Laurier Opens Campaign in a Stirring Speech at Simcoe

TEN THOUSAND TO HEAR CHIEFTAIN'S STRONG ADDRESS DEFENDS PACT, SCORES BORDEN

Farmers of Five Counties Gather to Hear the Liberal Leader Champion Their Cause---Veteran in Good Health and Capital Form.

GRAND WELCOME BY HISTORIC NORFOLK POINTS TO VICTORY ON SEPTEMBER 21

Premier in Masterful Manner Shows the Benefits of the Trade Agreement With the United States and Disposes of the Pogey of Annexation.

Simcoe, Aug. 15.-Sir Wilfrid Laurier opened the great reciprocity campaign here today, and if the sentiment of the southeastern counties in the Western Peninsula is any criterion, the Laurier Administration will again be returned by a great

There was an immense audience to hear the Liberal chieftain, Conservative estimates place the throng at 10,000, and it can readily be imagined that there were that number, judging from the sea of faces that greeted the Premier.

It compared most favorably with the magnificent opening day in the now famous 1908 tour of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. It will be remembered that he then opened at Niagara Falls. The selection of Simcoe as the spot where the first gun in the greatest campaign ever waged in Canada was to be fired, was in keeping with the sound judgment of the Liberal leaders.

A PICTURESQUE SETTING.

The park where the meeting was held is a most picturesque place. The tiny river Lynn flows at the rear, and the platform was located in the midst of many fine trees. A natural amphitheatre made it easy to seat the multitude, and added much to the appearance of the scene,

HISTORIC NORFOLK.

The riding, Norfolk County, is a historic riding so far as reciprocity is concerned. The late John Charlton, for 32 years member for this riding, spent the greater part of his life fighting for reciprocity in natural products. 
A TRIUMPH FOR LAURIER.



Senate Committee States That the Treaties Would Cause Wars.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 18. — The Senate committee on foreign relations characterized President Taft's general arbitration treaties with Great Britain and France in their present form as proper in the soul of the great patriot passed the sway.

Put a pint of milk in a double boller; separate two eggs, beat the yolks with half a cupful of sugar, add a little hot milk, turn in the boller, cook for a moment, take from the fire, and stir in half a cupful of stale, fine breadcrumbs, ten drops of bitter almond, and twenty-four almonds, blanched and chopped fine. Cool and pour over the peaches in the serving dish. Beat the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth, add two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar, and beat again. Drop by traspoonfuls on a saucepan of hot water; cook for an instant; lift with a skimmer, drain, and silde them at once on top of the pudding. Dust with a tablespoonful of fine breadcrumbs and stand aside to cool. Serve only then quite cold.

Stale pieces of cake or rusk may be used in the place of bread.

Should it ever happen that a bag leaks, simply transfer it with contents undisturbed to another bag.

5. The oven, any kind of which will do, should be kept clean, and if properly heated, as with the old style of cooking, results should satisfactorily follow. 

Directions---How to Use Cooking Bags:

1. Select one that "fits" the food intended to be cooked. 2. Grease slightly the inside of the bag, except in the case of vegetables, or when water is to be added.

3. When the food has been prepared for the bag, place the same on the table, and lift the uppermost edge of the bag while you insert the contents,

4. Fold the mouth of the bag two or three times and fasten with a clip, or pins, or in any other way that will secure as nearly as possible a hermetical closing.

Should it ever happen that a bag leaks, simply transfer it with contents undisturbed to another bag.

5. The oven, any kind of which will do, should be kept clean, and if properly heated, as with the old style of cooking, results should satisfactorily follow. Average oven heat should be about 200 degrees, Fahr., and when the bag is put into the over this heat should be reduced by about 30 degrees. In the case of ovens with solid shelves, a wire grid should be placed on the shelf with a space between and the bag with contents on the grid. Experience will soon teach the cook when the oven is hot enough without the use of a




