Many interesting points were raised by Sir William Willcocks in his pa, er before the Royal Geographical Society at London, on "The Garden of Lucia and Its Restoration." He began by stating his belief that the Garden stating his belief that the Garden of Eden would eventually be found just north of Ur, at the ancient jun tion of the Tigris and Euphrates, and de scribed how the shifting of river b d must have resulted in migratio. When the Tigris and Euphrates were properly controlled, and a system of irrigation works set up, the delta of the two rivers would be rither that the delta of the Nile.

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
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
