MET DEATH ON THE I. C. R. IN A BLINDING SNOWSTORM

Section Man White Struck by an Express Near Amherst-He Died on an Engine Which Was Bringing Him to Hospital

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 4—Struck by the Moncton bound morning express, in a blinding snowstorm on the marsh two miles west of Amherst, sectionman two miles west of Amherst, sectionman F. White lay for forty minutes in the snow before being rescued, and died as an engine sent out for him reached Amherst yard. So dense was the storm in which the accident occurred that the train crew knew nothing of the fatality until an hour later when the train reached Painsec Junction. 

Senator Dupont, of Delaware, took the oath of office.

The opening of the two houses was witnessed by an animated throng which filled the galleries to their capacity. The routine work of the house incident to the opening day was quickly dispatched, the roll call showing nearly three hundred members present.

Representative Bourke Cochran, of New York, who recently married Miss

New York, who recently married Miss Ide, was the subject of hearty laughter when his personal request that he be permitted to absent himself for an indefinite period on account of business, was laid before the house by the

speaker.
