
# THE WORLD'S EASTER HOPE

# COLORED MINISTER STARS IN DRAMA

(By The Associated Negro Press) On April 7th, afternoon and evening performances were given of Eleanor Wood Whitman's five act drama, "Jeremiah," at Tremont Temple, by the Greater Boston Federation of Churches.

Sixteen ministers assumed principal parts; or ninety per cent. of the speaking parts were taken by them. Denominations represented in the cast were Methodists, Episcopalians, Baptists, Unitarians, Congregationalists, Swedenborgians, Presbyterians, Jews, Universalists and Juakers.

Rev. E. E. Thompson, pastor of the Massachusetts Ave., Baptist Cambridge, took the part of Ebed-Melech, the Ethiouian enuch, who influences King Zebekiah to transfer Jeremiah from the miry dungeon, where he had been left to die, to the prison court-yard, and who later receives, through the prophet Jeremiah, God's promise of deliverance from the Babylonians, because of his faith, and of his fealty to Jehovah. Ebed was one of the principal characters portrayed; and Rev. Thompson acted the part with understanding and dignity; and his work has been most favorably commented upon.

Judging from reports the greatest handicap which they must reckon with is the lack of sufficient capital. It seems as though they have no difficulty in drawing patrons from white people as well as from our own group whenever they have sufficient capital to open first-class businesses.

It would appear then, that what we as well as our share of labourers if we would become an integral part of the nation. We must make places for our talented boys and girls if we intend to keep them in Canada.


