Jury awards verdict of \$500 damages against Ontario farmer who married a second time when his first wife was living. Miss Maria Fisher and Henry Jones, here pictured, were the principals in a peculiar case at the Toronto Assizes. Jones, who is a prosperous farmer was married twenty-six years ago, but according to his own statements had not seen her for twenty six years and had received an anonymous telegram some years ago that she was dead. In February, 1912, Miss Fisher answered Jones' advertisement for a housekeeper, and after a short courtship they went through a form of marriage, and lived together for nearly a year. Then the first wife turned up and Jones was arrested on charge of bigamy, but acquitted by a jury. Miss Fisher sued for \$10,000 damages for loss of character and social standing, and was given \$500. The presiding judge said it was the first case of its kind in Canada.

Melt 1 tablespoon of butter, add 2 tablespoons of flour and cook thoroughly. Add 1 cup of boiling water and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add 2 cups chopped lobster meat. Season with salt, paprika, lemon juice and minced parsley. Take from the fire, add the beaten yolk of an egg and cool. Shape into cutlets, dip into egg and crumbs and fry in deep fat. Stick a lobster claw into the small end of each cutlet.


