Dazzle Branch Of Admiralty

Plans for Camouflaging Vessels Carefully Worked Out and Applied According to Scientific

There is a department of Burlington House, now closing which is called in Dazzle section. A stranger who should come there by chance might suppose that the New Art, Futurism, and Cubism and what not, had penetrated the Royan Academy. But the hundreds of little model ships which line the walls in a strange decoration of straight and waving lines, stars, and streaks indicate that this is the home of marine camouflage.

On marine camouflage a widespread error exists. Most people suppose that its object is the concealment of ships, and wonder how it affects that purpose. Of course, it is nothing of the sort, but an attempt to break up the form of a ship in such a way as to make it difficult for an attacking U-boat to estimate the course. Though it is impossible to say how many ships have escaped destruction by means of "Dazzle" strong evidence has been forthcoming of its value, together with grateful tributes from merchant captains.

The originator of "Dazzle" is Lleut-Commander Norman Wilkinson, the well known painter of ships and the sea. In May, 1917, he submitted his scheme to the admiralty. At that time most transports were painted black, than which no color could be more favorable for a submarine on the lookout for prey. Commander Wilkinson's argument was that if a ship could be broken up into strongly contrasting design her course could not be observed without longer periscope deservation and even then not exactly. It is delay and uncertainty mignt prevent the submarine getting into firing position until the ship had obtained a chance of escape.

The admiralty storeship Industry was the first to be painted, and served well as an experiment. "Dazzle" was next tried on fifty transports, from which encouraging reports were received. Afterwards the scheme was extended to the whole of the merchant marine under the defence of the realm act, which meant that it became compulsory on ship owners to have their ships painted. A staff, mostly of artists and architects, was collected and trained at the Royal Academy; this being the start of the Dazzle section. This company sent out its members to the various ports, each officer being supplied with a complete set of the plans and designs then in hand. From time to time new patterns were evolved which were sent to the scattered staff. As soon as a merchantman eached port she was painted under the lirection of the "Dazzle" officer in conjunction with the director of shipyard

When the scheme was extended to all the mercantile marine, models could not be made of every ship. Type ships were therefore adopted, and for each type, according to demand, a number of designs were prepared. Thus, on a ship's arrival in a port where there was a "Dazzle" officer, her type was first settled and one of the requisite designs applied to her. The task called for considerable skill sometimes, as, for example, when a design intended for a ship 200 feet long had to be accommodated to be of 230 feet.

"Lazzle" did not make its way into the respect of the mercantile marine without a little struggle. In his room at Burlington House, Commander Wilkinson has a demonstration theatre, which has brought conviction to some very great naval authorities; or, if they did not need convincing, has proved to them what odd tricks "Dazzle" can play ever with experienced eyes. A model of a campulaged ship is placed on a

them what odd tricks "Dazzle" can play even with experienced eyes. A mode of a camouflaged ship is placed on a board behind a screen. In the screen is a periscope, to which the experimenting lookout man applies his eye. He is asked to indicate the course of the ship he sees on a compass-dial by his side. This indication is then compared with the direction in which the ship's bows are actually pointing; and the discrepancy between the two is found to be wide—as a rule, ludicrously wide. Similar demonstration theatres were set up at the ports for the persuasion of sceptical mariners, whose discomfiture was exceeding when they discovered how the lazzle had led astray their willest perceptions.

From the Academy school practically every maritime Allied nation has been trained. All the American destroyers and patrol boats have been painted from designs supplied by Commander Wilkinson and his assistants. France sent over four officers for lessons, and then started a dazzle section of her own in Paris. It day was supplied with the British plans and designs. At the request of the United States navy department and the Shipping Corporation, Commander Wilkinson went to America to advise, with the result that his scheme was adopted. So also every merchantman at sea in the last eighteen months has been "dazzled" on British lines.—London Times.

Special interest attaches to the views Mr. Calder, because he is a western beral member of the government. Adting that the west was virtually animous and frankly associating himf with its views, he held that the iff issue should not be precipitated in midst of problems growing out of war, which ought to be solved with the loss of time that would be used by a period of political turmoil and a general election.

The Globe believes that most Canadians will share Mr. Calder's protest against a disruption at this moment. Probably all the Liberal Unionists in the house of commons are of the same opinion. Probably also the opposition has no desire to plunge the country into an election until demobilization has been completed and the reconstruction programme well advanced. The government, however, ought to remove the oppressive tariff war taxes during the present session. Perhaps Mr. Calder foreshadows this relief when he says the house will have an opportunity to discuss the tariff question later.


