

The Countess Fitzjames had had all her effects insured by the Union Fire Ina pair of pearl earrings valued at 18,000 francs and insured for 10,000. One afternoon while dressing the Countess knocked the earrings accidentally from the mantlepiece into the open fire. Despite her stren nous efforts with shovel and tongs the jewels were destroyed. She recovered the jewels were destroyed. She recovered the gold, valued at 60 francs, and demanded from the company 9,940 francs indemnity for the loss of the pearls. The company refused to pay a cent, on the ground that an ordinary grate fire was not the kind of a fire contemplated in the insurance policy. The Countess appealed to the courts, and got a decision in pealed to the courts, and got a decision in her favor. The Judge held that "an in-surance against fire was an insurance against all kinds of fire—that was, inance against any loss caused by any

ALTHOUGH still of very moderate propor tions, and but little heard of outside of Austria, the petroleum industry of Western Galicia is said to be older than the Pennsylvania industry by nearly ten years. The American product and the extraordinary growth of the supply acted as a discouraging feature in the development of the Austrian deposits just as the use of petrole as an illuminating material began to be un derstood there. A State investigation, made public in 1880, according to a writer in the Vienna Neue Freie Presse, showed that the Vienna Neue Freie Presse, showed that the Galician oil-producing region embraces almost the whole northern slope of the Carpathian Alps from New Sandec to the Bukowina, and is of far greater extent than that of Pennsylvania. The strata are pretty regular, and the surface indications of the presence of oil are well marked. Two American explorers, Messrs. McGarvey and Bergheim, who discarded the old methods of trenching and adopted the most modern American tools for boring, seem to have met with considerable success, and to have met with considerable success, and to have trained the native workmen till they have trained the native workmen till they are in every way capable of carrying on the work on the most approved lines; but in spite of this capital seems to have fought shy of the industry, and only some small works, but nothing on any large scale, has been attempted. Record of the U. S. Station Work From the office of experiment stations, Department of Agriculture, Washington, we have received copies of No. 2 and No. 3 Experiment Station Records, giving an account of the third annual convention of the Association of American Agricultural Col Association of American Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations throughout the Republic. In 39 States, 43 stations are now in operation, expending, with the Washington office, about \$725,000 per year, over 400 persons being engaged in directing or conducting investigations in almost every conceivable branch of agriculture or related subjects. An admirable synopsis is given in the two volumes to hand of experiments carried on last year in a large number of the stations. There are also abstracts from publications issued are also abstracts from publications issues by the Bureau of Animal Industry, the division of Economic Ornithology and division of Economic Ornithology and Mammalogy, and the divisions of Forestry and Pathology. As works of reference for farmersand farm writers, these volumes are especially valuable.

Missionary Life in India.

Rev Mr. Wilkie, who has been a missionary in India for some years and intends returning to that country in July, detends returning to that country and instructive

missional transfer of that country in July, delivered a very interesting and instructive address last night in the First Presbyterian Church before a very fair audience. Mr. Wilkie accompanied his discourse with practical illustrations of Hindoo life thrown out by a magic lantern, a somewhat novel method, but one which greatly enhanced the interest of the lecture. The map of India was first shown and the districts and cities of interest pointed out. The speaker dwelt chiefly with Central India, his sphere of labor in that country, and described the habits and customs of its inhabitants in a graphic manner. This district had never experienced a famine and without any manuring the land produced two crops a year, yet its productice all went to the native princes, some of whom a

had revenues of \$3,000,000 annually, while the common people were in a state of starva-tion. The speaker gave some amusing fact in connection with the sacred animals which the natives venerate so much, and minutely described the costumes and manners of the described the costumes and manners of the inhabitants. He declared Mohammedanism to be on the decline, and that many of the followers of the Prophet had turned to paganism. The condition of the women was degraded in the extreme, and they were subject to all the brutal humors of their husbands. These unfortunates could only be reached through their own sex, and hence the necessity for female mismissionaries. In conclusion the speaker appealed to the Christians of civilized lands to aid in elevating the people of the misguided, but rich and promising country of India.
