Toronto, Ont., April 9—Under the caption "War graft must go," the Toronto (Conservative) published, by W. F. MacLean, M.P., says today:

"The revelations at Ottawa in the purchase of army supplies call for drastic action on the part of Sir Robert Borden and his government and the Conservative party. They must disassociate them selves with any wrong doing, with any attempt to take advantage of the country of our soldiers in the field. They cannot stand for graft, for upfair profit, or for worthless or inferior goods. If members of parliament did wrong, they rust take the consequences; if officials were parties to fraud, or were lax in duty, they must be dismissed and pumished; if within the power of the law, and wherever contractors acted unfairly or took undue profit they must make restitution. In other words, the department of justice must be put in operation in the most vigorous way, and more than anyone else the cabinet must be held to strict accountability.

DEAD IN THE WEST French Airman Wins Fight in Clouds and Engree Airman Wins Fight in Clouds and Engree Makes Footstal Enemy's Airship, Afire, Makes Fearful **Drop Within Allies' Lines** 

Furnes, Belgium, via Paris, April 9—A dramatic duel in the air, in which a German aircraft was brought down inside the Allies' lines by Roland C. Garros, a famous French aviator, was described last night by Major Raoul Pontus, son of the former Belgian minister of war, who witnessed the combat. The German at first succeeded in rising above Garros' machine, but the latter, by a clever twist, escaped and then flew atop the German.

"From this moment the German's position became critical," said Major Pontus, for Garros overtook him rapidly. Presently the crackling of a quick firer showed the Frenchman judged himself sufficiently near to take the offensive. Could the German escape? It seemed difficult, for Garros shot forward in great bounds, getting nearer and nearer, but the German observer used his carbine freely, and it seemed that a bullet might strike the Frenchman.

"Suddenly a long jet of smoke rushed from the German machine and then a little flame which in an instant enveloped the whole aeroplane, Notwithstanding the extreme peril, the pilot took flight, but his efforts to escape soon were converted into a horrifying downward plunge. The aeroplane, a mass of flames, struck the ground, a score of yards from me, and a column of black smoke mingled with sheets of fire poured from the fallen machine.

"I ran to the aeroplane, which had fallen close to a ditch, and soon put out the fire. The aviators, horribly burned, were dead when I reached them. The gasoline tank contained two bullet holes. The machine was marked No. 2 40th Flottila. Its six cylinder engine was very heavy and this explained its rapid fail.

"Few of the accounts of the Kaiser's pre-meditation in launching the European war equal in interest the revelations published by Le Matin from the pen of J. Pawlowski.

"It was towards the end of the year 1990," relates Mr. Pawlowski, "that there took place a brilliant reception given by the then French ambassador at Berlin, M. de Noailes. The entire diplomatic corps was present, and the Kaiser himseft honored with his presence the residence of the French ambassador. The Kaiser was very gay that evening, and he laughed immoderately at his own witticisms. Finding himself near the Baron Osten-Sacken, then Russian ambassador at the Berlin Court, the Kaiser asked him brusquely: "Then you will not join in the affair of the Boers?"

"The old baron did not know what to say. He did not expect such a question, and had no instructions on the subject. But the Kaiser persisted in developing his idea. 'You will have to wait a hundred years before another opportunity like that occurs,' he concluded.
