

GERMAN WAR SHIP MOLTKE SUNK BY RUSSIANS



The loss of the Moltke is the most severe blow yet suffered by the German navy. There is no question the ship was the victim either of a torpedo or mine. It is evident from all accounts of the operations in the Guif of Riga that the Moltke was one of the ten first line vessels engaged in clearing the gulf of the Russian units and of Riga that the monke was one of the ten first line vessels engaged in clearing the guir of the Rossian units and later convoyed troop ships bearing forces to co-operate with Field Marshal von Hinderburg's army west of the city of Riga by engaging in a turning movement from the northeast. The Moltke was 590 feet long and was armed with ten 11-inch and twelve 6-inch guns and twelve 24-pounders. 
