Ottawa, April 23.—The old canteen system in connection with military camps in Canada has been abolished by General Hughes, but there will still be canteens.
What is meant by the change is that henceforward no outside persons will be allowed the privilege of running canteens for the convenience of the soldiers, but the regiments will stablish and run their own canteens Any profits that accrue therefore will not go to outside parties but will go to the regiments will be continued on Monday, to which date the case went over.

Field Marshal French Confirms Reports That Germans Are Using Asphyxiating Gas Against Allies

London, April 23 (11.15 p.m.)—Feld Marshal Sir John French, commander-in-chief of the British forces in France and Belgium, concates the following under today's date:

cates the following under today's date:

"Yesterday evening the enemy developed an attack on the French troops on our left in the neighborhood of Bixschoote and Langemarck, on the north of the Ypres salient.

"This attack was preceded by a heavy bombardment, the enemy at the same time making use of a large number of appliances for the production of axphyxiating gas. The quantity produced indicates long and deliberate preparation for the employment of devices, contrary to the terms of The Hague convention, to which the enemy subscribed.

"The false statement made by the Germans a week ago, to the effect that we were using such gases, is now explained. It obviously was an effort to diminish neutral criticism in advance.

"During the night the French had to retire from the gas zone, ov-

Berlin, April 23 (Via London, April 24.)—The headquarters bulletin issued today again says, "the situation in the cast is unchanged." The report from the Russian front has been in this exact wording every day for a fortnight. It has been several weeks since any fighting between the Germans and Russians has been reported, but various indications point to a resumption of activity in the eastern theatre of the war shortly.

Just what form the new campaign will assume or in what locality of the long front it will be staged is one of those mysteries, which Von Hindenburgian strategy is so accomplished in making, even from the Germans, and speculation regarding it and concerning the present whereabouts of the Field Marshal can be heard in every coffee house and beer garden.

New York, April 23—Higher prices for some of the less prominent coppers, together with moderate revival of activity in "war" industrials and equipments, inparted a semblance of steadiness in today's stock market, but the undertone was mostly irregular. RUSSIAN BLACK SEA TORPEDO BOAT

RUSSIAN WARSHIPS SPREAD TERROR IN TURKS' BARRACKS

Turkish Coast From Archava to Artachin Swept by Shell Fire of Russian Ships-Attack Came Suddenly and Threw Enemy Into Disorder — Barracks and Provision Stores Burned and Defence Guns Silenced.

Petrograd, April 23.—The Russian Black Sea torpedo boat equadron bombarded the Turkish coast between Archava and Artaschin on April 19. This fifteen mile strip of coast, in which was located the quarters of the Turkish army operating in this region, was swept with shell, and the barracks and provision stores were ignited and destroyed. "Turkish land forces were initiating a sortle under cover of their artillery at the time. They were thrown into a panic by the unexpected bombardment from the sea and their supporting guns were immediately silenced. On April 20 all the Turkish efforts to start an offensive in this region cased.

"Only minor engagements are reported to exist on the control of the northern extremity rusisan province, a Russian mounted force clashed with atrol and the Germans were driven back.

"In the region of the Russian fortress of Ossowetz a life and artillery fire is a daily occurence.

"The greatest activity appears among the aircraft service...A Russian aeropiane driven by four separate motors and capable of carrying the weight of sixteen men, has raided the Polish towns of Miawa, near the East Prussian frontier, and Plock, on the Vistula. German aeropianes likewise daily circle about the Ossowetz fortress, though they are frontiers to traffic of all kinds, outward and inward bound, is connected with important German troop movements in Belgium.

"In is hinted in various quarters in The Hague that the Germana are about to fall back to the Liege line, and thus relieve a number of troops for possible use against italy in the event that country intervenes in the war. There is no confirmation of the rumor.



LAND REGULATIONS.




