FORTY PASSENGERS KILLED.

None of the Passengers or Crew Escape Unhurt.

A Train Plunges in the Darkness Into an Abyss Two Hundred Feet Deep.

STATESVILLE, N. C., Aug. 27.—A western bound passenger train on the Western North Carolina Railroad jumped a trestle near here this moraing about 2 o'clock. The train plunged in the darkness into an abyss 200 feet in depth, dashing the cars into splinters. At least 40 of the passengers were killed outright. The wounded number 25, and many of them will die. Few, if any, of the passengers or crew escaped unburt. Relief was promptly sent. quarters of an hour to cover.
