Footing Gained By The **Germans on Kemmel Hill**

Heavy Fighting Continues There, Enemy BRITISH TOOK In Superior Numbers--French Counter **Attack To Drive Enemy From Hill**

London, April 26-A footing has been obtained on Kemmel Hill by the Germans in their attacks on the northern battle front. The war office so announced today. The fighting is still continuing in this region.

The allied forces were engaged all day yesterday with greatly superior enemy forces along the front from Beilleul to Hollebeke (a distance of about ten miles) and finally were compelled to give ground.

German posts which were holding out southeast of Villers-Bretonneux on the front south of the Somme after its capture by the British, were cleared up. FRENCH COUNTER-ATTACK

While no attual strike was declared, the men today announced a "holiday" to discuss their grievances with the result that not a wheel turned in Princess, Florence, Scotia or Jubilee pits. 





On Monday, May 20, Canadian Pacific suburban service will be inaugurated. The service will be practically the same as in past seasons except that the train which left Welsford last season at 8.15 p. m. and returning left city at 10.15 p. m. will not run until June 3.

In past years it has been customary to provide service on a certain day, known as "clean-up" day, to enable suburbanites to visit their homes and make preparations for the season. For this purpose on Wednesday, May 8 (only), train will be run to leave city at 8.15 a.m. and on the return will leave Welsford at 8 p. m., due in city about 9 p. m. All stops to be made in each direction. 

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



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THE LOBSTER INDUSTRY

Decline and Cause Discussed By Prof. A. P. Knight

An Industry Worth Today \$5,500,000 is in Great Danger - ExpertTells Why This is and Outlines Means by Which Lobsters of Canada May be Conserved and Made Lasting Benefit

Halifax, April 24-An attendance of about eighty assembled for the weekly uncheon of the Rotary Club in the Green Lantern yesterday, when the members and guests heard an interesting address by an expert on a matter of vital importance to Nova Scotia—the lobster industry. The chair was occupied by K. H. Smith, resident engineer at Halifax of the dominion water power branch. The speaker was Dr. A. P. Knight, professor of histogy at Ouesn's University. sor of biology at Queen's University, Kingston, who has devoted the greater part of his leisure for many years, dur-ing the summer months, to a study of the lobster and other fish interests of Canada—and he has done this gratuit-ously, without cost to the country. Professor Knight said he was engaged in a campaign to secure a place for the study of the lobster industry in our educational system. And showing its importance, he said that the salmon catch

of Canada was worth \$10,000,000 and the lobster catch of the eastern portion, \$5,500,000. Going back for twenty years he showed how great has been the decline in the lobster catch and how much the decrease in size of lobsters taken.

This decline he ascribed to several causes. First, he discussed this under the head of "destructive activities." Over fishing, which has resulted in the total disappearance of nearly all lobsters from to 18 inches in length, and a great duction of those from 12 to 14 inches; "brushing" of eggs off the mothers the "brushing" of eggs off the mothers and the canning of seed lobsters contrary to law; permitting fishing to be done between June 1 and October 1 when mother lobsters are hatching their eggs, casting their shells and laying their eggs. Lobsters should be protected during the breeding season just as game birds and game fish are. Another cause of the decline is the canning of immense numbers of young lobsters, not half grown and ranging from five to eight inches in length. Still another cause of the decline is the destruction of vast numbers of eggs in the older hatch-

vast numbers of eggs in the older hatcheries for the past twenty-five years and in the newer hatcheries in the past ten Professor Knight, taking up another aspect of his subject, discussed it under the heading of "conservative activities," showing that in spite of the great decline in the lobster, the supply can be con-served for all time if we do certain things. First, he said, there had to be

Secondly, through preserving a sufficient number of young lobsters now destroyed in our canneries, until they are from thirteen to eighteen inches long, when their egg fertility is at its maximum. Lastly Professor Knight, suggested that there should be an exchange of ideas between the scientific workers of the logical board of Canada on the one hand and the canneries and fishermen on the other, with a view of preserving for the benefit of the people of this country the lobster industry of Canada.







The great double German drive, in the Somme and Armentieres secin the Somme and Armentieres sec-tors, which began on Wednesday morning, has developed into a ter-rific struggle. The British, having been forced back out of Villers-Breton-neux, launched a counter attack and swept the Germans back almost to the lines which were held before the the lines which were held before the present fighting began. The French have been driven back out of Hangard-en-Santerre, but are holding their positions close by, while to the north again, on the line southwest of Ypres, the British have been compelled to withdraw slightly before furious attacks along the Meteren-Bailleui-Wytschaete line.

Notwithstanding the frantic pre-parations made by the Germans for a continuance of their drive toward. Amiens and the extreme violence of the fighting the gains thus far in that region have been very small. It is unofficially reported that from four to six German divisions, or from 48,000 to 72,000 men, have been hurled at the British and French lines near Ypres. The retirement of the British in this sector must have been small, for there are no great gains reported by Berlin so far. It was rumored on Thursday that Mont Kemmel, a dominating height north of Wulverghem, had been taken by the enemy, but this

has not been confirmed.

The British war office reports retirement from the Kemmel-Vierstadt line, which is the exact position held by the New Brunswick battalion from September, 1915, to April, 1916, when the unit moved up to St. Elol, still nearer Ypres.

NEW SUGAR ORDERS

Ottawa, April 26—The Canada Food Board today issued an order strictly limiting holdings of sugar by persons other than cane sugar manufacturers, providing for seizure and forfeiture of sugar held in excess of the quantities prescribed under the order, and making a violation of the order an offense subject to penalties which shall not be less than \$100, and may run as high as \$1,000, or to imprisonment for a period up to three months, or both fine and imprisonment.
