### FRANCE-BRITISH EXPOSITION.

Wonderful and Unique Show to be Held in London Next

TO CELEBRATE PEACE

Notice to the World that France and Britain are no Longer Enemies.

LUNDON, Friday.-All London and Paris for that matter, as well as the British colonies and the French dependencies, are looking forward to the mening of the Franco-British exhibition. Its object is two-fold-to cement the existing friendship between Great Britain and France and to stand s a monument to the peace of Europe The Franco-British exhibition is unique in that it is to record to history the fact that, after more or less strain ed relations lasting for a century, Great Britain is at peace with France. It is the result of the diplomatic, abilities of King Edward, who after his ascension to the English throne sought and made possible the friend ship now existing between these two great European powers. It was the French people themselves who first proposed the scheme.

The exhibition which is to be opened in May next, is being hastened to ward completion at Shepherd's Bush, a suburb of North London. It covers an area of 103 acres. In all, there will be 20 huge palaces, which will be ded-icated to science, art and industry of the two nations—Britain and France for on no account will any other coun-

try be allowed to exhibit. Some idea of the practical interest France has taken in the scheme is evidenced when it is stated that out of 35,000 applications for space so far received, 19,000 have come from acros space available-30 acres, or one half square miles of floor space—is to be devoted to French exhibits, which will be more comprehensive than these displayed by France at any exhibition outside of Paris.

The buildings are spacious and artis tic structures, built for the most part of steel, iron, concrete and plaster. Wood is conspicuous by its absence with the result that all the edifices will be fireproof. The giant of the palaces is the Machinery Hall. It is the largest building ever erected at any exhibition. It covers an area of over feet long by 130 feet wide, and the cross building 302 feet long by 310 feet

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



#### HAS ALREADY DOUBLED NAVY

People Are Asking Why Japan Wants Still More Ships of War

TOKIO, Friday.-Some reliable figires are now at hand showing the present strength of the Japanese navy, as compared with its strength when the war with Russia broke out. The totals may be briefly stated, viz: 157 vessels of all descriptions representing a tonnage of 283,742 tons before the war, and 204 vessels aggregating 515,802 tons at present. The figures show that Japan today possesses more than twice the number of battleships she had before the war, a third as many armored cruisers, three more other cruisers, and nearly three times as many destroyers; but three fewer torpedo boats. Her naval losses during the war included two battlesh!ps, eight cruisers, two destroyers and seven torpedo boats, or a total of 19 vessels and 46,616 tons. On the other hand, as against the two battleships torpedoed by the Russians, the Japanese bagged at Port Arthur and in the battle of Japan Sea five battleships representing 62,524 tons, eleven unarmored cruisers aggregating 71,276 tons, five torpedo boat destroyers re-presenting 1,740 tons, or a total of 21 vessels representing 135,540 tons. Dr. Anderson made an injection of the fluid into the sac covering the paunited several portion of the bowels Simpson being perfectly conscious. He afterwards said that he felt no pain whatever. Last night he was reported to be sleeping peacefully, with good

prospects of recovery. Dr. Anderson, when spoken to by The World last night, said that while the anesthetic had been used with very satisfactory results by Prof. Barker of University College, London England, it was a new departure as regards the use of anesthetics in Ca nada. Prof. Barker had only failed in eight cases in 200 in which he had employed the anesthetic. The resul in the Simpson case was excellent The value of the form of treatment was very great in cases where pati ents could not be operated on under the usual conditions owing to weak-The new anesthetic eliminated the dangerous after effects of the unonsciousness-producing kind.
