Resolution Passed by the Council of Women.

Will Co-operate With the Tobacconists to Impose a License on Hotels and Saloons Selling These Things.

A public meeting of the Local Council of Women was held in the "Y" rooms yesterday afternoon, a large number of ladies being present. Mrs. Boomer, the president, gave an interesting address, in the course of which she outlined the work of the

The question of the approaching national convention to be held at Halifax on June 14 next, was then discussed. It was decided that generally the delegates of the local council would be left to vote as the occasion required. They will, of course, be bound to support the position of their council in advocating the representa-tion of women on school boards, and the adoption of covered patrol wagons, also in opposing the immigration of pauper children and the selling of liquor in grocery stores.

Among the papers which will be read at the convention will be one by Mrs. Boomer, as representing the London Council of Women, and one by Mrs. A. Murphy, of Ingersoll, as representing the King's Daughters. The council further decided to sup-port the choice of Madame Laurier, Lady Tupper and Mrs. George Drum-mond, as delegates from the Canadian Council of Women to the international meeting to be held in old London in 1898. The Canadian society has not as yet associated itself with the international ternational organization, but the union may result from the conven-
