SOUTH AFRICA MEMORANDUM.

The London, Eng., Mail says:—Possibly the best quality of wheat just now of Dutch-South Africa origin is a Ukrainian, sometimes written "Oudlander." "Newcomer" or "ouider," is perhaps the nearest that can be got to this in translation; and the word is pronounced as nearly as possible like "light leader." The name of the president of the Transvaal Republic is written Kruger (more properly Kruger), but it is rather sounded as Kruger or Krowger, but—as near as can be indicated Kree-er. The word Transvaal is, literally, "across the yellow," (or yellow-brown) river. Natal, short for Witwatersand, is pronounced as if spelt rear. The word veld the first "v" is sometimes added—means field or common, and is pronounced "vel."
