### FIFTEEN BURNED TO DEATH IN C.P. R. WRECK AT CHAPLEAU

Nine Adults and Six Children Perish and Forty Are Injured in Accident to Through Train.

WELL-KNOWN LONDONER IN WRECK BUT ESCAPES

Iwo Cars of an Express From Montreal Overturned and Consumed by Flames, Unfortunate Passengers Being Pinned Helpless Beneath the Wreck.

Montreal, Que., April 11 .-- According to the official statement made by the management of the C. P. R. today with reference to the terrible disaster to the C. P. R. westbound express yesterday, near Chapleau, there were 15 lives lost, or, as the wording of statements puts it, that number are missing. Nine adults and six children went down to their death, and their remains were cremated.

Their names are:

William Day, London, England.

Winnifred and Susan Horton, Charting Heath, Kent.

According to the official statement, the train was running at the usual speed, about 22 miles west of Chapleau, being the regular Transcontinental train, which left Montreal on Tuesday morning, when it was partly derailed to have been from the cocking range.

It is believed that most of the dead were occupants of the tourist car, nd were pinned down in the wreckage, and were either killed outright or cremated, as the fire consumed the wreckage. It will be seen from the list of dead that women and children were the principal victims, there being only three men mentioned in the loss of fifteen.

Fort William, Ont., April 11.-Information of an accident on the C. P. R., east of Chapleau, reached here yesterday evening, but it is impossible to secure anything like a detailed account. The information is to the effect that when No. 1, the through train from Montreal, had reached a point 20 miles east of Chapleau several cars left the track, and at least two were overturned into the ditch. By some means the cars caught fire, and as quite a number of passengers were underneath, an awful scene ensued. Just how many lost their lives it would be difficult to state, but it is known that 11 persons were burned practically to cinders, and as all identification papers were consumed with them, it will be some time before it can be determined who they were. Great excitement is manifest in town, as several citizens had friends on No. 1, and they are anxiously awaiting particulars. There must be a large number of passengers on the injured list, but information as to their identity is unavailable.




