

The light cruisers en-raged the enemy and the cruiser squadron came up at high speed, tak-ing station shead of the battle cruis-res. At 3.30 o'clock Vice-Admiral Beaty increased the speed to 25 inots and formed the line of lastle, the second battle cruiser squadron forming a-stern of the first, with two destroyar flotiliss aheat. Wice-Admiral Beatty then turned assoutheast, slightly conversing on the enemy now at a range of 23,000 yards. The fifth battle cruiser squad-ron was then bearing north-northwest, 10,000 yands distant. The visbility was good. Continuing his report, Vice-Admiral Beatty said: "The sun was behind us. The wind was outheast. Being between the en-eny and his base our situation was both tactically and stragetically good. Fight at Range of 18,500 Yards.
