MURDERERS ESCAPE

Great Excitement Prevails in Cork As a Result of Murder.

London, March 20.—Details of the murder of the lord mayor of Cork indicate that a dozen men knocked at the door of the home of the lord mayor, Thomas MacGuerin. Mrs. MacGuerin opened the door and the men rushed in. Some of them held her, while others ran upstairs to the mayor's bedroom. ran upstairs to the mayor's bed They took him to the landing and shot him in the chest. They then fled hurriedly.

Mrs. MacGuerin telephoned immediately for a doctor and a priest. The mayor died soon after the arrival of

Mayor MacGuerin, a prominent Sinn

As the bonds of prohibition are drawn tighter and tighter the keys that give access to many well-filled cellars are being more sparingly used, so much so that one elderly Londoner declared Friday that when he died he expected that there would still be a large supply of cheer-giving fluid left in his cellar for his heirs and benefac-

One of the benefactors mentioned one of the benefactors inentioned immediately got in touch with License Inspector J. E. Keenleyside, asking if it would be legal to go into his friend's house after his demise and help himself to his share of the contents of the

This was indeed a poser for the good inspector. He did not know, and immediately passed his questioner on to Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon.

"I never heard of such a case, and I could not tell you offnand whether the O. T. A. provided for a contingency of that description," said Mr. Graydon, when appealed to.



OUEBEC SELLS LARGE BOND ISSUE AT \$105 TO CANADIAN FIRMS

\$3,500,000 of Five-Year 6 Per Cent Securities Are Sold.

New York, March 19 .- Local bond dealers received word this morning that the Provincial Government of Quebec has sold to a Canadian syndicate, headed by the Dominion Securities Corporation, and Wood & Gundy Company, \$3,500,600 of five-year 6 per cent bonds at a price to net the province \$92,55 and accrued interest in New York funds. 

AS TO THE TARIFF.

A section of the Conservative press is trying to make it appear as if leading Liberals were deserting the Liberal party on the tariff issue. That the best interests of Canada demand that substantial reductions of the burdens of customs taxation be made with a view to the accomplishing of two purposes of the highest importances First, diminishing the very high cost of living, which presses so severely on the masses of the people; second, reducing the cost of the instruments of production in the industries based on the natural resources of the Dominion, the vigorous development of which is essential to the

progress and prosperity of our country. That, to these ends, wheat, wheat flour and all products of wheat, the principal articles of food, farm implements and machinery, farm tractors, mining, flour and saw mill machinery, illuminating, lubricating and fuel oils, nets, net twines and fishermen's equipments, cements and fertilizers, should be free from customs duties as well as the raw material entering into the same.

That a revision downwards of the tariff should be made whereby substantial reductions should be effected in the duties on wearing apparel and footwear, and on other

articles of general consumption (other than luxuries), as well as on the raw material entering into the manufacture of the same. That the British preference be increased to 58 per cent of the general tariff.

A conference of Entente statesmen was held at Calais, he says, on December 4, 1915, at which Lord Kitchener threatened to resign if a venture which he considered thoroughly unsound were not abandoned. But it appeared that the Saloniki enterprise was inextricably bound up with French politics. Briand, like Lloyd George in England, was its chief protagonist, but Clemenceau was opposed. It appeared, therefore, that Kitchener's policy would mean the defeat of Briand and the formation of a cabinet by Clemenceau, with whom Poincare was at that time not on speaking terms. For fear, therefore, of a crisis in French politics. Lord Kitchener was persuaded to withdraw his resignation, and a Franco-British force was kept bottled up at Saloniki. Canada is experiencing from east to west trong trade union revival. The membership of organized labor is rapidly increasing. As local, national and international tribunals councils and conferences have been created to define in legal form the new rights and privileges of working men. the individual working man and woman organize to gain representation. But lines of organization in Canada are becoming dangerously diverse.

Unions affiliated with the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada still hold the great centre wing and greatly predominate both in numbers and in influence. But from the East and the West there rises the challenge of opposing organizations-in the East, the National Catholic Unions of Quebec: really appreciates the obligations that are in the West, the One Big Union. That of the Socialist trade unions is 230,000; of the Protestants, 70,000; of the Neutrals, about 60,000, and of the Revolutionary Socialists, about 30,000. And the growth of Catholic labor unions in the Netherlands has recently been very rapid. Three of their officers are on the Central Labor Council. Many others are in government positions. The Catholic political party, which gives political support to the Catholic labor movement. has 30 out of 100 members in the national parliament. As a result of its influence (and this, no doubt, largely accounts for its prestige), much progressive legislation has been passed-chief of which being a national eight-hour day, with a 45-hour

Finally, the industrial development of Quebec, with the trade combinations marking th industrial history of Canada today, will tend to force Catholic and Protestant workmen alike into trade organization far beyond the limits of the different orthodox religions.







I do not mind confessing that it was my defeat of him that caused me to my defeat of him that caused me to enter into my first European championship with Jim Sullivan without the least doubt of winning. Said I: "If I can beat Burns, surely I will triumph against any man of my weight."

It may not be suspected, but I would have it placed on record that my victory over Sid Burns opened for me the door to championship honors, wide fame, and until the war came, a considerable fortune, for then I had made a million francs out of the ring.

It has been customary for the public accounts to be brought down with the treasurer's budget, but a departure was made this year in view of the fact that the accounts in question had all been incurred by the late government before Hon. Mr. Smith took office. The fiscal year ended October 31, 1919, while the present government did not assume office until two weeks later.

Ordinary receipts for the year were \$19,904,472.03, and ordinary expenditures \$21,464,574.88. Capital receipts, however, bring the total up to \$54,964,-059.49, and capital expenditure brings the expenditure to \$47,350,675.07. Revenue totalling \$27,416,898 was received from provincial loans during the year, and loans totalling \$7,152,772 were repaid.

SHORTAGE OF BRAN AND SHORTS ALARMS FARMERS, DAIRYMEN

Ottawa Govt. Permitted Wheat To Leave Country, Says Doherty.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, March 19 .- The shortage of bran and shorts is causing alarm among the stock and dairy farmers of the province. Even small quantities of millfeed cannot be purchased by the farmers, and with months yet before the pastures will be capable of support-ing the herds of cattle, production may be interfered with consiberaly.

Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, has enlisted the co-operation of Quebec and New Brunswick. where the situation is as serious as in Got Whole Wheat, Mr. Doherty pointed out to the federal authorities before he became minister

authorities before he became minister of agriculture the possibility of the famine of such feeds. He urged that foreign and British buyers be requested to take part flour when they ordered wheat, so that the feeds would be left for Canada. The suggestion was not acted upon, and Britain and European countries got the whole wheat

acted upon, and Britain and European countries got the whole wheat.

On March 4 Mr. Doherty telegraphed Chairman Stewart of the wheat board suggesting that if a new export development in flour took place that Ontario millers get a share of it to enhran and shorts to Ontario farmers. On March 14 he wrote, suggesting a policy that in view of the acute shortage would be of assistance, even if the flour export did not increase.

Place Flour Order.

"Would it not be possible for you to place with our Ontario mills an order for flour, which you would have no difficulty in disposing of within the next three or four months?" he asked.

"Unless the live stock and dairy farmers of this province are able to get meal within the next five weeks the production of live stock will be materially reduced and an additional element of discouragement added to the already heavy load."

RAPPORTTA MURDER AS MUCH MYSTERY AS EVER





London Music Lovers Had Rare Treat At Dundas Centre Church.

The most liberal anticipations were surpassed in the uniform excellence of the program provided by Dundas Centre Methodist Church choir and assisting artlsts, under the direction of J. Parnell Mirris. L.T.C.M., A.C.G.O., Thursday. Both Miss Louise A. The excellence of the choral work also in no small degree reflected favorably on the ability of Mr. Morris as conductor. Perhaps the choral number which was the most outstanding success was the rhapsody "Seadrift," another composition of the gifted Coleridge-Taylor. 

SCHOOL TENDERS TO BE CALLED SHORTLY

Every Effort Being Made To Get Work Under Way.

Tenders for building additions to the Wortley road and Victoria public public schools will be called for early in April. Now that the appropriation for school building has been approved by the city council and provision made in the tax rate to meet the interest and sinking fund on the debentures, every effort is being made to get the work

Architect L. E. Carrothers is working on detailed plans and these will likely be submitted to a committee early next month, irimediately following their approval tenders will be called for.

Other additions may be completed by that time also. Seventy, thousand dollars will be spent at Victoria school. Original estimates called for an expenditure of \$80,000, but these were reduced. This will provide for the addition of four classrooms and an assembly hall. A


