches, mustbe made on or before noon, on 10th August, addressed to the Secretary, P.O. Box 889, Montreal. After that date, 20 per cent. extra will be charged. Mr. T. C. Elliott, Assistant Secretary, will receive entries from city corps at his office in the Brigade Office, Montreal.

3.—To meet the case where the difficulty may be experienced in selecting the actual competitors in sufficient time to make the required entries by the 9th August, Officers commanding corps, and Secretaries of Local Associations, will be permitted to send in their application for

(state number of competitors),

accompanying such application with the amount of the entrance fees, and to postpone the rendering of the actual names of those for whom they make the entries, until the selection of the competitors is definitely made. In such cases the Register Tickets shall not be issued before the final return is handed to the Secretary, but in no case will the entries be made unless the money is forwarded. Any payment made for entries in excess of the number of competitors nominated will be returned in full, as provided for under paragraph 12 (a), Return Entrance Fee.

4. Entrance Fees must be paid at the time when entries are made.

The Registered Tickets will be issued on application at the Secretary's Office, on the Range.

The Executive Committee reserve to themselves the power of refusing any entry, either for Volunteer or All Comers' Prizes, or of cancelling, at any moment, an entry that may have been previously accepted.

12.—RETURN OF ENTRANCE FEES.

1. Entrance fee in full will be returned to those—

(a) Who are prevented from being present at the meeting; or,

(b) Who attended the meeting, but who are incapacitated from illness or accident; or

(c) Whose entries the Executive Committee may have cancelled.

2. Claims based on other considerations than the above will, if allowed, be subject to a penalty of half forfeit.

13.—SQUADDING.

1. In the case of competitors classified as ordinary entries, details of the day and firing points at which each competitor will be required to attend to fulfil his engagements will be found on his Register card.

2. In the case of post entries, competitors must await the squadding of ordinary competitors before being assigned to any target.

3. Competitors will note that in accordance with resolutions passed at competitors' meeting of 1891, Squadding will be by individuals; if possible, no two members of the same corps will shoot together.

14.—ALTERATION OF SQUADDING.

58

Any alteration which the Executive Officer may find it necessary to make will be duly notified on the notice board, and such notice shall be sufficient authority for the change. In the absence of such notice, tickets will be available only for the firing point for which they were originally issued, and any erasure or alteration will cancel the ticket, unless verified by the initials of the Executive Officer.

15.—REGISTER TICKETS.

1.—Should a competitor lose his ticket, or omit to take it to the firing point, or fail to attend at the hour detailed, or give a wrong ticket, and so by his own neglect, miss the opportunity of competing for the prize for which his ticket was issued, he shall forfeit his claim on the Association, and no duplicate ticket shall be issued to him, except under special circumstances.

2. Any erasure or substitution of one name for another shall invalidate the ticket.

The Executive Committee reserve the right to alter, amend or rescind, any of the foregoing regulations as circumstances may require.
