**When Will War End**

The best judges of the situation affirm that Germany can last only six months or a year longer. If Roumania would join the central powers the Allies would be forced to wage the same kind of war for about three months longer.

It was intended to postpone the British parliament elections to six months after the war, but this was reduced to three and dissolution is not to take place till eight months from February. This would appear to prove that the British Government estimates that Germany will be defeated in about six or seven months.

Whether the first break in the German lines will come in the west, or in the east, is impossible to say. Both French, British, Russian and Italian are rapturing on machinery and eventually the strain will be so severe that a snap in the German line of battle will come somewhere and it will be the beginning of the end. Probably there will be a series of small successes leading to a general advance. Matters are expected to remain moderately quiet in France till March. The Germans, however, may attempt another offensive before the Allies decide to strike.—Orange Sentinel.

**Hans Schmidt Goes to Chair**

Ossining, N.Y., Jan. 14.—Hans Schmidt, the priest convicted of murdering Anna Amueller and throwing her body in the Hudson River after dismembering it, was to have been electrocuted in the death house at Sing Sing penitentiary here today.

Schmidt is the man who told his attorney he wanted to die in the electric chair in the hope that his innocence would afterward be established and capital punishment thereby stopped.

It was on Sept. 5th, 1913, that the upper part of Anna Amueller's dismembered body was found in the river off Woodcliff, N. J. Ten days afterward, by persistent work on the part of Police Inspector Faurot the mystery was solved to the satisfaction of the police.

The body was identified as that of a former servant in the rectory of St. Boniface's Church, and Schmidt who, for three years, had been performing the functions of a priest in the rectory of St. Joseph's Church.

On the day of his arrest the priest made a full confession in which he admitted that he killed the girl and cut her body into nine pieces. His statement on that occasion was so startling that his sanity was questioned, and experts were called by the State. A month later they pronounced him sane and shamming insanity. Four alienists were then called by the defense. After several examinations they went to the stand at his two trials, the one in December, 1913, and the other in February, 1914, and swore that he was incurably insane.

**The War Situation**

Strife continues about the same in Belgium and France, although there has been increased activity with flying machines. German Airships visited England during the week and dropped a few bombs, but did a little damage. The Russians are still continuing their offensive on both the southern and northern fronts. In the Caucasus they are driving back the Turks in disorder and taking thousands of prisoners.

The situation around Salonika remains quiet. The Montenegrans are still being forced back by the Austrians. The Serbian Army is reorganizing at Corfu.

General Townshend's army is still surrounded by the Turks at Kut-el-Amara, while General Aylmer and a Russian detachment are striving to relieve them. Floods have prevented operations.

German East Africa is all but conquered. Some German officers and soldiers have fled into Spanish territory.

Not much doing on the Italian front, owing no doubt to the severity of the weather.

The British fleet is still doing business as usual in the North Sea. The German fleet are still on forlough in the Kiel Canal. Reports say they are planning 17-inch guns on their battleships, but this don't seem to worry Balfour, head of the British Admiralty.

Barratry Case Accused Bailed Out On \$50,000 Bonds.

The long delayed enquiry into the unlawful casting away and destroying the schooner 'Henry M. Stanley' on the Labrador in September last was concluded before Mr. F. J. Morris, J.P., and Mr. J. McCharthy, J.P., in the Magistrate's Court.

Had 'Father's Photograph'

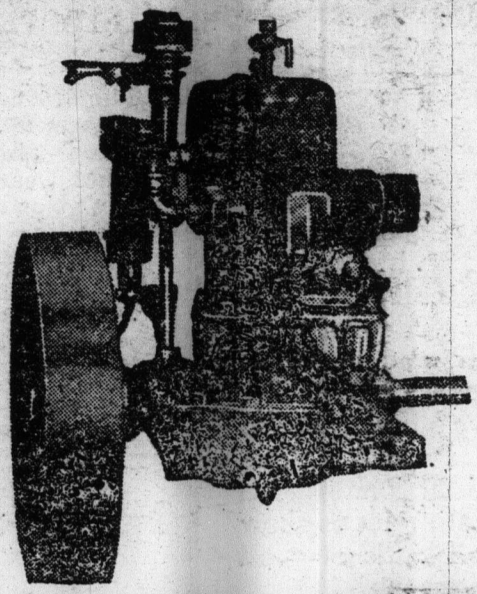

**A Coal Supply**

The matter of a supply of coal for this locality is being considered by the Executive of the Government this week.  
 Arrangements have been made with the local coal dealers to handle the coal, and we strongly urge the Government not to delay sending Bay Roberts a supply.  
 Local needs should be considered before the needs of foreign steamers, two of which put into St. John's this week short of coal. One has already secured 400 tons of Admiralty coal stored in the bulk, moored near the south side of the harbor. In view of the fact that there was an increase in Nova Scotia's output of coal in 1915 amounting to 80,000 tons, it is rather strange that an advance of 25c per ton should have taken place at the Cape Breton Mines last fall.  
 It was also a great blunder on somebody's part that sections of Newfoundland should be left so short of coal.  
 Two citizens of Bay Roberts who sent to Harbor Grace for coal this week had to pay at the rate of \$8.50 per ton and \$2 for getting a half ton hauled to Bay Roberts. Conditions as regards coal could not be any worse in such war-devastated countries as Belgium, Serbia, etc.  
 Four or five weeks ago The Guardian, speaking for the people of this section, called the attention of the representatives of the District, Messrs. Prescott, Young and Parsons, to the scarcity of a supply of coal, and asked them to take the matter up with the

Government. We fear no attention was given to the matter. And here we are still, on the 28th of January, with not a ton of coal to be got. Fortunately a supply of wood is being brought out from the country on the cars, and this is relieving the situation in some instances.  
 The weather is cold, and there are at least two cold months ahead of us, and we trust the Government will make arrangements to send us a supply next week. The Premier assures us he will endeavor to do something to relieve the situation.

**Prohibition Recount**

Recount proceedings were continued yesterday by Mr. Justice Johnson. The ballots in the remaining boxes being assorted, counting began. Bay de Verde District being the first District selected. 509 votes were counted showing 488 for and 21 against. Three rejected ballots were also found in the box, and a dispensation arose as to whether the arguments of counsel continuing till nearly 10.30 last night, when adjournment was taken. The rejected ballots showed one with the word "Yes" written, another with a short stroke, and the third with two crosses. Judge Johnson will probably give his decision this morning as to whether he will accept them or not, and then the count will be continued.—Daily News, Jan. 27.
