The war office announced today that the first clash between the Bulgarians who have invaded eastern Roumania and the Russians who went in to assist Roumania, occurred yesterday. London, Sept. 5.—That a Zeppelin airship was badly damaged in the raid on the English southeastern counties on Saturday night, in addition to one destroyed, was indicated in an official sttement given out this afternoon by the

government press bureau. It said:

King George today awarded the Victoria Cross to Lieut. William Leefe Robinson of the Royal Flying Corps, for bringing down a Zeppelin while the airship was approaching London on Sunday night. The British official press bureau says that the cross was awarded for the most conspicuous bravery. Robinson attacked the Zeppelin under circumstances of great difficulty and danger and sent it crashing to the ground a flaming wreck. Robinson had been in the air for more than two hours and had previously attacked another airship.

BRITISH MAKE CLEAN-UP OF GERMAN SECOND LINE

Capture Defensive Works Between Moquet Farm and Point Where British and French Join Forces—"New French Drive"—Russian Victories

Paris, Sept. 5-The capture of Soyrecourt and Chilly by the French yesterlay, makes a total of twenty-nine villages taken since the start of the offensive on the Somme front. The positions wrested from the Germans vesterday were powerfully organized.

At Barleux, one of the strongest positions on this front, repeated direct at-tacks were unsuccessful and the French finally reported to a turning movement, attacking to the southwest. The Germans counter-attacked no fewer than Serious For Braves at Critical Time six times yesterday in a desperate effort to regain lost ground.

London, Sept. 5-(Toronto Globe)-"King Ferdinand of Bulgaria," says wireless despatch from Zurich, "sleeps in a cellar to avoid danger from allied airmen of the Saloniki armies." The despatch adds that the king's alleged fear is similar to "cowardice" he displayed in the Balkan war, of 1912-18, when "he earned the contempt of his

The cellar which forms the king's present alleged hiding place is said to be luxuriously furnished. It has a bomb proof ceiling of steel slates.

GAVE AUSTRIANS GREAT SURPRISE

Officers Enjoying Social Glass With Roumanians Suddenly Found Themselves Prisoners

Paris, Sept. 5.—The advance of the Roumanian troops in the first five days of their campaign was considerable, and at some points was as much as eighty kilometres (about forty-eight miles), says a despatch from Urgeni, under date of Saturday to the Petit Parisien. The forward march, however, now has beer somewhat slackened because of the difficulty of sending revictualing convoys.
Although the ground on the eastern Hungarian frontier was unfavorable for the Roumanians, the correspondent said, they were successful in their dash across the were successful in their dash across the river and now occupy the valleys.

Roumania's declaration of war, the despatch adds, was so unexpected by Austria, that only a few troops of the Dual Monarchy were on the Roumanian frontier and these were on guard when hostilities were begun.

Half an hour before war was declared, Hungarian officers were drinking with Roumanians at a frontier railroad station. Soon after a Roumanian outpost entered the station, took the officers prisoners and then captured quancers prisoners and then captured quantities of materials. 



Victories For The Allies Continue

London, Sept. 4, 3 p.m.—As the result of the lighting yesterday north of the River Somme in France, says the British official statement issued today, British troops captured German defenses on a 3,000 yard front for an average depth of 800 yards and including the village of Guillemont.

The whole of Ginchy at first was captured, but the British were compelled to give ground, retaining hold of part of the village, despite heavy counterattacks in the course of the night. More than 800 Germans were taken pris-

that his data, Wering the first ten months of 1915, agrees with the reports of German doctors concerning madness among combatants. He finds the cases of insanity caused directly or indirectly by the war in France are quite as few in proportion as those in Germany, and offers the figures as a refutation of the theory of German specialists that the Teutonic race is showing greater nervous resistance than the Latin.

Dr. Dumas' report covers 1,188 cases of derangement, of which only 8 1-2 per cent. were cases of general paralysis, while in most asylums in time of peace the proportion is 15 per cent. This he takes as conclusive evidence that the fatigues and commotions of war have no influence upon the development of the Austro-German troops, the war office announced today.

Alcoholism Declines

Alcoholics were numerous in the first month of the war among the deranged soldiers, but have since been remarkably low. In August, 1914, *181 cases were brought to Val de Grace, of which 81 were suffering from alcoholism; in another hospital there were 88 out of 65. Of these 69 cases 18 had delirium tremens, and 11 of them died. They were all confirmed drinkers who had exaggerated their propensities during the exciting days of the mobilization. The number diminished sapidly after the first month, not a single case of alcoholism being reported during September from one of the most fortified places and only 162 developed in an entire army during the first ten months of last year. All of the 162 were reservists, and, in so far as their history could be learned, were old drinkers. Nearly all of them resumed their service after taking the milk cure. The tendency of the alcoholics was to dream of battle and to see Germans everywhere. One of them took a detachment of his comrades for the enemy and charged them with fixed bayonet.

The proportion of cases of mental depression among the 1,188 was large. There were 224 in ten months—mostly officers with besetting notions of professional shortcomings—and difficulties. The majority of these men realised fully about it, though unable to overcome it.

I always foresee the worst possible issue to every movement—am paralyzed by the anxiety to do the right thing, and have become nothing but indecision and contradiction."
