BURGLARY.—Unsuccessful attempts to break into McElmurry's jewelry store, Monmouth, were made on last Sunday and Monday nights.

COW STRAYING.—Some miscreant badly stabbed a cow belonging to Mrs. Martin Hayward, of Woodstock, recently. The animal will recover.

ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.—Michael Lennan, of Richmond, Carleton Co., was accidentally killed at McElmurry's corner on Monday evening last.

ATEMPTED BURGLARY.—An early hour last Sunday morning an attempt was made to break into Mr. Shephard's grocery store, Main street, Portland.

THE ELECTION of Councilors for the Parish of Woodstock, took place on Tuesday last. P. McCaffery, Esq., J. P., and R. B. Ketchum, Esq., were chosen.

RELEASED.—Rankine, who was sentenced to five years in the Penitentiary for stealing money from letters, was released on Monday. He had served about two years of the term.

THE Contract for building a new brick school house on the site of the old Temperance Hall, Sydney street, has been awarded to Mr. Jas. Burke by His Lordship Bishop Sweeney.

HORRIBLE DEATH.—On Saturday last a little girl named Wallace was instantly killed at Hillboro at falling under a turn table at which she and a number of her companions were playing.

SUICIDE.—Capt. Chas. McGregor was found dead in a pasture at Upper Mills, St. Stephen on Sunday last. He had a revolver in his hand. Suicide was the verdict of the coroner's jury.

THE MERCHANTS' BANK of Prince Edward Island has suspended its payments for three months in consequence of the failure of Jas. Duncan & Co., to whom they had advanced \$100,000.

THE Coroner says that Father Fringing, the eloquent Redeemerist, on Sunday next, in the Catholic Church, Milltown, will preach next, after Vespers, which will commence at half past three o'clock.

FREDERICK TRUCKMEN who are obliged to take out a license before they can do any work, complain that outsiders come into the place and do work with horses without paying for the privilege.

ON Wednesday night a carriage containing George Russ, Miss Cowan and Mrs. Sweet, was run into by a coach on Main street, Portland, and wrecked. Miss Sweet was slightly injured. The others escaped unhurt.

BADLY ATTACKED.—Thos. Dixon, a bailiff, went into a Mr. Madge's dwelling at the Marsh Road, Saturday evening, to collect rent. Madge attacked him, blackened his eyes and tore his clothes. Officers Leggett and Hall arrested Madge.

WHILE Dr. Hamilton and his hired men were driving along Union street, last night, a heavy stone collided with the carriage upsetting it and throwing the occupants out. They had a narrow escape from serious injury. The carriage was badly damaged.

RUNAWAY.—On Tuesday afternoon a pair of runaway horses dashed the pole of the coach to which they were attached against a horse belonging to Mr. Gulliver, of the Waverly house. The animal was so badly injured that he was shot shortly afterwards.

FOLDED DEAD.—An old lady named "Nannie McVicar," was found dead last Sunday morning in a field in Letang, St. George Parish. She lived in a hut and was eccentric in her ways and had many friends who were desirous of making her live comfortably.

ASSAULTS.—Monday morning Mr. Thos. W. Lee was severely beaten on King street by D. Connell, heavy stable keeper. It was all about a debt. A man named Flood was severely injured recently by being struck by another man with a piece of iron in a house in Paradise Row.

It is said that there are about thirty applicants for the vacant position on the Portland police force. Some of these have no stake in the Town, and, therefore, ought not to have the ghost of a chance.

THE MILLS.—Kirk's mill, Portland, is to be shut down for a few days for want of logs.

King's mill, Mosquito Cove will shut down for the season shortly.

R. J. RITCHIE, Esq., M. P., President of the C. T. A. Union of New Brunswick, is to make a fraternal visit to St. Patrick's Society, Golden Grove, next Sunday. In the evening he will lecture in St. Peter's Hall, Portland, under the auspices of St. Peter's T. A. Relief Society.

FRANCHISE.—Charges of fraud recently brought against a Mr. Harst Goss, ex-Superintendent of the Parish of St. George, Charlotte Co., have been investigated recently by the Auditor General, the expenditure in the majority of instances falling far below the amount represented in the vouchers.

INQUEST.—The young man Higgins, who fell into the Trinity block cellar and was severely injured, died at the Hospital on Thursday morning. Coroner Earle held an inquest on the deceased in the afternoon and the jury returned a verdict of "Death from injuries from a fall while under the effects of intoxicating liquor." Higgins resided on Union street.

QUITE an excitement was created in our midst last week by a report that a gentleman named Burns, who resides at the upper end of Town, had discovered an oil well upon his premises. But while the capitalists of our Town were discussing the propriety of forming a company, sinking a shaft, &c., the astounding news arrived that the oil well was artificial; to use a mining term it had been "salted" with paraffine.—Woodstock Clipper.

CHILD BURNED TO DEATH IN ROCKLAND.—On Sunday evening the house of Mr. Robert Smith, at Rockland, was burned down, and so to relate, a young child of Mr. Smith's was burned to death in it, and another also seriously burned. We have not been able to learn the full particulars, but we believe that the fire was set by the young child upsetting a burning lamp, and before assistance could be rendered, it was too late to save one of the children.—Moncton Times.

ROBBERY.—On Monday afternoon a thief entered the residence of Mrs. Finn, Mill street, who she was on a visit and made away with several articles including a gold watch. On Wednesday afternoon, a Mr. Whitcomb, who lives on the City Road, was arrested for the robbery and a search was being procured, all of the articles were found in his possession with the exception of a \$3 bill. Brought before the Police in the afternoon she pleaded not guilty and was remanded until day.

CRIMINALS.—James Stanley informs us that yesterday he took from his throat an exhibit which had been secreted in a cavity in the lower part of his mouth for over a year, causing a periodical corruption and soreness of his throat. Yesterday his throat becoming unusually sore, he was obliged to leave off work, and during the day, running his fingers down into his throat and touching the sore spot felt the little pebble, which is about the size of a pea, and brought it out, since then his throat has been growing better.—Times.

FIRE.—The cellar flat of a house owned by a Mr. Thompson, of Paradise Row, was damaged by fire at an early hour last Sunday morning. The roof of Mrs. Gallagher's house, Fort Howe, caught fire on Wednesday, but the embryo flames were promptly extinguished with a few pails of water by Mr. Connor Donnelly. A fire in the Parish of Wingham, Queens Co., on Wednesday night destroyed a double house and a large barn belonging to Mrs. McRae, a widow. It appears that her sons went to Fredericton leaving her and her sister-in-law to take care of the house. The women were asleep when the house took fire but awoken just in time to save themselves from being suffocated with the smoke. They rushed out not having time to save anything from the burning house which was quickly laid in ashes. The flame next attacked a barn a few yards from the house, which contained a lot of horses, cattle, hay, buckwheat, &c. The animals were lost. Mrs. McRae had the rest of the contents were burned including 200 poultry. The sister-in-law lost \$400 in gold which was in the house when it was consumed. A short distance away there were other barns belonging to the property, which were saved.

ACCIDENTS.—A little girl named Gillespie was knocked down by a team on Main street, Portland, Tuesday afternoon, and was seriously injured. Michael May fell off a staging on Wheaton's building. Orange street, Saturday afternoon, but escaped without serious injury. A cartman named Ryan, while driving a load full of an omnibus, fell from King street east, Monday morning. Injuries slight. On Monday Joseph Flynn, in the employ of Messrs. McLaughlin & Sons, boiler makers, York Point, had his arm broken by a piece of boiler plate falling on it. On Wednesday Jas. Higgins fell into a cellar of one of the stores in Trinity Block and received severe injuries. He was sent to the Hospital. A stone cutter named Murphy had some of his fingers badly smashed by a stone falling on them in a Leicester street yard, Wednesday afternoon. During the rifle competition at St. Stephen recently, a man named Handy, was struck in the face by a glancing bullet, while in the butt near the target. The injury will not be serious.

THE END of a DRIVE.—On Tuesday afternoon Geo. W. Davis and Geo. Buchanan hired a horse from Mr. John Burcill and a wagon from Messrs. Kelly & Murphy, to take a drive, promising to return the same evening. Having failed to do so Mr.

Burcill and Capt. Rawlings went in search of them next morning but returned without finding any trace of the team. On Wednesday evening Buchanan drove along Paradise Bridge and afterwards jumped off the carriage which he alone occupied. The horse and carriage were taken charge of by Mr. Bond and driven to the owner's stable. Davis, who, in the meantime put in an appearance at the Portland Police office, framed several excuses but they would not take. Not having sufficient stamps to satisfy Mr. Burcill for the hire he had taken in the transaction, he was placed in the lock up, but was subsequently released in a letter having paid the fine.

AQUATIC.—The single scull race which took place on Courtenay Bay, Monday morning, was the best contested race that was ever witnessed, between amateurs, on these waters before. The contestants in this race, were Joseph Daly and John Gorman; both are well built young men and can handle the oar in splendid style. Betting was indulged in pretty freely among the large crowd that assembled in the shipyard to witness the race. Daly being the favorite. The course was two miles with a return. The water being in splendid condition, about eight o'clock, it was therewithal to have the race to come off immediately; the word "go" having shortly afterwards been given, and resulted in Gorman taking the lead, which was evident however, he would not be able to keep long; and such was the case, for at the turn, Daly was leading him about four lengths, and added as many more on the home stretch, winning the race easily. Daly's style of rowing was very much admired. Time, 18 minutes. Stakes were \$25 a side.

The four oared race which took place shortly after the above race, between the Black-Pole crew and Smith-Wister crew, was also well contested. The Black-Pole crew were composed of James Black, David Ramsay, W. Hannan and James Foley; the Smith-Wister crew are Robert Smith, John Myrick, John McCullough and John Wister. The course was three miles and the \$25 a side. Both crews kept well together for the first mile and a half, but on the home stretch the Black-Pole crew proved to be the best four, winning the race by two lengths.

Mr. Hugh Campbell, of Portland, says that he will row no more races this season. He is seriously thinking about giving up racing and joining a brass band. Those who imagine him green enough to take on a race this season are mistaken. It is just to Mr. Campbell to state that he intends for the remainder of the year at least to give all his attention to his business, which is constantly increasing.
