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## MONCTON VISITED BY HEAVY STORM

Many Places Struck by Lightning

Moncton experienced one of the worst storms that has visited this city for many years Tuesday afternoon and evening, which was accompanied by sharp lightning.

The rain flooded the different streets and the gutters were unable to carry off the flood and sections of the streets were flooded in a few minutes in the city. On Main street the water flooded the sidewalk and entered a garage, but no damage was done.

It about three o'clock the rain had amounted to one and three-quarter inches.

Accompanying the rain was severe lightning and it was the worst that has visited this city this season. The storm passed over the city from north to south three times, each time the thunder being very heavy.

As reported in The Transcript, the lightning struck the Price building on Main street, doing little damage, and also struck a street car, but fortunately little damage was done and the car, after being towed to a car barn, was soon repaired and running again.

Lightning also struck a building in the west end of the city, being built by Edward Horton but little damage was reported.

A box car in the I. C. R. yard was struck with no damage being done.

The lightning entered the I. C. R. power house at the new shops and ran along the wires to the I. C. R. general offices and put the lights out of commission. No further damage, however, was done.

A post in front of the planing mill at the I. C. R. new shops was struck and completely demolished.

A large tree on Dominion Street was struck and badly shattered.

## JOINT COUNCILS IN SESSION HERE

Important Meeting held here last Friday relative to proposed Bridge.

A STEP FORWARD

On Friday evening last a joint meeting of the Town Council, the Council of the Board of Trade, together with representatives of the Bonaventure County Council was held in the Council Chambers.

This meeting was called for the purpose of considering ways and means of bringing to a successful close the construction of a bridge across the Restigouche River at Campbellton.

Mr. David Champoux spoke of the great advantage of the bridge to the people of Bonaventure County. We had a great country here and the only drawback was that it was not known. He suggested that Ministers of Public Works and other members of the cabinet be invited to come here and look over the ground for themselves.

Mr. Basted pointed out that the charter for the bridge would expire next March and the Government would then be free to deal with the matter as they thought best. He was in favor of a government owned bridge to be used by the public without payment of tolls.

After some further discussion as to the best method of procedure it was decided to call a meeting of the members of Restigouche County Council, Dalhousie Town Council, Campbellton Town Council and Council of Board of Trade, Dominion and local member for Restigouche and Mr. Thos. Malcolm, to be held in the Murray Hall, Campbellton, on Monday 22nd July, at 2:30 p. m.

He spoke very appreciatively of the progress and development of Campbellton and pointed out that if the bridge was built the town of Campbellton would become the second largest town in the province.

## KING ALFONSO'S BRAVE DEED

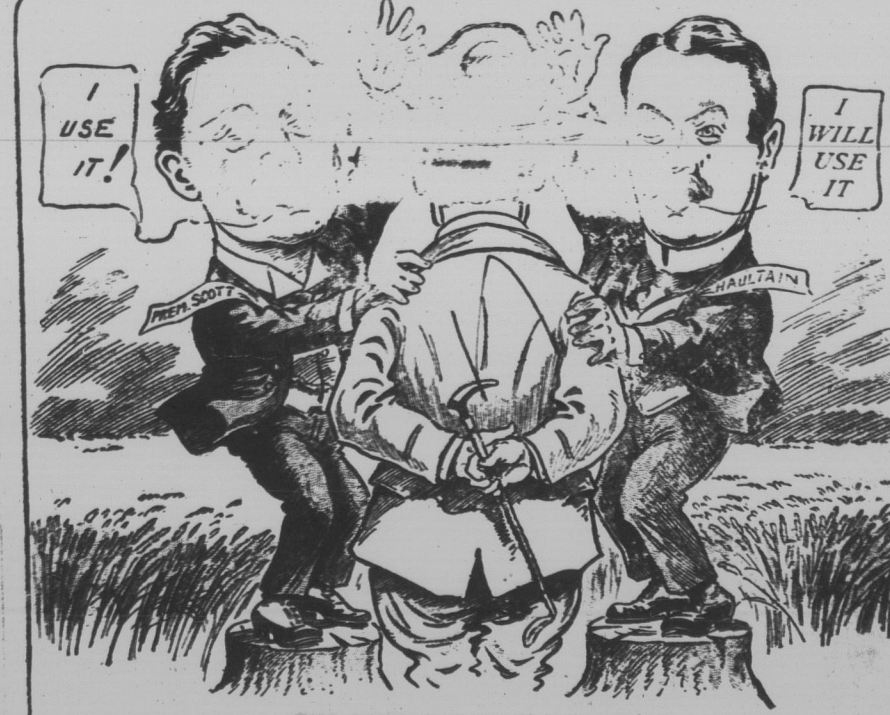

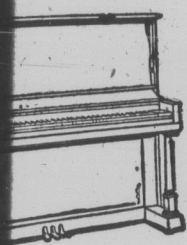

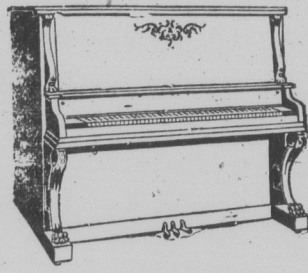

### THE ARCTIC PRESS

Papers of the Northern Printed Just  
Once a Year

There exist several journals that  
make their appearance only once a  
year. These are published within the  
confines of the north polar circle.  
The Eskimo Bulletin, for example, is  
edited near Cape Prince of Wales, on  
Behring Strait.

Here, in a village inhabited by Es-  
kimos, the English missionaries have  
established a school, and as only one  
steamer lands at this place, and that  
only once a year, that news that it  
brings is consigned to a sheet of paper  
printed with the mimeograph. Its  
size is eight by twelve inches. The  
paper is very thick and only one sur-  
face is used.

This Eskimo Bulletin in a subhead-  
line claims to be the only yearly paper.  
This, however, is an error, for there  
is an annual sheet published in God-  
thaab, Greenland, where a small print-  
ing office was established in 1882,  
whence news sheets and lithographs  
prints have been issued. The journal  
in question is entitled Annuaire d'In-  
nuit, Inuktitut, Tussummar, Inuktitut,  
that is "Something for the people: ac-  
counts of all sorts of entertaining sub-  
jects." The language is that of Green-  
land, a dialect of the Eskimos.

### HOW MANY ANCESTORS

Trace Back Twenty Generations And  
It Will Be Seen Everyone Has  
Over a Million

The full number of ancestors posses-  
sed by every individual is far greater  
than is generally supposed. It is  
usually accepted that a person has  
only two ancestors in each generation  
of past time. This is based upon the  
theory that each person had only two  
parents and is fostered by the pre-  
valent practice of ignoring the fore-  
bears of the mothers all the way.  
Glancing down the succession of  
father and son from age to age, one  
notices that for each individual in  
the protracted series there are only  
two progenitors, and receive the im-  
pression that these are all that need  
be taken in to account, and it simpli-  
fies the reckoning greatly to lose  
sight of all the others.

If this impression were correct, the  
number of man's ancestors traced  
back to the beginning of history, and  
adding two for each generation, would  
not altogether amount to only 1,200  
if traced back for 20,000 years.  
There are some whose ideas are a lit-  
tle broader. They recognize that the  
mothers of the long procession bring  
in new relationships, but treating them  
as terminal branches, they return to  
the trunk line as the only one having  
permanence, and therefore the only  
one necessary to follow.

It is now admitted that the number  
of ancestors of every human being  
doubles in every generation, as his  
descent is traced upward, excepting  
for certain checks which retard this  
natural law. In the first generation  
backward, a man has two ancestors—  
his father and mother. In the second  
he has four in the third he has eight,  
in the fourth 16, and, by the time he  
reaches his 30th generation, he is  
compelled to acknowledge his descent  
from 1,048,576 ancestors.

There are families in which it is  
impossible that the law of increase  
in ancestry should not be doubled  
after the first generation. There must  
be two parents for each individual. It  
might be possible to have two grand-  
parents instead of four, as in the case  
of the Inos. The custom of ancient  
Peru required that the legitimate  
queen of their sovereign must be his  
sister, because, as a child of the sun,  
he could not ally himself with an or-  
dinary mortal.

After a tour through the poorer  
quarters of Tokyo, Count Okuma, a  
former Prime Minister, and one of the  
leading statesmen of Japan, has come  
to the conclusion that it is absolutely  
impossible for the lower classes, hav-  
ing regard to the current rate of  
wages and the charges made for bread-  
stuffs, to earn sufficient for their bare  
needs. He advocates that the duty on  
rice should be abolished, but the  
authorities refuse to listen.

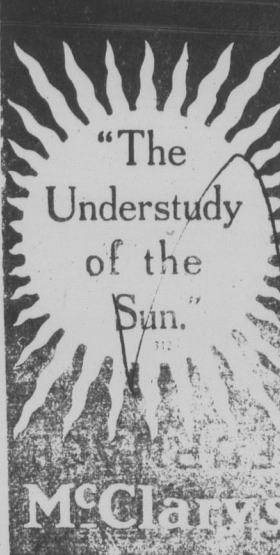
### Ancient Law Invoked

## WHAT DO YOU THINK OF THIS?

In its last number, "The Round Table," a Quarterly Review of the Politics of the British Empire, printed the following under the heading of Canada—An Imperial Navy, which we ask Canadians to carefully read:

"On various occasions during the last session of the Federal Parliament, naval policy was discussed. Time and again the Liberal Opposition strove to extract definite and detailed information from the Government. No success attended the manoeuvres for the simple reason that the details of the Ministerial programme have not been settled. Indeed, it is doubtful if there is even absolute agreement upon the broad outlines of the policy to be adopted. The Opposition was just as unsuccessful in the attempt to produce conflicting statements from the French and English wings of the Cabinet. If there were differences they were not revealed in Parliament, save in the laborious attempts of the French Conservative Ministers to explain extravagant speeches delivered in Quebec during the election. But this, in itself, suggests a strong hand in control of the Ministerial forces. There is, indeed, reason to think that the Government will approach naval defence as a unit, and that, although the exigencies of party conflict require a modification or an extension of the Laurier programme there will be no evasion of responsibility, nor any grudging contribution to sea defence.

"In Opposition as in office, the French Liberals have resolutely asserted the obligation to assist in the defence of the Empire. The session witnessed nothing more spirited and effective than some of the speeches of Mr. Lemieux in denunciation of the policy of the Laurier administration. Whatever were the merits or defects of the Laurier programme, it was a beginning and the first step is the hardest step in any radical change in public policy. It may be that the Liberal Ministers were driven by public opinion into the determination to organize and maintain a navy. It may be that they were influenced by considerations of political safety. But what other force than public opinion controls Governments in a free country? Does censure fall upon men who go to the length of the public demand? Besides, in Quebec there was a great body of feeling against naval appropriation and from the French Liberals, who were required to face and resist this hostile feeling, respect and honor should not be withheld. They were the pioneers in a hard task in a difficult country. Through their courageous action the road is made smoother for Quebec Conservatives and the Borden administration."

Now, who do the public think was the writer of the foregoing? A

good Liberal, surely? Nothing of the kind. It was the organ grinder in chief for the Conservative party, and the Borden Government, the editor of the Toronto News, the man who howled day in and day out about Laurier's "tin-pot navy," and did his contemptible best to hound Laurier out of power for the very naval policy which he now has the indecency to proclaim openly has made smooth the part of his political friends in dealing with the naval question. Could smug hypocritical impudence go further?

"The Laurier policy or some modification or extension of it," in accordance with "the exigencies of the party conflict," this chief organist tells us at present, with a blush, is to be the policy of his Conservative-Nationalist friends in office. "Everybody of common sense, of course, knew that it had to be; but that does not in the least excuse the disreputable persons who misrepresented and denounced that policy to get into office and now brazenly propose to continue it, to stay in."

The mischief they did in Quebec came nearly being fatal. The evil consequences of their reckless political misconduct in the province will be felt in Canada for many a long day to come. The indications all are that only Laurier's influence can undo the evil, which they wrought, and avert its consequences for Canada and the Empire. Yet their newspaper spokesman has the effrontery to gloat openly over the fact that the path has been made smoother for such timeservers by "the courageous action" of Quebec Liberals, led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, with reference to Canada's contribution to the sea-defence of the Empire. The confession is disgusting beyond measure, and none, we are convinced, will feel it more so than self-respecting Conservatives.

The Fredericton Mail says: Hon. W. F. A. Turgeon, Attorney General of Saskatchewan, who was elected in Humboldt, on Thursday, is a native of Bathurst, N. B., and a son of Mr. O. Turgeon, who has represented Gloucester for many years in the Federal Parliament. Shortly after his admission to the bar he moved to Saskatchewan, where in 1907 he was appointed attorney general, and elected to the Legislature for Prince Albert. At the election three years ago he was returned for Duck Lake. Hon. Mr. Turgeon is only thirty-five years of age. He is a man of great energy and ability and New Brunswickers have every reason to be proud of the record he has made for himself in public life.

Col. Sam Hughes is filling the role of War Lord magnificently. No minister before him has faced the question of the canteen with the frankness and firmness that he has done. He is a clean, sober man himself, and not afraid to touch that spot. He has the warm, undying thanks of all the mothers in the country, and what greater benediction could any man aspire to. With his rollicking Orange record he is in a position to do the country another great service in bringing into harmony the military loyalty of all phases of the population. The scene at Montigny when the Nationalist militia officer knelt before the Orange minister of the King to receive new regimental

colors in His Majesty's name, the said colors being blessed by the parish priest, and in the name of God consecrated to the loyal defence of the empire, made up a fine picture of fraternization and common loyalty, even more effective than had His Royal Highness presented the colors in person.—Montreal Witness.

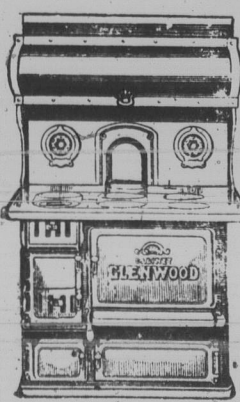

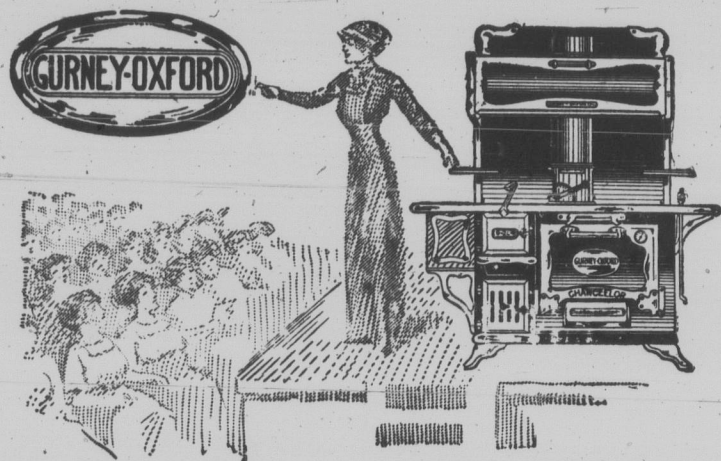



**THE SITE OF EDEN**

Proposal to Exchange Egypt For Babylon—An Ancient Document.

Many interesting points were raised by Sir William Willcocks in his paper before the Royal Geographical Society at London, on "The Garden of Eden and its Restoration." He began by stating his belief that the Garden of Eden would eventually be found just north of U. at the ancient junction of the Tigris and Euphrates, and described how the shifting of river beds must have resulted in migration. When the Tigris and Euphrates were properly controlled, and a system of irrigation works set up, the delta of the two rivers would be richer than the delta of the Nile.

The great Mehemet Ali had proposed to the Sultan of his day to exchange Egypt for Babylon, and to return to the protection of Turkey. England would make no had financial bargain if she were to exchange Egypt for Babylon. In support of this he contrasted the soils of the Soudan, Egypt, and Babylon.

He described himself as sharing the views of nearly every engineer in Upper India on the subject of navigation. In the arid regions of the earth water should be monopolised for irrigation and railways for transport. He also suggested that artesian wells might be used with profit. Perennial irrigation with regulating works on the Tigris and Euphrates would be widely different from the irrigation of the ancients in the upper parts of the delta, where tens of thousands of captives labored at the unending task of clearing silt from the waters of Babylon, by which they sat down and wept.

Mr. King, of the Assyrian Department of the British Museum, who took part in the discussion, referred to a recent acquisition of the museum—a tablet recording the grant of a site in Eden upon the Eden canal. The document was of the greatest interest, he said, because the site was described as bounded on the one side by sea—that was, by the Persian Gulf. If the Babylonian and the Biblical Eden were the same place, this tablet was the only extant record derived from the Garden of Eden itself.

**WEARS WOODEN CROWN**

Eighteen-Year-Old Grand Duchess Woman Ruler of Luxemburg

The picturesque assumption of the Oaken Crown of Luxemburg took place when the Grand Duchess Marie Adelaide came of age, and entered upon her Sovereign functions.

Luxemburg's first woman ruler, she began her reign on her eighteenth birthday. The Grand Duchess will now have what it has hitherto lacked, a really national dynasty, and will cease to be the chess-board of diplomats. The independence of the duchy is guaranteed by the Great Powers, so that its German annexation is impossible except in the case of a general conflagration which might result in the re-making of the map of Europe.

From some quarters comes the suggestion of a matrimonial alliance between the Grand Duchess and the Prince of Wales, who is the young Sovereign's senior by nine days.

Luxemburg, with its population of less than 250,000, is but a speck on the map of Europe, yet it has given the diplomatists as much work as a state a hundred times its size.

The Kaiser's Ostrich Farm

The Kaiser, after a visit to Herr Hagenbeck at his Hamburg Zoo, decided to start ostrich farming on two large tracts of land which he recently bought in German West Africa. His Majesty asked Herr Hagenbeck to supply his farms with the finest specimens of birds, and smilingly informed him that it was his intention to enter into competition with him in the feather selling business.

**HUGE WATER SCHEME**

Many Western Towns to Benefit by a Dam on the Saskatchewan River

The biggest water supply scheme ever projected in Canada was planned at a meeting held in Winnipeg when the Government of Saskatchewan, the Canadian Pacific, the Canadian Northern and the Grand Trunk Pacific railways entered into a compact to divert the south Saskatchewan River to supply drinking water to Regina, Moose Jaw, Weyburn and other towns and cities in Saskatchewan. The work will cost ultimately \$20,000,000.

Three hundred million gallons of water per day will be available for water supply without detracting greatly from the flow of the river. About 80,000 horsepower will also be developed.

The work involves the construction of a huge dam across the Saskatchewan and a large distributing system to supply the different towns and cities with water.

The railways are interested partly because they have been unable to secure water for their locomotives and also because they feel that the building up of the Province means increasing revenue.

The Oldest Steamer on the Clyde to be Retired

Henry Bell's Comet, the precursor of the present-day steamboat and tug, has no more worthy or hardy offspring than the tug "Clyde," which can be seen daily at her accustomed task of towing punts with dredges up and down the river Clyde.

Among pilots and skippers who regularly frequent the river she is known familiarly as "Nundy and Her Chickens," from the fact that she is invariably met towing a long train of punts. She is without exception the oldest steamer afloat on the river, having been built by Henderson and Coulson, shipbuilders, Renfrew, and engineered by A. and J. Inglis, Point-house, in the year 1861. She is shortly to be replaced, however.

It is worthy of note that previously the record for long service on the Clyde was held by the paddle steamer "Indra," which was built by Fife, of Fife, in the year 1814, and was engaged in the coasting trade for the last portion of 58 years.

Oldest and Youngest Gaelic

Mrs. Kitty Campbell, of Louth village, Ireland, who is 102 years of age, is the oldest Gaelic speaker in that country. 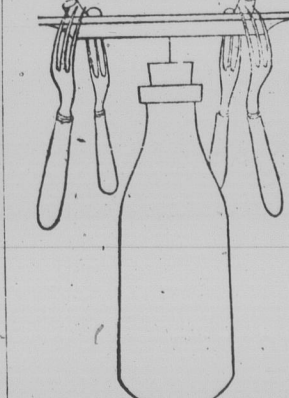

**CANADA AND BRITAIN'S NAVY**

What Mr. Borden and His Colleagues Have Learned

**THE GERMAN MENACE.**

Believed Mother Country Has Decided to Give Colonies Place on Defence Committee

London, July 16—A statement regarding the progress of the negotiations between the Canadian ministers and the Imperial Defence Committee given out by an apparently well-posted informant states:

"If the Canadian ministers were in a position to speak, there is not the slightest doubt that they would say that the aims of Great Britain with regard to naval requirements are modelled to meet German expansion at sea. That has been the keynote of the representations made made by the British Ministers, which have been presented in such a conclusive manner that the Canadians are absolutely convinced of the danger in prospect.

"Mr. Borden particularly, it is learned, put a series of questions in order to elucidate the real inwardness of the naval menace and the requirements of the admiralty to meet it. He took nothing for granted and as a result, voluminously vouched for facts are now in his possession, including technical explanations for navy experts, dealing with the strategic position and structural recommendations with regard to type of ships required.

"It is generally believed in inner circles, that the granting to Canada and the other dominions of a place in a remodelled committee of imperial defence has been practically settled as a matter of principle, but the details have still to be worked out. Just as the Canadian premier declared that Canada would not be an adjunct to the British empire, so has he insisted on assurances of the same and especially in connection with the matter of the Dominion representation in the councils of war."

The Paul Mall Gazette, the vigorous Tariff Reform London newspaper, now edited by Mr. John Garvin, publishes an apparently inspired message, which says:

"The naval arrangement will provide for \$7,500,000, as a minimum contribution to the navy."

"In return Canada has not put forward any requests, but it is understood that the British government will go its best to meet Canada's requirements with regard to certain transportation matters such as granting a subsidy towards a steamship line between Canada and the West Indies; and also a subsidy towards All Red Route steamship line which has already occupied public attention in both hemispheres."

"In the latter case the sum suggested was £250,000 a year, a condition being that it shall be an All Red Steamship route, and that the money shall not be given to any line now in existence."

## WRECK ON C. P. R. NEAR GRAND FALLS.

Driver William Weeks Killed—Traffic Tied up for Three Hours.

Grand Falls, N. B., July 16.—Wm. Weeks, aged 35, of Woodstock, was fatally injured when the engine of a freight train which he was driving, ran into a sand slide about four miles above Grand Falls, about ten o'clock, yesterday morning. The engine tender and two cars went on the track and tied up traffic for three hours. James Davis, conductor, and the rest of the crew were uninjured. The train carried no passengers and just how Weeks met his death is not known definitely. He struck on the head and presumably thrown from his seat by the impact. His fireman, Hiram Jacques, escaped uninjured. The unfortunate man was one of the youngest and best known of C.P.R. locomotive engineers. He worked for some time at Brownville, Maine, and was for a considerable period at McAdam. Eight years ago he was transferred to Woodstock and of late has been running on the route from Edmundston to Presque Isle. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Elizabeth Cogger, of Woodstock, two small children and his mother, residing at McAdam.

## PULPWOOD CONSUMPTION

The quantity of pulpwood manufactured in Canada in 1911 showed an increase of 73,801 cords (or 12.3 per cent) over 1910. In 1911, 674,288 cords were manufactured as compared with 598,487 cords in the previous year. The value of the wood also increased, with the result that the 1911 product brought to its vendors \$4,338,024, as compared with \$3,585,154 for 1910, an increase of \$752,870. The value of the wood (\$6.45 per cord) was greater than it had been for years.

Of the total amount, Quebec consumed in its 28 mills 53 per cent. Ontario used nearly one third of the total consumption; this province has the highest consumption per mill of any, viz., 12,450 cords. New Brunswick mills were hampered by low water during the year. The consumption of pulpwood in these four mills was 45,824—over twice as much as in the depression of the previous year. Nova Scotia, where only mechanical process of pulp-making is used, in its seven mills consumed 22,221 cords of pulpwood. In British Columbia pulpwood manufacture was still in the experimental stage.

Quebec used four species of wood for pulp, namely, spruce, balsam fir (or balsam), hemlock and poplar. Ontario and Nova Scotia employed spruce, balsam fir and poplar, while New Brunswick used spruce and balsam fir only.

The roots of the hair are so nourished and fed that a new crop of hair springs up, to the amusement and delight of the user. The hair is made soft and fluffy. Like all American preparations SALVIA is daintily perfumed. It is hard to find an actress who does not use SALVIA continually.

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
