London, March 9.—The Daily Chronicle publishes the first installment of Captain Amundsen's account of his discovery of the pole.

BRITISH STRIKERS COMING TO CANADA

Several Hundred Engaged for Work In Nova Scotia and Alberta Mines

Terrible Effects of Trouble in England Told of in Special Cable to Times--The Suffragettes' Failure--Duke of Sutherland Sells Vast Estate--Emigration to Dominions

(Times' Special Cable)

London, March 9.—Canadian emigration officers are doing well among the coal strikers, several hundred having been engaged to work in the coal mines of Nova Scotia and Alberta.

London railway men propose to hold a meeting in Trafalgar Square on Sunday to support the miners. Extensive policing will be necessary and trouble is expected.

You in Canada had little idea of the terrible effects of the coal strike. A national industry is rapidly paralyzing as a result of the raising of no coal.

Cardiff, Swansea, Liverpool, Glasgow, Hull, London and other shipping centres will be closed for several days.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 9.—J. B. McNamara, serving a life sentence at San Quentin for dynamiting the Times building and the murder of a score of employees, is dying from tuberculosis.

Quebec, March 9.—For eighteen months no term of the criminal court has been held in Quebec, but the spring term is announced to open on April 10.

Ottawa, March 9.—Hon. G. E. Foster, Hon. W. F. White and Hon. J. D. Reid will represent the Canadian government in the negotiations which are to begin on March 11, looking to a treaty of reciprocity between Canada and the British Isles.

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DOES PREMIER FLEMMING MEAN TO SPRING THE ELECTION?

Forcing Debate on Address Taken to Mean That He Has Scheme Under Way—His Discourtesy to the Opposition—Followers Are Disturbed

(Special to Times) Frederickton, N. B., March 9.—Premier Fleming's unusual course in forcing a session upon the house on Saturday afternoon has led to much comment.

What they are looking for to assist the election of their candidate along the River Valley is patronage in connection with the railway construction. They are disturbed, therefore, by these rumors of quick adjournment, regardless of what legislation is awaiting attention.

Mr. Fleming's tactics in trying to jam the address through give color to these rumors. He does not want to give the opposition any more opportunities than he can help to reveal the extravagance and reckless methods of his administration.

There is a rumor that the provincial election may be on the cards as soon as it is possible to bring them on. Some government supporters are opposed to any such course, saying that, if the elections are held in May the roads will be shown up as they are with all the disadvantages of the season.

Mr. Fleming does not want too much time to be given to the consideration of the accounts and the work has been passed to be ready. The opposition will not be taken unaware no matter what happens.

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CANADIAN MINING INSTITUTE

Doctor Barlow of Montreal Chosen President—Compensation in Mines

Toronto, March 9.—The election of Dr. A. E. Barlow, of Montreal, as president and the unanimous passage of a resolution of recommendation to the Dominion government are the two chief items of business transacted at the concluding session of the Canadian Mining Institute annual convention yesterday afternoon.

The proposal regarding compensation was as follows: That the working of the compensation act be placed in the hands of a committee appointed by the crown, this commission to collect a definite amount from each mining company, based on the monthly pay roll and proportionate to the risk incident to the business; that the amount should be contributed by the employers, and should not be collected directly or indirectly from the employees; that the distribution of the fund should be in the exclusive control of the commission, subject to no appeal in the ordinary courts; that there should be no liability except under the act, all common law liability being expressly excluded.

Consideration of the principles of the workers' compensation act of the State of Washington, also the New Zealand Act was recommended.

Toronto, March 9.—Premier Whitney was waited upon yesterday by deputations representing the Dominion Evangelical Alliance. Half an hour was spent in private conference with the premier on the question of the marriage law.

The delegation withdrew the members expressed themselves as well satisfied with the result of the interview.

The deputation urged upon the premier that Ontario be represented by counsel at the hearing of the stated case prepared by the Dominion government, and that the efforts of Ontario's representative be directed to clearing up the status of the marriage law as affecting the Dominion, not to emphasizing provincial provisions as proposed to Starkey.

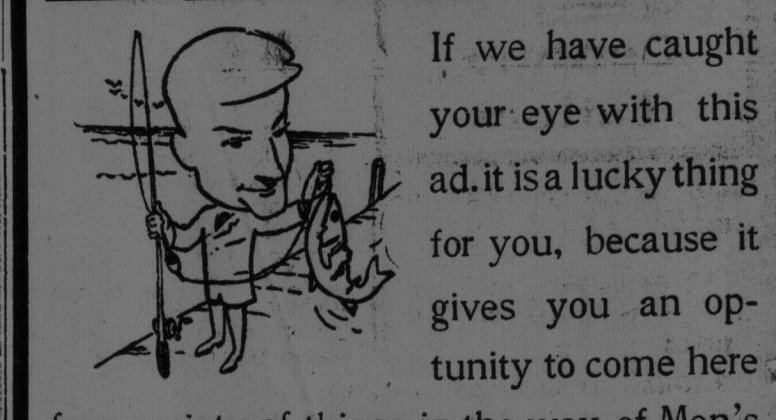

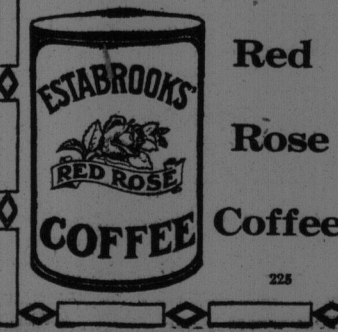

IMMIGRATION CONGRESS WAS GREAT SUCCESS

League to Boost the Advantages of New Brunswick

ENTHUSIASM MARKED

Plans to Bring First Grade Settlers to This Province—Officials of Railways and Government Take Part in The Movement

Fredericton, N. B., March 8.—All New Brunswick joined today in an enthusiastic movement for an increase of population by means of immigration, and the great immigration conference is expected to have a marked effect on the policy of the provincial government.

Every county, and practically every town of importance, were represented in the congress, which was organized at the suggestion of the St. John Board of Trade, while the arrangements were made by that board in conjunction with the Fredericton board.

- 1.—Organization of a New Brunswick League, along the lines of the Canadian Club, membership fees to be used for advertising in Nova Scotia, W. C. Miller, and J. S. King, of Halifax; Wm. Stitt and George Ham, of the C. E. R., and J. A. Edwards, of the G. F. F.

Dr. T. I. Byrne, mayor of Chatham, made the most practical suggestion that the government be asked to set aside portions of crown lands in each county, and make them accessible by means of roads for free homesteads, but his motion was not carried.

Some of the outside men who were in attendance were: Arthur Hawkes, special immigration commissioner; Hon. John Howard, agent general of Nova Scotia in Great Britain; A. S. Barnstead, secretary of immigration and industries for Nova Scotia; W. C. Miller, and J. S. King, of Halifax; Wm. Stitt and George Ham, of the C. E. R., and J. A. Edwards, of the G. F. F.

John T. Jennings, president of the Fredericton Board of Trade, opened the congress after 2 o'clock, in a dress of welcome and enthusiastic words on the result of gathering. It was time, he said, for the province to get rid of the barriers of apathy and indifference, and press on to use united effort for the common good.

Mayor Thomas was also heard in a brief address of welcome, declaring that the natural resources of New Brunswick were equal to any land under the sun. The land was full of boosters and the next generation would know the extent of our greatness.

J. D. McKenna took up "Publicity" and said that a successful advertising movement depended largely on the advertiser having faith in his goods. This had not been the case in Nova Scotia for the world would have heard something about it. Enough gas had been discovered in Albert county to heat every house and run every factory in the Maritime provinces. Besides there was Gloucester ore, the Valley railway, Courtenay Bay development and other important works.

The speaker referred to Hon. James Oliver's plan in the federal parliament depicting short crop, car shortage and ruined grain conditions which never existed in New Brunswick. The province should look to the transportation companies and federal government, but most important of all they must help themselves. He suggested an organization to be known as the New Brunswick League, along the lines of the Canadian Club, and using its funds for an advertising campaign. He moved the following resolution, seconded by T. W. Butler, of Newcastle:

"That this congress desires to emphasize the necessity for greater publicity of the opportunities, resources and educational and social advantages of New Brunswick."

T. H. Estabrooks spoke of "Knockers" as a class being very prevalent. A manufacturer often made a good article—knockers for instance—which would not be used or worn by their own employees.

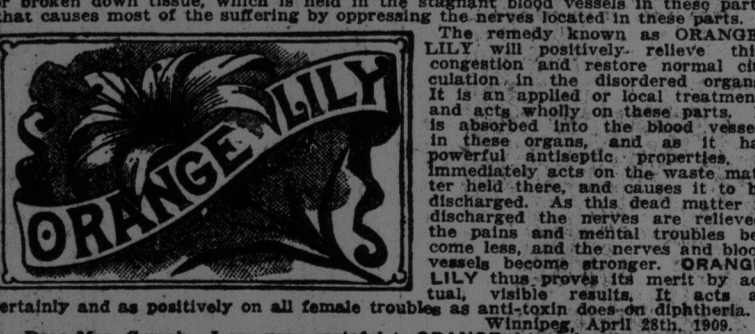
An Object of Pity

That part of our nature which we call the emotional is much more highly developed in women than in men. A TRIPLE MURDER RECALLED

Cape Breton Murder Case Brings Back One of 1833

NO EXECUTION SINCE THEN

Mrs. Flahavin and Two Sailors Hanged For Slaying Her Husband — Woman's Daughter Overheard Talk of Crime and Gave Information to Magistrate

(Glace Bay Gazette) The verdict of "murder" brought in Wednesday by the jury in the Garrio murder case, is the first of its kind in the Cape Breton criminal courts since 1833.

For over sixty-eight years Cape Breton juries refused to condemn any man to the gallows, although there have been cases tried where such a verdict would undoubtedly have been the right one.

The Garrio case which, with the three other murder cases at this term of the supreme court, has caused tremendous excitement all over Cape Breton, recalls the sensational Flahavin murder at North Sydney in the year 1833. In Sydney, Glace Bay, North Sydney, Sydney, Mines, and all over Cape Breton, the people, young and old, are discussing the two crimes. On that occasion two sailors, Mrs. Flahavin, the wife of the murdered man, were publicly hanged in what is now called Victoria Park, about the Barrack, ground in Sydney, for that awful crime.

On September 12 the prisoners received their sentence that they be "taken hence until dead." There is no record of the date on which the hanging took place, but it must have been a very short time after the sentence was pronounced.

The details of the murder were narrated by a Gazette representative from Mr. McDonald and others, are as follows:—One fine summer morning in July of the year 1833 two sailors from a ship that had been visiting North Sydney called at the Flahavin home, which is situated about three-quarters of a mile from the Belmont Hotel and almost exactly where the residence of Mr. Flahavin is now, and induced Mr. Flahavin to go in the woods near his farm, ostensibly for the purpose of buying some oxen. The sailors had been frequent visitors at the farm and one of them fell in love with Mrs. Flahavin, and the other with one of the daughters. The mother, daughter and sailors had evidently arranged for the murder of husband and father the night previous.

When the sailors arrived early in the morning they were accompanied by the woman, Mrs. Flahavin. Getting the old man into the woods the three beat his brains out with an axe and club. Flahavin begged hard to be allowed to live, promising to leave the country and never return. A deaf ear was turned to all his pleadings and the three clubbed him to death. The body was then buried beneath an old tree trunk and covered with limbs and boughs.

The sailors and Mrs. Flahavin then returned to the house, and talked over the crime with the eldest daughter. A young daughter who had been asleep in the next room heard their conversation. The two sailors and the two women became alarmed lest the girl should overhear and heard their story and would betray them, and they decided to kill her if they found she had been awake and heard their conversation.

With great presence of mind the young daughter feigned sleep when she heard them approach, and it was due to her strategy that her life was saved. The murderers fear of betrayal being stilled, they left the room. The young girl then quickly dressed herself and crawled out the window, made for the home of Captain McKinnon, who was a magistrate and lived near Letiche's Creek bridge, some three miles away. Keeping to the woods for two and a half miles for fear of pursuit, the girl at last came out upon a turn in the road and looking back was horrified to find the two sailors in pursuit. Fear led her wings, and she broke into a hard run that carried her into the home of Captain McKinnon's a moment or two before her pursuers arrived.

When the sailors saw her enter the house they turned back from the gate and went back to the Flahavin house in which they had been sleeping. Between gasps for breath the young daughter of the murdered man hastily told her awful story and the three constables to arrest the three murderers. The officers of the law found the house barricaded on their arrival. Two of them remained on watch while the third went back for a search warrant. The warrant secured and more constables sworn in. The whole party of constables went back to the house and placed the three under arrest, and conveyed them to the county jail in Sydney.

The day of the hanging broke clear and firm, and as it was to be a public affair, all hangings were at that time, people from all over the countryside were present as spectators. The local volunteer militia were also in attendance. Great difficulty had been experienced in securing a man to do the hanging, but the evening before the job was to be done a ship arrived in Sydney harbor. The sailors came ashore for some grog, and one of them on being told of the difficulty of procuring a hangman agreed to do the work for five pounds. The sheriff, whose name is not mentioned, gave him the money and locked him up for the night.

The next morning the three prisoners were brought from the jail to the scaffold. They were quite calm and showed no signs of regret for their awful deed, or apprehension over their fate. Mrs. Flahavin asked to see her young connect with her given the story of the crime to the magistrate, but her request was refused. She then replied that it was a good thing for her daughter as she would have choked her to death with her teeth before she wore a great deal, at least early in the spring—Newark News.

FRUIT GROWING IN THE STATE OF WASHINGTON

Spokane, Wash., March 9.—F. A. Huntley, state commissioner of horticulture, says, in a report just submitted to Governor Marion E. Hay, that of 238,786 acres of land devoted to fruit growing in the state of Washington, 238,354 are planted to apple, peach, plum, prune, apricot and cherry trees. Estimating the average annual yield at \$8,500,000 for the next five years, he places the average value of land devoted to horticulture at \$300 an acre, on an earning basis of 10 per cent, which, growers say, is ultra-conservative.

The acreage devoted to strawberries is 2,332, and 400 acres in cranberries and 2,960 acres in grapes, and 5,200 acres in other berries. More than 10,000,000 of a total of 14,978,182 fruit trees in the state are in eighteen counties east of the Cascade mountains, where intensive methods are practiced in the commercial orchards. Spokane county heads the list in apple culture with 1,804,882 trees; Yakima county has 1,883,771, and Chelan county claims 1,821,981. Okanogan county is fourth with 847,535, and Stevens county has 324,676 trees.

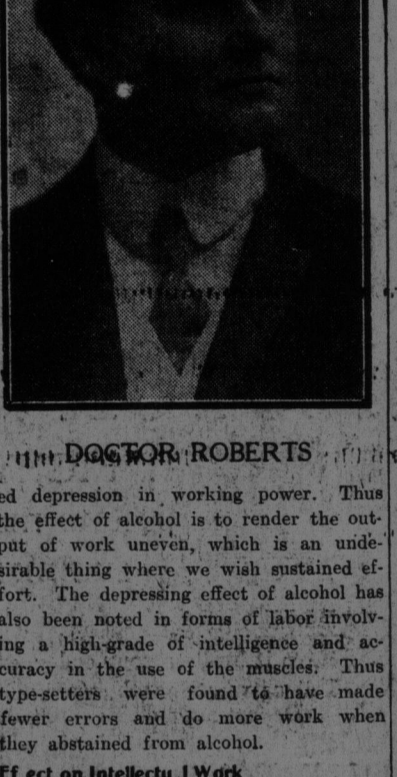
Paper Read By North End Physician

REASON AND ADVICE

Influence Upon the Human System is More Detrimental Than Help Even to Most Cautious Drinkers—Careful Analysis of an Important Subject

The following excellent paper was read recently by Dr. W. F. Roberts in the school room of the Mission church, St. John, N. B.:

What is alcohol? It is the alcohol used in medicine and for drinking purposes. It is a liquid composed of about 10 per cent of ethyl alcohol and 90 per cent of water, it is a transparent, colorless, volatile, inflammable substance with a characteristic pungent odor agreeable, taste and odor. We speak of it as containing ethyl alcohol, a distinction to methyl and amyl alcohols, more commonly recognized as food alcohols and respectively. These are frequently used as adulterants of ethyl alcohol—the alcohol of medicine and its derivatives.

ed depression in working power. Thus the effect of alcohol is to render the output of work uneven, which is an undesirable thing where we wish sustained effort. The depressing effect of alcohol has also been noted in forms of labor involving a high-grade of intelligence and accuracy in the use of the muscles. Thus typesetters were found to have made fewer errors and do more work when they abstained from alcohol.

Effect on Intellectual Work

It is difficult to measure accurately the effect of alcohol on intellectual work, but Kraepelin, a very careful observer, found that the receptive and intellectual powers were weakened even by small doses of alcohol, while the motor activities were produced severe large calories, or heat units. The same quantity of alcohol burned either outside or inside the animal produces severe large calories, or heat units. Estimating the total caloric needs of an adult of average weight at 2,600 per day, we see that 100 grams of alcohol would supply a quarter of the total requirement for a day.

Effect on the Nervous System

The action of alcohol on the nervous system varies somewhat according to its concentration, its use, and the individual's susceptibility. In most persons there is at first a sense of exhilaration and of well-being, which is usually followed by a stage of excitement. In this stage of excitement the subject is characteristically loquacious, and exhibits various evidences of loss of self-control, which vary a good deal according to the individual disposition. If the dose of alcohol is sufficiently large, the speech becomes difficult and the gait has the staggering characteristically which makes the nature of the present condition apparent to the casual looker on. Still larger quantities of alcohol give rise to deep sleep followed by unconsciousness, and certain pathological disturbances. The unconsciousness induced by alcohol resembles that of chloroform anesthesia, but is of longer duration and frequently terminates fatally from failure of respiration.

(Times Special Correspondence) New York, March 7.—Among those who are more or less in touch with the moneyed interests of Wall Street, the recent announcement by a half dozen prominent men in the street of their intention to move to England is interpreted as a protest against the nation wide agitation for the control of "big business" which the popular aversion to high finance displayed throughout the country during the last year, commissions in many quarters have been heavily sufficient to say office held and telegraph tolls, leaving little or nothing for the heads of the concerns.

WOMAN CHARGED WITH MURDER OF FOUR BY POISON

Death of Third Husband Arouse Suspicion and Other Cases Come to Light

Berlin, March 8—The German public are following with intense interest the trial of Karoline Kieper, a woman aged fifty, at Gradenz in East Prussia, on the accusation of having poisoned no fewer than four persons.

According to the crown prosecutor, she is a veritable Borgias. Her third husband died from a mysterious disease and an examination revealed the presence of arsenic in the body. It was then remembered that Kieper's parents and her first husband had also died suddenly, and the bodies were exhumed. Traces of arsenic were again found.

The woman declares that her first husband poisoned himself to escape from the suffering consequent on a painful disease, and that her third husband poisoned her parents and then himself in despair. The second husband, who is still living, divorced the woman.

She said that she had never been in a police court before except when fined \$25 for beating her last husband. The prisoner appeared in widow's weeds.

CLEAN-UP-DAY

Spokane, Which Originated The Idea, Has Improved Plans For This Year

Spokane, Wash., March 8—Clean-up week in Spokane this spring will close by 11 and Good Roads day, April 15, will be the people observing Arbor Day, April 11, and Good Roads day, April 12, as determined in proclamations issued by Governor Hay. Mayor William J. Hindley announces that the plans for making Spokane more beautiful will be different from anything yet attempted in this city, which originated the cleaning week idea six years ago, when 20,000 men, women and children participated in the work.

This year it is planned to have a working agreement with the municipal crematory and the health department and divide the city into districts, in each of which city inspectors will be stationed to see that the work is thorough. Crews from the crematory department will gather the refuse at the expense of the householders.

The Spokane Realty association has undertaken to place all vacant lots and unappropriated and unimproved lands in the city park system under cultivation without expense to the owners. Every family and all the school children in Spokane may thus have vegetable gardens without the expenditure of a single penny for work or seeds.

PLATFORM OF LIBERALS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

The leading planks of the platform signed by the Liberals of British Columbia in connection with the coming provincial elections include the following:

Free homesteads to bona fide settlers; no public lands for speculators; public competition in timber lands; government operation of coal mines, with a view to reduction of existing prices; immediate construction of a railway line to Peace River; no land subdivisions to railway companies beyond what is necessary to secure construction; immediate construction of government grain elevators; abolition of poll tax; creation of a provincial labor department; a white British Columbia and total exclusion of orientals; complete removal of the liquor traffic from government control; immediate restoration of the fisheries to white fishermen, and protection from foreign poachers; and government ownership of telephones.

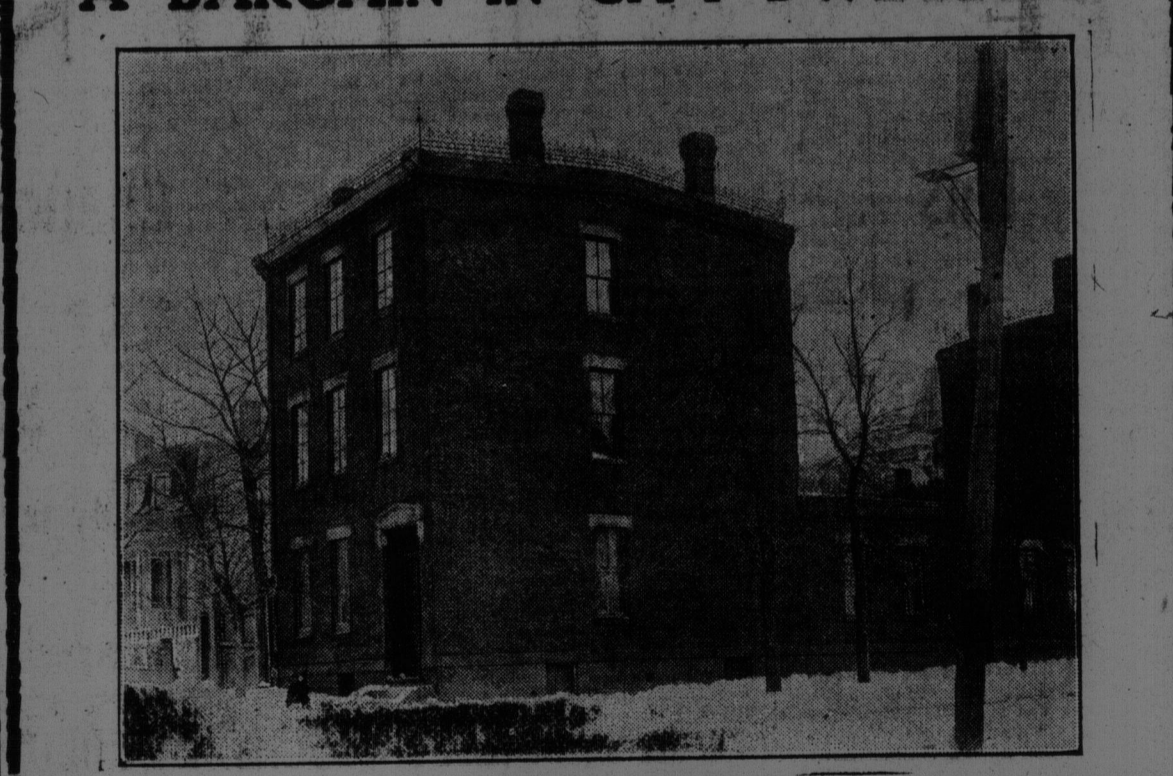

IMMIGRATION CONGRESS WAS GREAT SUCCESS

(Continued from page 7) In each country, certain portions of the crown lands and make the same accessible by roads for free settlement.

The chairman ruled the amendment out of order, on the ground that all motions must have been submitted to the general committee.

Dr. Byrne was supported by other speakers, but the chairman refused to accept his amendment and the resolution as moved by Mr. Peters and seconded by Mr. Butler was adopted.

H. B. Scott, of Medicine, introduced a resolution favoring the establishment of a central bureau at St. John to give immigrants reliable information. He said New Brunswick now had every advantage excepting population.

C. N. Vroom seconded the resolution, and told an interesting story of the experiences of settlers. The bureau should reach out to every part of the province, and its officers should get legal opinions on farms for sale and dispose of them in their offices.

Bishop Richardson. At the evening session Bishop Richardson spoke of optimism as a great asset for the province, and urged co-operation between the city and the rural districts. He made a striking comparison between the western wheat farmer making \$700 on twenty acres of potatoes. It was time to stop importing \$4,000,000 worth of farm products and sit down in peace and contentment to weavers, bread, and Australia butter.

Charles H. McIntyre. Charles H. McIntyre, of Boston, in the course of a lengthy and eloquent address, discussed the problem of immigration, and a land settlement policy for New Brunswick from many standpoints.

debt before he is worn out. This is a wrong state of affairs, and it is the business of the state to correct it as speedily as possible.

The present banking system of the country is not adapted to the necessities of farmers. It does not encourage people to settle on the land and it does not provide the capital or credit they require.

First. At the present moment there is no deposit at St. John in the Dominion Government Savings Bank, the sum of \$5,000,000 derived from the savings of the people. The finance minister of the Dominion holds this fund as a part of the consolidated revenue of the nation, and allows deposits three per cent interest.

Second. Another method of obtaining the funds would be for the province to issue its own debentures at say four per cent for long terms, and from the proceeds of their sale, would turn over to the land settlement commission such amounts annually as the lieutenant governor in council would approve.

Third. A third method would be for the land settlement commission itself to issue bonds upon the guarantee of the province, for such amounts and terms as the government might approve.

Fourth. A fourth method would be for the province to issue its own debentures at say four per cent for long terms, and from the proceeds of their sale, would turn over to the land settlement commission such amounts annually as the lieutenant governor in council would approve.

When I stumbled on this idea, a few years ago, I supposed it was original with me. But I was mistaken, on further study, I discovered that this identical proposal had been tried in Germany. It cannot be stamped with short terms of credit and high rates of interest, which sooner or later lead him to the poorhouse. Speaking generally the average young man without funds cannot purchase a farm and

the proceeds of state insurance, not only to the state government of the empire, but also to municipalities and associations engaged in erecting cottages for working men. It has been successful beyond all anticipation. But, as I shall show a little later, sets homestead commission, and a bill is now pending in the Massachusetts legislature whereby certain moneys of savings banks deposited with the state treasurer, are to be loaned to the commission for the creation of working men's cottages.

This is the first experiment in the United States. In this very year the same thing has been tried in the Australian states. There, however, each state has power to grant charters to savings banks and the savings of the people are to be used by an agricultural bank for the purpose of land settlement.

In Canada the federal government alone can grant a charter to any bank, and that is the fundamental reason why I have suggested the establishment of a Land Settlement Commission, by which the province could launch the scheme. But the principle at bottom is the same in both countries, viz: that the savings of the people should be used by the government of the province for agricultural development. There a state can do it directly, here it must be done indirectly, by arrangement with the federal government.

received the funds, would commence operations. Loans would be made say from \$100 up to \$3,000 for agricultural purposes only, at periods say from 25 to 35 years. I would prefer the latter period, and commence to collect your first payment at the end of six months. They should manage the business in their own hands, and give the project their entire attention. All political questions would be reserved for the government, and the two functions must be kept absolutely apart. The loans would be so arranged that a borrower would pay a fixed sum every half year and no less. Part of this amount would consist of interest at 5 per cent (or whatever rate is established) and part in reduction of principal. As the loan which interest is calculated would be reduced by the partial payments every six months, and at the end of the period would be extinguished.

"For example, if John Smith should borrow \$1,000 he would have to pay a sum of \$25.25 every six months for thirty years, until his loan, at the interest of 5 per cent was fully liquidated. Or, if he preferred to pay a fixed sum of \$10 every six months he could borrow \$399.98 and in this manner pay it off in thirty years, with the interest at 3 per cent. The scheme of loans is best illustrated in the tables 'C' and 'D,' annexed to the report, and I would urge you to carefully study them when published. They were prepared by James Liddell in Edinburgh, in the Department of Lands, Higginson & Co., Boston.

"In all cases, loans would be made by separate commissions and upon approved values. Loans should not exceed 70 per cent value of agricultural property, and the commission should have right to advance a smaller percentage if the character and location of the property required. The commission could be given until the province, through the commission, by a first mortgage upon the property, which would be liquidated and sale in case of default by the borrower on any installment. Every applicant for a loan must state the purpose for which it is required, and if any loan is used contrary to the scope of law, the commission cannot be at once and resume the property. Every loan would be made only upon the written report of experienced valuers employed by the commission, and a small fee would be charged for the valuation. If a borrower failed to pay on time a fine would be imposed before he was reinstated in good standing. Payments may be anticipated, but no credit on interest could be given until the date of half year ending. Whether any portion of a loan could be used to buy or lease farming implements is a different problem, but I should be inclined to permit a use of say 25 per cent of the loan for such purposes. Especially the scheme contemplates that the loan must be used for purchase price, erection of buildings or permanent improvements. If a borrower's farm was free from incumbrances, I would permit a loan for purchase of stock, and sale security on the farm itself.

"A certain amount of discretion must be given to the commission on matters of this kind, providing the loan was well within the amount allowed on the land. The loans of the province should be classified, and the terms of a loan would depend on the character and location of the property, and the experience of other countries. A preference, and the aggregate amount granted to any one person on different farms, should be limited to \$5,000. In all cases, no sale or transfer of the property should be permitted without consent of the commission. The names and accounts of borrowers should not be open for public information. Officials should be prohibited from divulging secrets, just as banks are today.

"All profits derived from the operations of the commission should be paid over to the provincial secretary, and set aside by him as a fund for the redemption of obligations of the province. The fund would be conservatively invested by the provincial secretary, until such time as he could arrange for the redemption of obligations of the province, or until the public good as the case might be.

Ready-made Farms. Mr. McIntyre then entered into a discussion of the plan for ready-made farms and how they would be managed. He said the farmer, he went very fully into the details of the funds required and then proposed a special committee to work on along these lines. In concluding, Mr. McIntyre said that he trusted that this day would mark the beginning of a new era in the affairs of these provinces. He pointed out that the remedy he advocated was not designed to do away with the curlew, but to give him and agricultural pursuits to their proper place. His address was greatly appreciated and warmly applauded.

A spirited discussion followed Mr. McIntyre's address and a resolution favoring the adoption of such a scheme for New Brunswick, J. E. Porter moved, and H. H. 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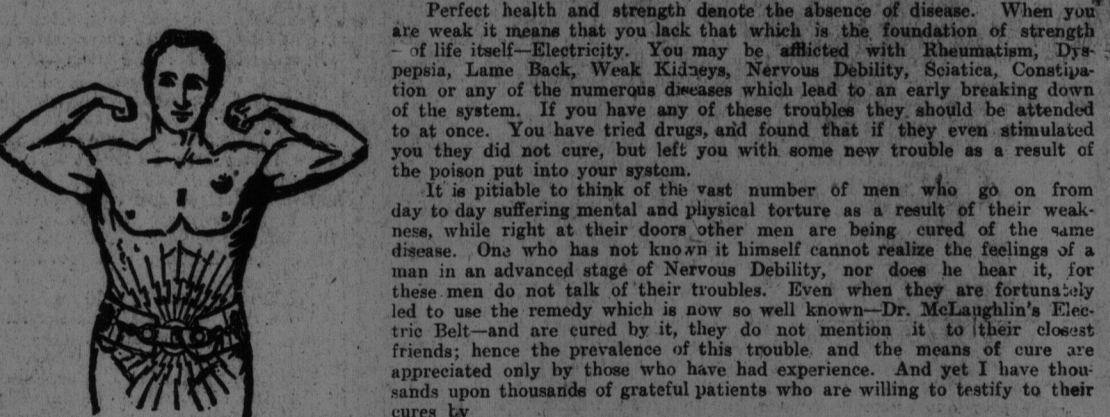

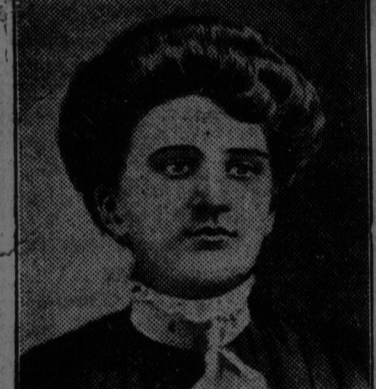

EGGS TAKE A DROP; BUTTER STILL HIGH

Maple Sugar Man Says He Has Complaint for Inland Revenue Department

The country market was none too well supplied with farm produce this morning, and the stalls in the farmers' quarters at the upper end of the market were rather bare, except for eggs and meats. The market for eggs is easier, they sold today as low as twenty-eight cents a dozen, being quite plentiful. Butter, however, remained firm and the market was not relieved by receipts, this morning. From twenty-eight to thirty-five cents was asked. Fourty also was asked and much of what was offered was from storage.

A vigorous protest was made this morning by some farmers who said that some maple sugar being sold in the market as "strictly pure" had not full rights to such description. One farmer who said he intended marketing some of this spring's maple sugar and who had taken pains to have his sugar free from the making and as pure as good quality maple sugar is required to be, was quite wrathful when a dealer selling maple sugar lower than he thought was warranted for the advance arrival of the strictly pure. He said he intended reporting the matter to the inland revenue department.

BOY SCOUTS ARE SCOURING ROCKWOOD

Search for Missing Wm. J. Hunter Carried on All Morning

More than 100 lads, members of various patrols of the Boy Scouts, have been engaged throughout the day in making a systematic search in Rockwood Park for William J. Hunter, who has now been missing from his home in Waterloo street for the greater part of two weeks. The boys assembled at their troop headquarters early and in charge of their respective scout masters marched to the entrance to the park grounds, where they scoured into squads and scattered through the woods surrounding Rockwood, Mount-ed Policeman Crawford joined the lads in their search. During the last week he has been making a search through the park grounds, but was unable to find any trace of the missing man or anything to indicate that he had passed through there.

BOYS BEFORE COURT

Several Cases Brought—Police Court Business

"You young boys will not go to school for your parents, so I think the best place for the most of you is in the reformatory," said Magistrate Ritchie in dealing with two young lads who were before the court on the charge of truancy. The two little fellows, Jack and Douglas Walsh, both with tears in their eyes, pleaded guilty and were sent below.

The lad was sent below to the cells.

William Golding, arrested several days ago on the charge of drunkenness, and also breaking several doors in Joseph Cook's house in Exmouth street, was brought in to court and fined \$8 or two months in jail.
